THE SIXTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Mercantile Rowing Club

To the Members of the Mercantile Rowing Club:

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration the 69th Annual Report and Balance Sheet for the year ended 30th June, 1949.

Your Club was well represented in all regattas during the season, and this support was the major reason in the success of annexing the Junior Premiership. In the Senior Premiership the Club was second to Melbourne Rowing Club, the result being in doubt until the Easter Regattas. It is to be hoped that the experience gained in this division will be of benefit during the coming season.

A gratifying feature of the season's results were the successes gained by the Club in State Championship events. Of the nine Title events conducted by the Victorian Rowing Association, your Club was represented in eight of them, and were successful in winning the Champion Fours, Champion Pairs, Champion Sculls and the 2,000 Metres Sculling Championship. To the members of the winning crews and the sculler, we offer our warmest congratulations. The standard of physical fitness attained by the members of the above crews, will, we trust, be a lesson to all active oarsmen in the Club.

The trips by Parlour Coach to Country Regattas have been well supported and those fortunate enough to participate have spoken in glowing terms of the hospitable manner in which they were entertained. At Christmas and the New Year, the Club attended the ever-popular Nagambie, Rutherglen and Yarrawonga Regattas, spending an enjoyable five days at the last-mentioned town. Mildura and Wentworth were the venue for the Easter Regattas. These trips are of undoubted value to the Club, and we heartily commend the regattas at country centres as an unforgettable holiday.

A disconcerting feature of the Season's results was the lack of Maiden crews the Club was able to boat during the latter part of the season. The fact that it has been impossible for the Selectors to boat a Maiden eight since the Upper Yarra and Albert Park Regattas is regrettable for a Club the size of Mercantile. The Committee asks your co-operation in attracting likely young men to the sport, with a view to supplementing future Maiden Crews. The assistance of men with regatta experience for the coaching of these Novices would be greatly appreciated.

The King's Cup, rowed this year at Murray Bridge, South Australia, resulted in a splendid win for the New South Wales crew. By their victory, this crew has earned the right, subject to alterations in the crew by the N.S.W. Selector, to represent Australia at the Empire Games in New Zealand early next year.

An event of major interest to sportsmen throughout the world was the Olympic Games conducted in London during July and August of last year. In the rowing events Australia was represented by a Four and a Sculler. The opposition encountered by the Four proved too strong and they failed to survive their heats. However, the New South Wales sculler, M. T. Wood, after winning the Diamond Sculls at the Royal Henly Regatta, was successful at the Games. To M. T. Wood, we extend our congratulations on his magnificent performance.

Your Club's social activities for the year under review were successful and much appreciated. The thanks of all Members are due to the Social Committee for the efficient manner in which they have conducted this side of the Club's activities.

A more detailed account of the Club's activities for the season is submitted for your review.

Financial

It has been noticeable during the past season that it is becoming increasingly difficult to set aside adequate funds to provide for the replacement of boats and oars. The principal cause of this is that the cost of boats is approximately three times that of pre-war years; in addition, expenditure has risen in respect of boat and oar repairs, the purchase of new oars and other general expenses.

Once again many Members have come to the Club's assistance with generous donations, and these will materially assist in the payment of the new boats now on order. However, it must be realised that such an expedient is not a permanent solution to the financial problems confronting your Committee, and that a more liberal policy of fleet replacement is impossible whilst the Club is handicapped by such difficulties.

The Committee wishes to draw your attention to the amount of money spent in repair work, and to stress the fact that it is in your own interests to take particular care of your Club's property. Even after taking into consideration the age of the fleet, which necessitates the spending of a considerable sum on repairs to keep the boats in order, these accounts would be greatly reduced if Members were a little more mindful of the preservation of boats and cars.

It will be noted that the Best and Best eight "R. V. Gregg" has disappeared from the list of the Club's fleet; this boat was sold during the season to the Dimboola Rowing Club.

Although no new boats have been added to the fleet since the last report, a number of new boats are on order. Due to unavoidable delay, delivery of the Racing Eight and Four on order from Messrs. Geo. Towns & Sons have not yet been effected. However, it is hoped that these will be available for the commencement of the 1949/50 Regatta Season. During the year, orders were placed for an additional Racing Eight and for two Tub Fours. Delivery of the Eight, which is on order from Mr. G. Green, of New South Wales, is expected during the latter part of next year, and at least one of the Fours, which are on order from an Adelaide firm, will be available before the end of the year.

The work of converting the fleet to swivels has been continued and, with the conversion of the "J. G. Sprigg" at the commencement of the season, the Club was in the fortunate position of having its entire racing fleet swivel rigged.

At the commencement of the season, a conference of coaches was held to lay down a uniform style for the coaching of crews. A copy of the notes of the style agreed on at this conference is appended at the conclusion of this report for the information of all Members.

Rowing

Australian Championships

7th May, 1949.

The Australian Eight-oared Championship for the King's Cup was rowed at Murray Bridge, South Australia, all six States competing. New South Wales had a comfortable win in this event from Western Australia, with Victoria a close third.

Victoria was represented by W. Wallace (Mercantile), Bow; H. P. Shears (Mercantile), 2; J. King (Essendon), 3; S. Thomas (Corio Bay), 4; M. Christie (Melbourne), 5; L. L. B. Moll (Mercantile), 6; T. Hoffman (Corio Bay), 7; J. Goddard (Melbourne), stroke; D. R. Salmon (Corio Bay), cox; J. Mulcahy (Melbourne), coach; with V. Davies (Melbourne) and M. Davis (Banks) as emergencies.

The Sculling Championship was held on the same day and was won by M. T. Wood (N.S.W.), with Victoria's representative, J. Williams, in second place.

We extend our congratulations to the New South Wales coach and crew for retaining the King's Cup for the second year in succession, and to M. T. Wood on his fourth successive victory in the Sculling Championship.

Your Club was represented in interstate rowing by W. Wallace (bow), H. P. Shears (2), L. L. B. Moll (6) and by J. Williams, who was Victoria's representative in the sculls; in addition, Mr. J. South, a Member of your Club, was one of Victoria's Selectors. To these gentlemen we extend our heartiest congratulations.

STATE CHAMPIONSHIP EVENTS.

Champion Fours.—This event was conducted on the Lower Yarra on 18th December, 1948, Mercantile winning from Melbourne, with Corio Bay in third place. 2000 Metre Sculling Championship.—Rowed downstream on the Lower Yarra and, after a close race, resulted in a narrow win for J. Williams (Mercantile), from J. Webster (South Melbourne).

Champion Junior Eights.—Rowed over a 2-mile course on the Lower Yarra on 26th March, 1949, attracted an entry of four crews. The Essendon crew was successful from Mercantile and Corio Bay. Obituary

It is with great regret that we have to record the death of Mr. T. W. (Tom) Marsh, a Member of 35 years' standing. While Mr. Marsh was not well known by our younger Members, he was held in high esteem by his contemporaries, both in the Mercantile, and in other rowing clubs.

A man of particularly kindly nature, he enjoyed the friendship of kindred spirits in all walks of life, and the large attendance at his funeral was evidence of this.

He was a great supporter of this Club until ill-health limited his activities, but he always had its interests at heart. Perhaps a better tribute to him could not be made than by saying that his memory will live in this Club just as actively as that of his contemporary and close friend, the late Jim Watson, whose name is so frequently heard when older members are recalling events of bygone days.

Synopsis of Style

- 1. The Seat: Sit on the buttocks (not on the "Tail") in an upright, comfortable position, adjust the stretcher so that when the slide is full forward it will just touch the front chocks, giving full use of the slide. When the slide is back, the legs should be hard down at the finish. Sit square, plant the feet square, and set the hands square.
- 2. The Grip of the Oar: The hands should be a hand's space apart, with the inside hand gripping firmly but not rigidly, and the outside hand only a light grip, the inside being the controlling hand throughout the stroke.
- 3. The Position of the Catch: When the slide is right forward there must be no over-reaching or lunging down over the toes or stretcher. The bodies should be firmly braced—not rigid—with the head erect. Keep the knees just outside the upper part of the arms. The blade of the oar should be rowed into the water well ahead of the poppet or swivel. Feet braced firmly on the stretcher.

- 4. The Catch and Drive: A quick grip of the water with an instantaneous drive from the stretcher which combines both body and legs, this drive being continued throughout the stroke so that the blade comes through in one piece.
- 5. The Finish: Begin to bend the arms just before you finish the swing back, rip the hands home to the body as firmly and as fast as you can, the root of the thumb against the ribs, with hands, body and legs finishing together. The elbows should pass close to the sides of the body, which should pass the perpendicular. Finish by bringing hands to the body, not body to hands.
- 6. The Recovery: Holding the legs down firmly, drive the hands down and out over the knees with a smooth action. Bring the shoulders over smartly, following the hands, until the shoulders are just past the perpendicular.

The shoulders having been brought into the right position, the slide forward is commenced. Continue to swing the body forward from the hips, controlling both slide and body on the recovery—

- (1) By keeping the feet pressed against the stretcher.
- (2) By pressing the button of the oar against the poppet.
- (3) Too much emphasis cannot be placed on the steady forward.

It is essential to take the last part of the slide forward and the body swing very slowly in order to build up for the hard catch and drive. Raise the hands gradually while swinging forward, keeping the blade of the oar close to the water. Turn off the feather gradually when nearing the end of the swing forward. Throughout the recovery keep the body relaxed but upright, particularly when about to take the catch. The body should swing from the hips straight forward and backwards along the line of the keel. The moment the slide touches the front chocks, spring back off the stretcher.

GENERAL: Perfect timing is essential—in together and out together. Aim to keep the blade perfectly square and just covered from the catch to finish.

The drive should follow the catch so quickly that only one movement is apparent, otherwise there will be a break in the stroke. At the finish, the dropping of the hands down and out, and the shoulder action up past the perpendicular should be blended so as to appear as one movement and the body recovery a natural easy motion without any conscious effort and must be free and easy. The length of the stroke forward should be as long as possible without over-reaching.

At the finish avoid swinging so far back that it is a decided effort to bring the shoulders up again to the perpendicular.

The first requirement of a good crew is *Condition*, and it is the responsibility of each man in the crew to attain the high standard of physical fitness required to win races. It is essential that you pay particular attention to your conduct out of the boat when in training.
