## THE SEVENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## Mercantile Rowing Club

To the Members of Mercantile Rowing Club:

Gentlemen,

In presenting to you the Seventieth Annual Report and Balance Sheet it is pleasing for your Committee to report that your Club has completed one of the most successful seasons in its long history. The standard of rowing, particularly in the Junior division, has been of a high order.

The winning of both the Senior and Junior Premierships has emulated the feat of the Club in its Jubilee Year. This distinction, of winning both premierships on separate occasions, equals the fine record of Albert Park. Richmond has won the double once, in the season 1935-36.

The past season has been a record one in the number of victories attained, and it is worthy of note to mention that in seventy-one starts your Club was successful in winning thirty-four races. The Club ushered in the season with six wins at V.R.A. and Henley, and a perusal of the list of your representatives at the different regattas will show that large entries were sent to practically every fixture throughout the season. Three Championship Honours were won, viz., The Champion Fours, Champion Junior Eights, and the Champion Lightweight Fours.

Throughout the season Mercantile has been fortunate in having the services of a number of promising young members. With these, and other young men, we can look forward with confidence to the coming season. It is to be hoped that the successes of the past season will encourage others to swell the ranks of the self-sacrificing coaches.

The trips by coach to the country regattas were a great success, and the participants had a most enjoyable time. The Christmas Regattas, at Nagambie, Yarrawonga and Rutherglen, are increasing in popularity among the members. The hospitality of the Rowing Fraternity is never seen to greater advantage than on these occasions.

A large number of oarsmen and supporters attended other regattas, paricularly Ballarat and Barwon. The flooded condition in Gippsland rivers at Easter caused the Bairnsdale Regatta to be abandoned, and the Club did not send any of the large number of crews in training to compete in the Sale Regatta, which was held on a \$\frac{1}{2}\$-mile course on Lake Gutheridge.

The review of the rowing at the Empire Games shows that the Australian oarsmen achieved a remarkable feat in winning four of the five events which were held. The Australian Eight-Oared

Championship resulted in a win for the excellent New South Wales representatives, with Victoria second. The Sculling Championship for the President's Cup was won by M. T. Wood, the Olympic Champion, with Victorian representative, R. V. Rawlins, one foot away in second place.

The social activities of the Club this season were again very successful, and the thanks of all members are due to the Committee which organised these activities.

A more detailed account of the activities of the Club for the season is submitted for your review.

## Financial

The rising costs are increasing the difficulties which rowing clubs face. The increase in subscription fees helped the financial position of your Club considerably; but even with this increase it is difficult to finance the replacements of boats and oars. Many generous members have helped materially by donations, and although this cannot be considered a stable source of finance, year by year these donations have overcome many problems. It is of interest to note that the V.R.A. is also finding the current costs a big problem. Recently the rules of the Association were amended to meet the expense of representation in the King's Cup and the President's Cup races each year.

It will be seen from the Financial Report that a large amount of the year's expenditure has been for the purchase of new craft and oars. A Tub Four has cost the Club over one hundred pounds, while the purchase of oars is also expensive, as a set of ten, purchased in Sydney, cost forty-seven pounds.

The repair work carried out at working bees helps keep down the amount of money spent on repairs to your Club's property. The age of many of the craft necessitates a heavy repair bill—but members who use the fleet can reduce these costs by careful use of equipment.

The amount of outstanding subscriptions this year is larger than usual, and members are urged to help the Treasurer by paying their dues early in the season.

## **Executive and Committee**

It was unfortunate that his transfer to the country was responsible for the resignation of Mr. D. Crichton from the office of Honorary Secretary.

Noticeable absentees from the above list are the Tub Four, R. T. Rush, and the Clinker Pair, R. A. Cooper. These boats were sold to the Yarrawonga Rowing Club in December, 1949.

At the conclusion of the King's Cup race, the Best and Best racing eight, "Westralia," was purchased from the Western Australian Rowing Association. Our priority for a racing eight from Messrs. G. Towns and Sons has been transferred to the W.A. Rowing Association as part of the purchase conditions of the "Westralia." A racing eight, which is on order with Mr. G. Green, of Sydney, should be made available shortly. The Tub Four "N. W. Cairnes" was a new boat purchased from Mr. H. Lounder, in Adelaide. Orders have been placed for more new craft, and the possibility of obtaining bondwood tub pairs is being investigated.

## Coaching

Much of the success of our crews this year has been due to the members who have coached during the season. The Club is indebted to these gentlemen, and it is hoped that those who have benefited from coaching in the past will consider it an obligation to coach others during the coming season.

Members who have taught beginners the fundamentals of the sport have done excellent work, and, like the coaches of racing crews, have sacrificed much in order to carry out this work. These gentlemen have organised a team to coach beginners on week day evenings during the winter period.

## Rowing

## The British Empire Games — 1950

The success of the Australian Oarsmen of the Empire Games, held in New Zealand recently, was of great interest. Four of the five events which were held were won by the Australian representatives. Our congratulations are extended to this contingent which represented your country.

The only Victorian competitors, Messrs. J. Webster and W. Lambert, won the race for Coxswainless Pairs, very comfortably. The successful New South Wales eight in the 1949 Australian Championship won the Empire title for eight-oared craft by one foot from New Zealand. Olympic Champion, M. T. Wood, won the Single Sculls event, and, with W. Riley, also won the Double Sculls race. The Haberfield four, which won the test race at Ballarat, was not successful in the four-oared event, which was won by the New Zealand crew.

Mr. E. Kenny, a member of your Club, was Rowing Manager at the Games, and Mr. H. Wilkes, a former Mercantile member, was General Manager. The success and harmony of the Australian contingent speak volumes for the ability of these gentlemen.

## British Empire Games Test Races

A Four-oared Test Race was held at Lake Wendouree on Saturday, 3rd December, 1949. Your Club was represented by G. I. Holyman (bow), P. M. Macpherson (2), L. L. B. Moll (3), R. R. Aitken (stroke), W. Bailey (cox), C. Saleh (coach). They won their heat and in the final were third to Haberfield.

The Coxswainless Pairs Test was held on the Nepean River in N.S.W. Your representatives, W. L. Wallace (bow), and H. P. Shears (stroke) were unsuccessful.

## Australian Championship

6th May, 1950.

The Australian Eight-oared Championship for the King's Cup was rowed on the Lower Yarra course. This race resulted in a win for the excellent New South Wales crew, which completed the course 56½ seconds faster than the previous record time. The Victorian crew, which finished second, four lengths behind New South Wales, rowed excellently.

This crew comprised: W. Wallace (Mercantile), bow; A. Kingsbury (University), \(\Sigma\); M. Christie (Melbourne), \(3\); L. Moll (Mercantile), \(4\); D. MacGlashin (University), \(5\); L. Weber (University), \(6\); G. Barrett (University), \(7\); I. Everist (University), stroke; A. Bennett (University), \(\cox\); R. Aitken (Mercantile) and J. Hibben (Preston), emergencies; R. Todd, coach.

The Sculling Championship for the President's Cup resulted in a win for M. T. Wood, with Victorian R. Rawlins one foot away in second place. This race was 1 minute 38.3 seconds faster than Cecil Pearce's record of 17 min. 8.5 secs., established in 1938.

To the successful crew and coach who won the Championship for New South Wales for the third successive year, to Mr. Wood, who won the President's Cup for the fifth successive year, and to Duncan Brown, a former member of your Club, who coached the Queensland crew, we extend our sincerest congratulations.

Congratulations are also due to Lawrie Moll and Bill Wallace, who gained a seat in the Victorian crew; to Bob Aitken as emergency, and to Messrs. J. South and C. Saleh, who were King's Cup selectors.

## State Championship Events
