To the Members of the Mercantile Rowing Club,

Gentlemen.

Your Committee has much pleasure in presenting to you the

Fiftieth Annual Report.

The opening of the 1929-30 season ushered in the Club's Jubilee Year. Realising its responsibility of fittingly celebrating such an important period of the Club's existence, your Committee carefully considered the matter in order to arrive at the best method of marking the attainment of the Jubilee. Eventually, the rather ambitious idea of making every activity of the Club a record was decided on. The extent to which these ambitions have been realised is set out in detail in the following Jubilee Report. In this opening paragraph, it will suffice to mention that, for the first time in its history, the Club has won both the Senior and the Junior Premiership, a distinction gained previously by only one other club, Albert Park, in 1906-07; six Mercantile members rowed in the crew which, after 18 years, restored Victoria's rowing prestige and won the King's Cup for the first time since it has been the trophy for the Australian Eight-oared Championship, the crew being coached and steered by members of the Club; the success of the Annual Dinner, the Club's most popular social function. surpassed anything of the past. Such achievements to appropriately mark the Jubilee Year are the result of fine team work, in which many old members co-operated with the present generation and demonstrated that the spirit of the old Club and its traditions are something to be proud of and provide an incentive to do things worth while when the occasion arises.

Finance.

The balance sheet shows the Club to be in a sound position. The accounts for the year show a surplus of £16/2/10 carried forward to capital account, as against £222/11/8 carried forward last year. The difference is partly accounted for by a drop of £30 in the amount of subscriptions received, a decrease of £80 in the amount of donations received and by the fact that there is £17 more written off for depreciation.

The amount of subscriptions outstanding is £33/17/-, which is smaller than usual. Fares to country regattas cost the Club £19/15/8. This amount is excessive and should receive careful consideration during this season. Regatta entrance fees, £4/17/6, is an unsatisfactory item and should not be repeated.

Owing to the increasing interest being taken by members in sculling, your Committee has seen fit to place an order with the boat builders to deliver a sculling boat in the near future.

There is also on order one set of racing oars from Norris, London,

and 2 sets of practice oars from Stephenson, Melbourne.

Great thanks are due to Mr. A. P. Miller, who so capably filled the capacity of boat steward, and to Mr. G. F. Horder, who carried out many improvements and repairs to the Club property.

As a very large proportion of the Club's annual expenditure is on account of repairs, members are urged to exercise the greatest

possible care when using Club property.

The Club is now in possession of a remarkably fine fleet, and it is well to know that it should be some years before it is necessary to make further additions. During the season six new boats were purchased at the total cost of £448, the details of this expenditure being: 1 Practice Four, £50; 2 Tub Fours, at £54 each; 1 Racing Clinker Four, £65; 1 Practice Eight, £110; 1 Racing Clinker Eight, £115.

The set of Norris oars which were used by, and later presented to the winning King's Cup crew, will be replaced at an early date by

the Victorian Rowing Association.

Rowing.

Australian Championships.

At Mannum, South Australia, May 10th, 1930.

After a lapse of eighteen years, Victoria regained her rowing prestige on May 10th, by winning the King's Cup in brilliant style from N.S.W., the holders of the trophy.

Victoria was represented by G. R. B. Patterson (bow), J. H. Bailey (2), B. Thompson (3), L. Thompson (4), J. South (5), D. C.

Brooke (6), F. H. Shore (7), C. N. McKay (stroke), M. Green (cox), and Mr. A. B. Sloan (coach).

Your heartiest congratulations are extended to the crew, Mr. Sloan, and to their manager and emergency, Mr. T. L. Mannix.

All six States competed, and the race was rowed over a perfect course on the Murray, at Mannum, South Australia. After a gruelling race, Victoria, with a magnificent finish, won by three feet from New South Wales, with Queensland third.

The Sculling Championship again went to New South Wales, whose representative (J. R. Scott) won comfortably from A. Buckley (Queensland), 2; R. Beauchamp (Tas.), 3; and R. Jelbart (Vic.), 4.

Your congratulations are extended to Mr. Scott.
