The Fifty-Eighth Annual Report

of the

Mercantile Rowing Club



To the Members of the Mercantile Rowing Club,-

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration the 58th Annual Report and Balance Sheet for the year ending 30th June, 1938.

Your Club was well represented at all major regattas during the season, and was successful in annexing the Junior Premiership for the second season in succession. The points were very close and the result in doubt until the last regatta day of the year. Your congratulations are offered to the runners-up, Melbourne Rowing Club, who improved from a pointless position last season to second place on the list. Your lightweights were largely responsible for the pleasing result achieved. Of recent years this section has been a source of great strength to the Club, and the number of wins recorded is ample proof that there is the pleasure of competitive rowing with the definite prospect of success for even the lightest men attracted to the sport.

Third place on the Senior List shows no advance on last season. It is hoped that the experience gained in this class by men recently promoted will be reflected in results next year. The lack of maiden wins has been most disconcerting. Improvement must be shown in this division to ensure advance of members into higher grades. With a view to future maiden crews, the Committee directs your attention to the new members. The assistance of men with regatta experience with the coaching of novices would be greatly appreciated.

Club races held at fortnightly intervals during the winter months received fair support, and the Seven-Mile Trial attracted a moderate entry. Social functions were mostly successful, the Annual Ball being an outstanding event. Your Committee wishes to record its appreciation of the generous measure of support given to all functions, social or otherwise, throughout the year by the members.

A more detailed account of the Club's activities for the past season is submitted for review.

Financial.

The amount of the Bank overdraft is now £345, which compares with £418 at the close of last season, this despite the fact that upwards of £200 has been spent on new boats.

Income from all sources shows a marked decrease during the past season. Present indications augur well however, as applications for membership indicate that the leeway in subscriptions will be corrected. Your co-operation to this end will be appreciated.

The Committee desires to express its thanks to those members who promptly met their obligations during the year and especially to Mr. M. E. Green, who successfully conducted the November boatbuilding drive, from which £47/10/- was secured toward the purchase of new boats.

The fleet has been increased by one clinker racing eight and one practice eight, and was reduced by one racing pair and one practice four. A new practice four now on order will be delivered early in July.

The racing eight purchased from Messrs. W. H. Jerram & Sons was named the "J. G. Sprigg" after a former captain, who remains actively interested in the welfare of the Club. The same builders supplied the practice eight, christened the "S. C. Macrae" on the 21st May. A practice four was disposed of to Camperdown Rowing Club and the Warrnambool Rowing Club acquired the racing pair, "P. C. Ivens."

It is pointed out that the stroke of any crew is responsible generally for the care of the boat and oars being used. If he ensured that the correct procedure of getting into and out of the boat were observed, and that the boat were steered with a maximum of caution when leaving and approaching the staging, unnecessary damage would be avoided.

Of recent months the fleet indicator board has lost its force. Arrangements have been made to ensure that all matters reported in future will be immediately attended to.

A weighing machine was purchased at the commencement of the year for the convenience of members.

Executive and Committee.

Early in January the Vice-Captain, Mr. H. P. Braddock, resigned his position owing to the pressure of business. Mr. C. H. M. Ward was appointed in his stead. Transferred from the city, Messrs. W. Hillard and D. S. Stirling, resigned from the Executive Committee. Messrs. S. C. Macrae and G. H. Webster were elected to fill the vacancies. Later, when Mr. Macrae was transferred to Western Australia, Mr. D. Morgan was elected to the vacant seat on the Committee.

Rowing.

Empiad and Australian Championships.

The rowing events of the Empire Games were held on the Nepean River at Penrith, during Sydney's sesquicentenary, on Wednesday, 9th February, 1938.

The eight-oared race was won by England from Australia after a magnificent struggle over the full course with New Zealand in third position. Australia defeated Canada in the four-oared event with New Zealand again third. Messrs. S. J. Elder (Albert Park), who rowed in the 3 seat of the four, and M. Gaskin (Albert Park) and J. Suffren (Melbourne), emergencies, were Victoria's representatives at the Empiad. Your Club member, Mr. E. Kenny, acted as umpire for the rowing events of the Games.

The annual eight-oared championship for the King's Cup was held on Saturday, 7th May, at Melbourne, Victoria, all six States competing. Victoria's representatives were: M. Hutton (Richmond) (bow), M. 
He joined the Club in the season 1894-5 after having previously rowed with the Electric Telegraph Club, and with him came another man destined to earn an honoured place in the Club, S. J. Morell, nowadays Sir Stephen, who was President for 28 years. A very close friendship existed between them, and they were associated in many progressive moves for the benefit of the Club.

During the long period of his racing career from 1894 till 1908, Victoria possessed many fine oarsmen. Alex. Sloan stood high amongst them, and was undoubtedly one of the finest strokes Australia has known.

He won 58 races, viz., Championship Four of Australasia, 7 Interstate Eights (he declined selection on 6 other occasions), 8 Championship and Senior Eights, 23 Fours, 16 Pairs and 3 Sculling Races. On eight different occasions he won "double" Senior Four and Pair-oared races at the same regatta.

He was a coach of exceptional ability and did great work for the Club in this direction, both during his active racing career and after he had retired from regatta rowing. His last important success was with the Victorian crew which won at Mannum, South Australia, in 1930. Many members of the Club owe their knowledge of rowing and success in races to him.

For many years he coached the Scotch College crews, and his death will cause sorrow to many old Scotch Collegians. In 1896-7 he

and Sir Stephen Morell brought about the association between this Club and Scotch College, which has since continued so happily.

He was a life member of the Club.

M. S. Macnaughton was a member of the Club for 34 years. He was very highly regarded and formed many friendships among his contemporaries. He had a successful rowing career, and after retiring from regatta rowing, continued to take a keen interest in the Club's welfare.

The passing of these two old members has made a sad break in that band of old members whose continued association with the Club has been of great value to it, and of inspiration to younger members.

A comparatively new member in P. D. Potts was killed in an

unfortunate motor accident towards the close of last year.

It is with regret we record bereavements in the families of Messrs, G. J. Horder, J. D. Macnaughton and E. Barkley. To these gentlemen and the relatives of above-mentioned members we extend your deepest sympathy.
