

### THE SIXTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

### Mercantile Rowing Club

To the Members of Mercantile Rowing Club:

Gentlemen,-Your Committee has much pleasure in presenting the Sixty-fourth Annual Report and Audited Balance Sheet covering

the twelve months ended 30th June, 1944.

The past season has been a most satisfactory one from every point of view. Competitive rowing has been on a greatly increased scale, and your Club was again well represented in all events. Numerous combination races were held, including the Picken-Williams Fours conducted by your Club, for which an excellent entry of ninety-seven oarsmen was received.

Club racing was confined to the Sprigg Time Trial.

Unfortunately it was not possible for a great many members to take full advantage of week-day rowing, but every week-end has

seen a most excellent attendance.

It was very pleasing to see that several of the R.A.A.F. Stations conducted regattas during the year. These events created a good deal of interest, both in and out of the Services, boats and oars being lent by your Club on numerous occasions.

Further enlistments during the year have brought the number of members now serving in the Forces to 165.

Social events were dispensed with for various reasons,

### Financial.

The Committee desires to thank the members for the way that subscriptions have been met during the past season. The amount outstanding, £14/14/-, is the lowest for a considerable period.

Evidence of economy in the Club's finances is shown by the fact that general expenses have been kept down to less than £7-a

good effort.

Repairs to boats, oars and shed are also remarkably low at under £12. This is mainly due to force of circumstances, as at the moment it is impossible to get repairs effected outside the Club. In the past repairs have cost the Club as much as £150.

Insurance, the cost of which to the Club is £44, constitutes a formidable item, but obviously it is impossible to economise in this matter, as the property must be covered. The risk is regarded by

the insurance people as a bad one.

### Executive and Committee.

For the latter half of the season your Captain, Mr. A. Gordon, has unfortunately been absent from the State on war work. Our thanks are due to the Vice-Captain, Mr. J. Blair-Holt, for the capable and enthusiastic manner in which he carried out the Captain's duties.

Messrs. J. C. Thomas and J. McD. Jones enlisted during the year, and we wish to thank these gentlemen for their past services as Committee Members. One vacancy on the Committee was filled by Mr. I. Unsworth.

### Club-house.

The painting of the Club-house was completed early in the season, thanks to Mr. J. G. Sprigg and his enthusiastic band of helpers. The showers, cisterns and spouting were repaired during the year, and your thanks are due to Messrs. S. Sanderson and J. G. Sprigg for arranging for this work to be carried out.

Two rowing machines have been purchased and erected, and it is hoped that full use will be made of this equipment, particularly for the coaching of novices in the early stages of their training.

The sweeping and dusting of the Club-house was carried out by Messrs. K. Bilney, G. Tatnell, J. Shears, W. Shears and others, and

we greatly appreciate this service.

In October considerable loss from a fire in the Boat-house was averted by Melbourne Grammar School boys, who observed smoke issuing from the Committee Room and rapidly extinguished it. Damage was confined to the writing desk and paintwork in the Committee Room.

We wish to record our thanks to those boys for their timely

The desk, which was damaged beyond repair, was replaced by

the insurance company.

The fire was reported to the police, as the circumstances suggested that it may have been lit deliberately.

### Boats and Oars.

Before this war your Club had probably the largest membership of any rowing club in Australia. With such a membership it was necessary to have a large fleet to adequately boat members. The policy of your various Committees for many years has been immediately to repair all damage to fleet and equipment, with the result that your fleet was kept in a very satisfactory condition. Those were the days when boat builders, tradesmen and repairers were handy and a telephone call or message commenced repair work.

For some time, however, it has been impossible to buy new boats or oars, and equally as impossible to obtain skilled tradesmen to effect repairs to our fleet. All repairs must therefore be made by members themselves. Many repairs can only be undertaken by those skilled in the use of certain tools. Messrs. K. Smith, E. K. L. Varcoe and A. Whitford were most helpful in this direction.

Your Committee greatly appreciates all help in boat repair and maintenance, and requests that members capable of using skilfully tools for wood and metal work should contact your Captain with offers of assistance.

A list of the Club's fleet at 30th June, 1944, is set out hereunder:-

Unfortunately only four of the Club's practice boats are at present in commission, so members will readily appreciate the seriousness of damage to equipment. A considerable amount of damage was due entirely to careless handling of boats and oars. The practice four H. G. Taylor was badly damaged, presumably as a result of being dropped, but no definite information is available. It is hoped, however, that repairs may be effected in the near

Obviously the ability to continue rowing depends entirely on the life of the remaining boats and oars. The Committee desires that every member should feel that the Club is his, and treat the equipment accordingly. Some notes on the handling of boats printed as an appendix to this report are commended to members for their

observance in the future.

### Obituary.

It is with deep regret we record the deaths of the following gentlemen, who were prominently associated with the Club:-

### SIR STEPHEN MORELL.

The name of Sir Stephen Morell, who passed away on 6th July, 1944, will always be linked with the Mercantile Rowing Club because of the splendid services which he rendered it from the time of joining in 1891 until his death.

He was one of those who, in association with the late Mr. A. B. Sloan, caused the name of Mercantile to be regarded as one of the leading clubs in Victorian rowing, and, at the same time, laid its foundations in such a way that it has ever since been prominent in any movement for the advancement of the sport.

After a number of years as Vice-President, he was elected President of our Club in 1905, on the death of his predecessor, the late Mr. A. R. Blackwood. He filled this office with great distinction for 28 years. His long term was marked by untiring efforts in the Club's interest, and saw a steady increase in its strength, which necessitated extensions to the Boat-house and fleet, until to-day the Club possesses premises and equipment second to none in Victoria. His retirement in 1933 was consequently a matter for great regret.

Fortunately, however, it did not interfere with the continuance of his interest in the Club's welfare, of which he gave many tangible proofs up to the time of his death.

His activities were not confined to the Mercantile Club, and it is questionable if any other man has done so much for Victorian rowing. In 1936 his fine work, being fully appreciated throughout the State, was recognised by his election as President of the Victorian Rowing Association, an office which he filled with great benefit to all Victorian oarsmen until his death.

His name was perpetuated on the river in 1933 by the renaming of the Anderson Street Bridge as the Morell Bridge.

Sir Stephen was prominent in the Club's crews, and amongst other races was "bow" in the successful Championship Four in 1896, and the Championship Eights in 1896 and 1897. He also won a number of sculling races.

For many years he donated the trophies for the Morell Combination Eights. This event attracted large entries, twenty-two crews on one occasion, and did much to make members of the various clubs known to one another. The Morell Cup, presented by him for competition by Senior Eights at the Rowing Association Regatta, was yet another of his benefactions to rowing.

He was a member of the City Council for thirty-eight years, and Lord Mayor from 1926 to 1928, but these civic honours in no way lessened his interest in the sport which he loved so well. A feature which endeared Sir Stephen to all was the keen personal interest which he took in every member, including beginners. He was always ready to tender advice to them, not only in regard to rowing, but also in their business life. Many owe much to him in this direction.

Thus his death removes from this Club, and the rowing world, an outstanding personality, and one beloved by all.

Our sincere sympathy is extended to Lady Morell and his family, one of whom, Major Rod Morell, has been a member of the Club for many years.

### SIR GEORGE FAIRBAIRN.

The late Sir George Fairbairn was a Vice-President since 1907. He was an outstanding figure in Australian rowing, having stroked the Victorian crew which won the first eight-oared race for the Australian championship in 1878. He was a founder of the Melbourne Amateur Regatta Association (Australian Henley), and was its President at the time of his death. He was for some time President of the Victorian Rowing Association.

### Mr. H. W. T. DAVIS.

Mr. H. W. T. Davis, who died suddenly in London on 17th March, 1944, rowed in the winning Victorian eight of 1895. In the same year he stroked the Mercantile crew which won the Senior Fours at Ballarat and Barwon regattas, and the Victorian Championship. Other members of the four were R. E. Dawson, now of Whittlesea (bow), the late A. B. Sloan (2), and the late H. Lindgren (3). The late Sid. Edwards, who coached many of Mercantile's best crews, said that this was the fastest four-oared crew he had ever seen. Mr. Davis was manager of an insurance company in the Far East for many years, and was actively assisting with the war effort in London at the time of his death.

### Mr. V. F. MASON.

Mr. Mason, one of our foundation members, used to tell how a band of enthusiasts worked every week-end in filling up the swamp which was originally on the site of our present Boat-house.

For a number of years he dropped out of active association with the Club, but when this was renewed in 1934 he displayed keen interest in its welfare, and made many generous donations to its funds.

By his death another link with the early history of the Club is severed, but it is a tribute to the strong hold which rowing takes on those who take an active part in it to remember that his association extended over a period of sixty-three years, and that almost to the time of his death he was hale and hearty.

### Mr. GEORGE LOGAN.

The death of Mr. George Logan, on 14th July, has severed yet another link with the earlier years of the Mercantile Club. Although it is now a number of years since Mr. Logan had taken an active part in rowing, he was formerly prominent in Club crews, and won a number of Maiden, Junior and Senior races. His racing career culminated in his selection in the Victorian crew which competed in the Interstate race at Hobart in 1910. He also competed in a number of contests for the Warehousemen's Boat Race, as a member of crews representing Paterson, Laing and Bruce Ltd., in which firm he rose to be managing director.

Possessed of an unassuming disposition, Mr. Logan nevertheless inspired confidence in all the crews in which he rowed, and was held in high regard, not only amongst members of this Club, but amongst others. His sterling qualities and fine sportsmanship gained for

him many friends.

### Mr. W. BATTEN.

Members of a decade or more ago will recall that Bill, as he was affectionately known to all, was for some time chief custodian of property. Of a bright and pleasing personality, he was happy at all times to repair equipment, as well as taking out novices and other crews. His prompt attention to minor repairs greatly assisted in the fleet and oars being maintained at a high standard of efficiency. Due to his help and interest in essential details, many social activities were very successful, and the Club is poorer for his passing.

### APPENDIX.

### Handling of Boats.

The importance of adopting the correct method of carrying and placing boats in the water cannot be too strongly stressed, as it is certain that a considerable amount of damage to boats can be due entirely to careless handling.

In a rowing club it is of necessity a recognised principle that the stroke is in charge of the crew not only while rowing, but also when taking the boat from the Boat-house to the water and returning it to the racks.

Before attempting to move a boat from the racks it is necessary for the crew to be correctly spaced with bows opposite strokes. In order to avoid undue strain which might ultimately cause structural damage to the boat the word "lift" should be given by the stroke only. Care must be observed when leaving the Boat-house that riggers are not damaged by being knocked against other boats or against the sliding doors. Due to the rise and fall of the tide the staging is frequently slippery, and boats should be turned before this part of the staging is reached. So as to prevent falling or slipping, members should, on approaching the water, see that one foot is always firm against the protruding lateral ridge of the staging. Dependent on the tide crews must walk out into the water before attempting to float a boat.

In placing a boat in the water, each member of the crew should hold the boat with one hand and place the other under the boat, thereby helping it into the water. Before attempting to enter the boat it is necessary for every member of the crew to see that the boat is not only afloat, but that it will float when all members are seated.

There is only one way—the correct way—to get into or out of a boat, and that is by stepping crossways on the keel board or the seat runners, and at the same time placing the hands on both sides of the boat, thereby taking the main weight of the body.

On returning to the Boat-house, unless extreme weather conditions prevail, bow side will get out first and hold the boat for the stroke side. When taking the boat out of the water and returning it to the rack similar care must be taken as when leaving the Boat-house.

In placing the boat on the rack particular attention must be given that no riggers are resting on the racks. The stroke will then nominate a portion of the crew to hose and wash down the boat.

### Oars.

Oars should be taken from the Boat-house prior to placing the boat on the water, and returned after the boat is restored to its rack. They should be placed on the bank, and not stood against trees or buildings where they may easily be knocked down and damaged.

Bow side oars should be placed on the racks provided on the right of the Boat-house, and stroke oars on the left.

Reporting of Damage.—All damage to boats, oars and other property should be reported immediately to the Captain.
