THE SIXTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE

Mercantile Rowing Club

To the Members of the Mercantile Rowing Club:

Gentlemen, - Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting for your consideration the Sixty-sixth Annual Report and Balance Sheet.

The most notable event of the year under review was the successful conclusion of the war, bringing hostilities to an end, and the return to the Club of members from all the Services. Twenty valued and esteemed members will not return. They made the supreme sacrifice.

Your Club was strongly represented at all regattas throughout the season, and finished second in the premiership, being defeated by four points after a determined effort to take the lead at the final regatta of the season, held at Bairnsdale.

The revival of country regatta racing was a pleasing feature of the year's activities. The large attendance of competitors and sup-porters from your Club at Nagambie, Geelong and Bairnsdale is ample evidence of the popularity of these regattas.

The resumption of the Australian Championships at Penrith, N.S.W., was marked by Victoria winning the King's Cup for the first time since 1932.

The Seven-Mile Time Trial for eight-oared boats has once again

become a popular feature of our winter rowing.

A successful dinner to returning servicemen was held in the Club House, and a series of monthly dances at the Palms indicate that the social side of your Club's activities are as popular as ever before.

During the past few months the number of members attending the Club House during the week-ends has shown a large increase, necessitating many of the boats being used twice. With this renewed interest being shown by all members, it augurs well for the prospects of the Club in the forthcoming season.

Financial.

Subscriptions received during the year show a satisfactory improvement, and thanks are due to the members who have met

their obligations promptly.

The cost of repairs (£190) is high, but it must be remembered that over a period of eleven years prior to the war repairs cost £140 annually. During the last four war years the amount was £35, indicating a definite lag. The position as regards repairs is now in much better shape.

Illustrating the high costs for future material, a recent quote in Sydney for an eight-oared boat was £195, which would mean a landed cost in Melbourne of about £270. The moral is that members should exercise the greatest care in handling boats and oars now in use.

Executive and Committee.

Unfortunately for the Club, pressure of business was responsible for the resignation of Mr. D. Palfreyman from the office of Hon. Secretary. Mr. A. Gordon, who then filled the vacancy, shortly afterwards was sent to Japan on a Scientific Mission, once again leaving the office vacant.

Mr. J. H. Clark resigned as Vice-captain, due to his transfer to Darwin, and the duties of the office have since been capably fulfilled

by Mr. A. H. Clarke.

Despite the unsettling changes, the Club functioned efficiently and smoothly throughout the year, thanks to the united efforts of the Executive and the Committee.

Two sets of oars were purchased during the season. Unfortunately, new boats are still unobtainable, and the best use must be made of our present fleet. In order that the fleet may be conserved, all members are urged to exercise the greatest care in handling boats and oars. The stroke of each crew should understand that he is responsible for the care of the boat and oars being used.

Mr. L. Spratling, the boat repairer employed by the V.R.A., has been of great assistance in re-commissioning the fleet, the most noteworthy example being the practice eight, "J. L. Mounsey," which he has practically re-built. The racing eight, "E. Kenny," was converted to swivels during the season, and our thanks are due to Mr. Mephan Ferguson, who made a man available to make and fit the

arms of the riggers.

Coaching.

There was a noted improvement in the number of coaches who made their services available during the season, but in the coming season more crews than for many years past are expected to be training, and members whose racing is past are asked to come and impart the knowledge they gained during their racing careers.

In addition, a cheque for £50 has been received from the Estate of the late Geoff Hastie for the purchase of a boat. Geoff, who was a successful maiden and junior oarsman, and vice-captain prior to his enlistment, was always a keen club man and an energetic executive officer. That his thoughts were of the Club, even as he left Australia on Active Service, is shown by this legacy.

All members will be glad to know that Jack Bailey has now returned home after a long sojourn in hospital, and is recovering from his illness.
