THE SEVENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Mercantile Rowing Club

To the Members of the Mercantile Rowing Club:

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration the 71st Annual Report and Balance Sheet for the year ended

31st May, 1951.

It is gratifying to be able to report on the success achieved by the Club in senior rowing during the past season. The promise indicated in the senior and junior ranks over the past two years has been fulfilled this season, and at the conclusion of regatta racing for the year, the Club was in the fortunate position of having sixteen

men who had won senior races during the year.

Of the seven senior eight-oared races during the season, your club was successful in five. These races included the Gilbey Cup at the V.R.A. Regatta; the Grand Challenge Cup at Henley, after an exciting dead-heat with Melbourne University; and the Champion Eights of Victoria, which the Club succeeded in winning for the first time since Season 1935-36. It was not until the Ballarat and Barwon Regattas, when your representatives were defeated by narrow margins by Corio Bay, that your Club suffered its first reverse for the season in senior eight-oared races.

Another feature worthy of note in regatta racing, was the fact that in addition to winning the double senior eight at V.R.A. and Henley Regattas, the Club was also successful in annexing the Junior Eight double on the same programme, a feat rarely achieved

in the history of these regattas.

The success of so many members in senior ranks during the year has seriously depleted the number of men eligible to row in junior races, and, during the latter half of the season, your selectors were often hard pressed to muster sufficient members to boat Junior, Maiden and Lightweight crews. In the Junior Premiership your Club finished fourth to Banks, Ballarat and Richmond, whilst in the Lightweight Premiership we had to be content to finish second to Ballarat.

As mentioned, the Club is in the fortunate position of having a number of senior oarsmen from which to select crews in the coming season. However, it is necessary to build up the ranks of Junior, Maiden and Lightweight oarsmen, both to achieve success in these divisions and to ensure that a reserve is built up from which senior crews may be filled in future years. With this in view, the Committee requests the co-operation of all members in attracting likely young men

to the sport.

Country Regattas have again been well supported and members who made the trip at Christmas and the New Year to attend Nagambie, Yarrawonga and Rutherglen Regattas and at Easter to Mildura and Wentworth Regattas have reported a most enjoyable time at each of these towns. These trips are of undoubted value to the Club and your Committee heartily commend the Regattas at country centres as a memorable holiday.

The King's Cup, rowed this year at Brisbane, resulted in a win for New South Wales, from Victoria and Western Australia. The Australian Sculling Championship for the President's Cup was won by Mr. M. T. Wood, World Amateur Champion, with Victorian representative, Mr. R. V. Rawlins in second place.

Your Club was particularly well represented in the Victorian crew as, in addition to the Coach and Coxswain, five of your members rowed in the crew, whilst another of your number was one of the emergencies. To all of the above your congratulations have been

extended.

Two events of importance to Australian rowing have occured during the past year. In August last Mr. Merv. Wood of New South Wales visited the United States of America and successfully defended the Philadelphia Gold Cup against J. Kelly (America) and A. Rowe (England). In January last an eight-oared crew, comprised of N.S.W. oarsmen, successfully represented Australia at the Christchurch Centennial Games and the New Zealand Championships. On each of these occasions this crew convincingly defeated a combination representing the University of California. Your congratulations have been conveyed to all concerned on so successfully placing Australia to the forefront of world rowing.

The thanks of all members are once again due to the Social

Committee for conducting this side of the Club's activities during the past season. It was however a great disappointment to all con-

cerned that so few members supported the Club's Annual Dinner.

A more detailed account of the Club's activities for the season

is submitted for your review.

Financial

Subscriptions received for the past season have shown a

satisfactory increase over previous seasons and the Committee has pleasure in thanking members for prompt payment.

The slight decrease in the item "Repairs to Boat, Oars and Shed" is due to the excellent work carried out by the working bee parties during the winter months. It is to be hoped that more of our members will come forward to lend a hand in reconditioning the float during the coming winter winter.

____ It will be noted that the Club has paid £167/14/- to the Victorian Rowing Association this year, as against an average of £43/16/- over the previous five years. This amount represents 6/6 per head for Capitation Fees, 2/- per head for the Olympic Levy and £60 for your representatives in the King's Cup crew. This and many other expenses necessary to run a Club the size of Mercantile is proving a heavy burden to the Club's finances.

Once again our thanks are due to those members who have helped us considerably with their generous donations.

It will be noted that several craft have disappeared from the list of the Club's fleet during the year. The clinker racing eight "E. Kenny" was sold during the season to Huonville Rowing Club, Tasmania; the two practice fours, "A. P. Miller" and "H. G. Taylor" were disposed of to the Warnambool Rowing Club, and the Tub Four "S. Guinn" was sold to the Mercantile Rowing Club, Tasmania. In addition to these craft, the best and best eight "S. J. Morell" is also listed as being for sale and at the time of this Report being placed in the hands of the printer, negotiations were still proceeding for the sale of this boat. It will also be noted that the clinker racing eight "A. R. Shannon" has disappeared from the list of the Club's fleet; it has been decided to scrap this craft for the salvage of fittings, this course being more economical than the sale of the boat outright.

Two new boats have been added to the fleet since the last Report, and a number of new boats are on order. The best and best racing eight "Westralia", purchased from the Western Australian Rowing Association at the conclusion of last season, was renamed the "Deane Morgan" and made an auspicious debut by being successful in the first five races in which it competed. Early in the year the Club took delivery of a new tub four from H. Lounder of Adelaide, which was subsequently christened the "E. K. Varcoe", this craft has also proved a welcome addition to the Club's fleet.

During the season orders were placed with Mr. Lounder for three new tub pairs and an additional tub four. Delivery of these boats is expected to commence early in the new season. The Club also has on order from Mr. G. Green of Sydney a new racing eight and racing four, and from Messrs. Geo. Towns & Sons a new racing four; however, due to shortages of labour and materials, delivery of these craft is still indefinite.

Coaching

The Club is indebted to the following gentlemen who have devoted so much time to the coaching of crews during the season: Messrs. H. B. Burke, N. W. Cairnes, G. B. Johnson, L. L. B. Moll, D. J. Morgan, J. N. Robertson, H. P. Shears, J. D. Shears and E. C. White. It is unfortunate, both from the point of view of the individual and the Club, that the number of coaches available have been so few and that so many of the Club's crews were forced to train, either coached on a part time basis, or with no coach at all. One instance of this was at Upper Yarra and Albert Park Regattas when, with only four crews competing, regular coaching was available for only one of these crews for the full period of their training. The importance of good coaching for crews cannot be too greatly stressed, and it should be the duty of every member, so fitted for the task, to coach at least one crew during the season.

To Messrs. A. G. Lindblade, F. R. Browne and other members who, during the year, have given so much to the teaching of novices, we extend our thanks and at the same time regret that they are so few in number.

Rowing

Australian Championships

5th May, 1951

The Australian Eight-oared Championship for the King's Cup was rowed at Brisbane, all six States competing. This race resulted in a win for New South Wales, whose representatives were almost identical with the crew that defeated the University of California at Christchurch in January last. The Victorian crew rowed extremely well to finish second, one length behind New South Wales and two lengths in front of Western Australia, who were placed third.

Granowski (Mercantile), 6; T. Hoffman (Corio Bay), 7; R. R. Aitken (Mercantile), stroke; W. Bailey (Mercantile), cox; N. W. Cairnes (Mercantile), coach; with W. Craig (Mercantile) and N. P. Everist (Corio Bay) as emergencies.

The Sculling Championship for the President's Cup was held on the same day and was won by M. T. Wood of New South Wales, from R. V. Rawlins of Victoria.

To the successful New South Wales crew, who won the Championship for the fourth successive year, and to Merv. Wood who won the Sculls for the sixth successive year, we extend our sincerest congratulations.

It will be noted that your Club was particularly well represented in interstate rowing by W. L. Wallace (bow), H. D. Duncan (3), D. Olliff (4), W. O. Granowski (6), R. R. Aitken (stroke), W. Bailey (cox), N. W. Cairnes (coach), and W. Craig (emergency); in addition Mr. J. South, a member of your Club, was again one of Victoria's Selectors. It is many years since the Club was so well represented in an interstate crew, and to all the above gentlemen we extend our heartiest congratulations on well merited honours.

Obituary

During the past season two prominent members of former years have passed away, viz., Mr. T. F. Brennan, and Mr. Horace E. Stevens.

Mr. Brennan's association with the Club extended over no less than 68 years. He joined it in 1893, and at the time of his death was one of our Vice-Presidents. During that long period he saw the Club grow from a modest beginning to its present status, and was associated with such enthusiasts as Sir Stephen Morell, Alex Sloan, Percey Ivens, and those other stalwarts who did such great work in establishing the Club on the sound foundations on which it has been built up.

His active rowing career was cut short when he joined the Victorian Railways about 1896, where he used to be Chief Accountant, but he rendered fine service to the Club as Hon. Treasurer, which office he filled most capably for a number of years. On his retirement from this office he was the Club's Hon. Auditor for an extended period, and was succeeded by Mr. F. R. Browne.

During his many years as Vice-President, although an infrequent visitor to the Club, he still maintained his interest in it, and his name figured regularly on the list of Donors.

His death removes yet another of the pioneers of the Club, to whom present day members owe so much.

Mr. Horace Stevens started his rowing career with Essendon, from which Club he transferred to Mercantile early in the present century. He had a successful career with our Club, chiefly in association with Mr. L. Jones, including the Stewards' Challenge Cup at Henley on the Yarra in 1906. Later he returned to Essendon, whose colours he carried when he won the Championship Sculls of Victoria in 1910-11 and 1911-12 seasons.

On the outbreak of the 1914-18 War he joined the A.I.F., and was in England at its termination. He remained there for a number of years, and had a successful career as a bass-baritone, being regarded as one of the world's best singers of Oratorio. On his return to Australia, he devoted himself entirely to a musical career. He was associated with the choir of St. Paul's Cathedral from boyhood days almost to the time of his death, was a distinguished conductor, and was highly regarded as a Tutor at the Victorian Conservatorium of Music. His contemporaries in rowing circles still recall with pleasure the great enjoyment afforded by his fine singing at their social functions. It is safe to say that he has never been equalled in this connection.

Addendum

It is my privilege to express to the Executive Officers and Committee of the Club, the sincere appreciation and thanks of members for the excellent manner in which they have managed the affairs during the past season.

We were fortunate in again having Mr. Deane Morgan as Captain, and Mr. Herb. Shears as Vice-Captain. Both have served the Club splendidly in their respective offices during the past four seasons, and their experience and sound judgment have been largely responsible for another successful year.

They were well supported by Mr. W. Morrison as Hon. Secretary, and Mr. Ron Richardson as Hon. Treasurer, and by a young and enthusiastic Committee.

While we were not successful in winning two Premierships, as was the case in 1949-50, it is satisfactory to have secured the Senior Premiership by the handsome margin recorded in this report. It will be seen that the Club also made a good showing in the Junior Premiership, and the newly established Lightweight Premiership.

Our thanks are due to those members who have done such excellent work in the coaching of crews, particularly to Mr. Norman Cairnes, who had a most successful season. Starting off with winning the "double" Junior Eight at V.R.A. and Henley regattas, he followed this up with the "double" Senior Eight at Upper Yarra and Albert Park regattas. Then came a fine win in the Championship Eights. His appointment as coach of the Victorian crew for the King's Cup, was the culmination of a very successful season's coaching, and a fitting reward for the great amount of time and enthusiasm he devoted to his task. In addition to coaching, Mr. Cairnes has most capably filled the office of Assistant Hon. Secretary of the V.R.A., and of Joint Hon. Secretary of the Henley Regatta, in association with Mr. Roy Thursfield.

To those members who trained so conscientiously in their respective crews, our sincere thanks are due.

In recent years the lack of boatbuilding firms in Melbourne has made it necessary for essential repairs to the fleet to be done by members. In this, our Club has been fortunate in the excellent work done by a small band of enthusiasts, headed by Mr. L. Moll. Additions to the number of workers will be welcome.

I would specially draw the attention of all members to the reference in this report to the necessity of building up our strength in the Maiden division. While our position as regards Senior oarsmen is very satisfactory, rowing history has repeatedly shown that to be content with success in Senior and Championship races has had the effect of slackening interest in regard to Maiden men, and can easily bring about serious repercussions in any Club. Therefore the assistance of all members in this direction is strongly urged, not only in securing recruits, but by taking a personal interest in coaching them, so that they can soon take their places in Regatta crews, and thus maintain the Club's prestige.
