The Fifty-seventh Annual Report

To the Members of the Mercantile Rowing Club,

Gentlemen.

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration the Fifty-seventh Annual Report, Balance Sheet and Statement of Accounts.

Regarding the activities of the Club for the past season in retrospect, the outstanding feature has been the winning of the Junior Premiership, which feat has not been achieved since 1930-31. At the same time, third place on the Senior list, while leaving room for improvement, has borne out the fact that promotion of worthy junior men must not be too long delayed, as most of the points scored in this division were secured towards the close of the season when some of the older stalwarts were replaced by younger men and more vigorous junior men.

To revert to the Junior Division, every man, whether rowing or coaching, who was associated with this victory, is to be congratulated. Once more the lightweights played a very big part in the securing of points and mention should be made of the fact that these young men as a group are an object lesson to the older and more senior members of the Club. Their conscientious devotion to training and general willingness to assist where there is any work to be done was suitably rewarded by the number of wins they recorded for the Club. The most disturbing feature was the lack of maiden wins. With the amount of material available, one maiden four double is not a very proud result. It is an established fact that it is the maiden ranks which provide the future champions, and are to be most carefully nurtured. If the high position reached this year is to be maintained then we must definitely direct our undivided attention to the men who have yet to win a race.

Too much stress cannot be laid on the importance of hard physical training for the very strenuous regatta racing. In every instance preparation out of the boat as well as in the boat was reflected in the results achieved by training crews. This point recurs for review each year, and more and more apparent does it become that races are won only by the fittest crews, and men who are secure in the knowledge that every individual in their crew is in the condition to see out the distance to the last bitter stroke.

While improvement was noted in the number and calibre of coaches this year, it does seem a strange thing that a Club which has been famous for its champions of a few years past, is still unable to secure the services of men willing to sacrifice a little time to the preparation of crews, which are expected to carry on the traditions of the old Club. It is to be hoped that mention of this matter will provide food for thought for some of our older members whose assistance is desperately required. At the same time we are confident that those who were so loyal and liberal with their services last year will see their way clear to continue the good work during the approaching season, and will enjoy the fruits of success for their very valuable work in this direction.

Once again a programme of Club races prior to and at the close of the regatta season has been very well supported. The fortnightly races during the winter months have had the desired effect of keeping members interested and active, and of providing racing experience for all. On alternate Saturdays football has proved a great attraction and most pleasant afternoons' enjoyment is reported by everyone participating. The Seven Mile Time Trial which has now become a recognised feature during the winter months has attracted a great number of entries and has come to stay.

The Social Activities for the year under review were very capably conducted and enjoyed the wholehearted support of members in most cases. A most interesting lecture by Mr. H. G. Alderson, manager of the Australian team to the Olympic Games, was very well supported by our own and members of neighbouring clubs.

The attendance at country regattas is again a matter for congratulation. The participants in these Christmas tours to Nagambie, Shepparton and Rutherglen are loud in their praise of what may be described as an ideal holiday in sunshine and pure country air, combined with racing under perfect conditions of ease and comfort. A winning maiden four at Sale and Bairnsdale clinched the Junior Premiership.

The gymnasium has indeed justified its existence and is proving a boon to those who desire a work-out or warm-up on days when inclement weather conditions prevent the possibility of a row. Just one word at this juncture may help keep the material provided in good repair, and in condition to be used by the next man. It is just as easy to replace any equipment after use as to throw it aside and give the "gym." an unnecessarily untidy appearance. Mid-week rowing has never been so well patronised as this year, and it is very satisfactory to say that this feature reflects the happy healthy state of the Club at the present time. Whilst this feeling is maintained Mercantile must remain at the top, and it augurs well for the approaching season, which we can face full of optimism.

The progressive policy formulated at the beginning of the year has been strictly adhered to, and a detailed record of the Club's activities is submitted for your review.

Financial.

Extensive additions and improvements to the Club House were responsible for a new overdraft. Although the cost entailed was in the vicinity of £600, with the prompt payment of subscriptions early in the year in many cases, it was found necessary to borrow only £500. A clause in the contract with the Bank of New South Wales states that the Club has agreed to reduce its liability by a specified amount each half-year. The object of this clause is to provide a definite incentive to completely efface the loan within the time originally planned of seven years. The Treasurer would greatly appreciate the assistance of all members who can help him work within his margin by paying their subscriptions immediately after the commencement of the financial year.

A very successful boat building drive was conducted towards the close of last year. Our sincere thanks are due to Mr. M. E. Green, who raised £90/15/4 towards the building of a new practice eight.

The Committee wishes to draw your attention to the fact that it is in your own interests to take particular care of the Club's property. Accounts for repairs would be greatly reduced if members were a little more mindful of the preservation of boats and oars. A more liberal policy of replacements and purchases is impossible while the Club's financial director is handicapped with enormous repair accounts. In many instances damage is caused by new members who are strange to the handling of craft and blades. A few words of advice from older members would be very encouraging as well of great assistance.

Club House, Boats and Oars.

With the extensions completed, your Club House now stands unrivalled as the most spacious and best appointed in the State. The value of the building itself has been very considerably increased and we may be justly proud of what has been accomplished this year.

A new practice eight was purchased from Messrs. W. H. Jerram & Sons, and christened on 29th May "C. F. Raven," in appreciation of the cutstanding services rendered to the Club by Mr. C. F. Raven during the several years of his office in various capacities. During the year the sale of the clinker racing eight "J. G. Sprigg" was negotiated with the Port Pirie Rowing Club.

It was found necessary with increased membership and representation at regattas to purchase more than the average number of oars. Two sets of eight "Botterill" and one set of eight and one of

four "Towns" were required at the commencement of the season. Later a set of 10 "Stephenson" equal to new were secured from Geelong Grammar School. A rack has been constructed on which racing oals can be stored without fear of being used between regatta seasons.

The Committee again urges members to exercise the greatest possible care in the use of boats and oars, and to report to the

Captain any damage or defect noted.

A plan to have each new member sponsored by the man who introduces him into the Club has proved highly satisfactory. A beginner is soon made to feel "at home," which is so vital. He is very easily discouraged after the first few uncomfortable rows, but new friendships formed have the effect of attracting him to the Club and keeping him interested until after the awkward initial stages.

Sixty-one new members were introduced into the Club, and without exception have proved to be men worthy to carry on the good name of the Club. The material provided will go far towards maintaining your high position in the rowing world, and will undoubtedly be instrumental in securing more wins in the approaching season. At the same time it is pointed out that there is accommodation for still more new men, and your Committee would appreciate to see a few more of the lockers at present yacant, occupied in the next few months.

Executive and Committee.

The Captaincy of the Club for the season now ending has been in the very capable hands of Mr. J. H. Bailey, who, unknown to most of us, has sacrificed business inferests on many occasions to place his Club first. Your sincere thanks are due to Mr. Bailey for his untiring efforts to raise the Club to an even higher position than it enjoyed when he came into office. A conspicuous feature has been the feeling of harmony he has inspired among all ranks. He may finish this term of office confident in the knowledge that he has faithfully done his part to further the progress of the Club.

Making full use of the powers extended to it at the last Annual General Meeting the Committee appointed Mr. F. Newport to the

position of Hon. Ass. Secretary at the first monthly meeting of the year. Mr. D. R. Nicholls was elected to the vacant seat on the Committee.

Early in April, the Hon. Secretary, Mr. S. C. Macrae, found it necessary to resign, as his business principals had seen fit to send him abroad for an indefinite period on their account. It is unnecessary to pay tribute to Mr. Macrae's work for the Club. It has been obvious to all that Mercantile's present sound position, and the spirit of animation and enthusiasm in the Club, are due almost entirely to Mr. Macrae's exceptional executive ability. We shall feel his loss very keenly. Mr. F. Newport was appointed in his stead, and Mr. A. J. Callander was elected by the Committee to fill the position of Hon. Ass. Secretary.
