# THE SEVENTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

### OF THE

# MERCANTILE ROWING CLUB

### To the Members of the Mercantile Rowing Club:

#### Gentlemen,

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration the 73rd Annual Report and Balance Sheet for the year ended 30th April, 1953.

In reviewing the activities of the Club for the past year, it is gratifying to be able to report that, so far as regatta racing is concerned, the season has been the most successful in the history of the Club. A number of records have been established during the year, the most outstanding of these being the winning of all three Premierships conducted by the Victorian Rowing Association. This is the first occasion in the history of the Association that a Club has achieved this distinction.

Another performance of note was your Senior Eight's third consecutive victory in the Grand Challenge Cup at Henley. This event has not previously been won more than two years in a row by any one Club. Your Senior Eight went through the season undefeated for the second year in succession, winning on each occasion from Melbourne University, which was a new combination at the beginning of the season and improved consistantly throughout. The races won by your eight included the Victorian Eight-Oared Championship, when the Norwich Shield was taken for the third successive year. At the conclusion of the season, Senior Eights representing your Club, had won thirteen races in a row, breaking the record of successive wins established by the Yarra Yarra Rowing Club in the latter part of the last century, and equalled by Mercantile in Seasons 1921-23.

In other divisions also, crews representing the Club met with unprecedented success. The calibre and enthusiasm of crews racing is indicated by the fact that during the season, from eighty-seven crews started at regattas in all events, ranging from Novice to Senior races, no less than forty-six crews were successful.

At Melbourne and Henley Regattas, the most important on the rowing calendar, your Club recorded five and four wins respectively and thus almost equalled the performance of the previous season, when five crews were successful at each of these regattas. In addition to the Senior Eight double, your Club at these regattas, won the Senior Fours, Junior Eights and Lightweights Fours on both days, whilst the Maiden Eight was successful at Melbourne Regatta and only defeated by a narrow margin at Henley. During the year, the Club was successful in winning the Champion Eights, Champion Fours, Champion Junior Eights and Champion Lightweight Fours. With the success of so many crews in all divisions, your Club may look forward with confidence to further success in Junior and Senior ranks during the forthcoming season. However, if the Club is to maintain a prominent position in Victorian Rowing, it is necessary to build up the Maiden Division, whose ranks have become seriously depleted by the success of so many crews during recent seasons. Your Committee appeals to all members to assist in this direction by introducing new recruits to the Club. It is today's Novice and Maiden Oarsmen who will form the nucleus of future Senior crews.

During the year, Country Regattas have continued to maintain their popularity with both oarsmen and supporters. All members who attended the Christmas and New Year Regattas at Nagambie, Yarrawonga and Rutherglen reported a most enjoyable trip. Similar reports were received from members who competed at the Easter Regattas at Mildura and Wentworth.

The season was concluded in a most satisfactory manner for the Club and Victorian Rowing when, in Perth, the Victorian crew retained The King's Cup for the second successive year. This crew, which was one of the best ever to represent this State, gave an outstanding performance to defeat New South Wales by one and a half lengths. Once again, your Club was particularly well represented in the crew.

An event of major interest to sportsmen throughout the world was the holding of the Olympic Games at Helsinki in July last. In the rowing section of the Games, Australian oarsmen proved themselves to be in world class by finishing third in the eights, second in the single sculls and acquitting themselves well in the only other two events in which they competed.

The thanks of all members are again due to the Social Committee, and in particular Mr. Deane Morgan, for conducting this side of the Club's activities so successfully during the past season. The greatly increased attendance at the Annual Dinner was most gratifying to the organisers.

A more detailed account of the Club's activities for the season is submitted for your review.

### Financial

The Club's finances have again caused your Committee much concern during the past season. As shown in the Balance Sheet, the high cost of maintenance of the Club House, boats and oars, and the increase in price of new equipment is the principal reason for the shortage of funds.

Since 1939, the price of a racing eight has risen from  $\pm 120$  to  $\pm 525$  today, as against this and corresponding increases in the cost of other new equipment, the subscription for a Senior Member has risen only 33 per cent. over the same period. Your Committee however, was reluctant to recommend an increase in subscriptions, and it was decided instead to charge a fee of 10/- per season to all members using a locker in the Club House. In this manner it is hoped to avoid, at least temporarily, an increase in subscriptions, which would involve members, who do not actively use the Club House, in extra expense.

Early in the coming season it will be necessary to meet the cost of the new racing eight purchased from Messrs. Geo. Towns

& Sons and also the cost of the re-build of the practice eight, "S. C. Macrae", which is at present being carried out. It is estimated that the expenditure on these two items will approximate £750, over and above the normal expenses of running the Club. To assist in meeting these expenses, it would be appreciated if all members would endeavour to pay their subscriptions at an early date.

It will be noted that two boats have disappeared from the list of Club's fleet during the year. The racing four, "A. L. Dobbie", which was nearing the end of its useful life, was donated to Lake Colac Rowing Club, following the loss by that Club of its entire fleet by fire in January last. Members will be interested to learn that this boat, after an extensive overhaul, was used with success by Colac at the Ballarat and Barwon Regattas. The tub pair, "A. G. Lindblade", was sold to the Colac High School during the season.

Two new boats have been added to the fleet since the last report. A best and best racing four was acquired from Messrs. Geo. Towns and Sons just prior to the Melbourne and Henley Regattas. Christened the "R. R. Aitken", this boat proved a most satisfactory and welcome addition to the Club's fleet, winning numerous races during the season.

The other new craft, a racing eight, was also built by Messrs. Geo. Towns and Sons. Unfortunately, this boat was not delivered until early May, and therefore it was not possible to make use of it at regatta races during the year. However, this craft, which will be christened "J. T. Dunstan", will undoubtedly be a most valuable acquisition during the coming season.

With these two latest additions to the fleet, your Club is in the fortunate position of having a first-class racing fleet, consisting of two pairs, two fours and two eights, all of which have been built in the post-war years.

With the position regarding tub boats also satisfactory, your Committee has been giving consideration to replacing some of the older practice eights in the fleet. Accordingly, an order has been placed with Messrs. Geo. Towns and Sons for a practice eight. Delivery of this boat is expected during July, 1954. In addition, the practice eight, "S. C. Macrae", has been placed in the hands of Mr. A. Sykes, of Geelong, for an extensive rebuild. It is hoped that when this is completed, the boat will be the equivalent of a new craft.

The Committee has been greatly concerned at the amount and the seriousness of damage occurring to boats and oars during the past season. Whilst a certain amount of this damage has been unavoidable, most of it has been due to carelessness on the part of members using the equipment. Your Committee requests all members to exercise more care in the handling of boats and oars in the future and so avoid costly repair bills, which the Club can ill afford at the present time.

# Coaching

The outstanding success of the Club's crews during the past season has been made possible only by the fine work of the Club's coaches.

Whilst all coaches have done an excellent job, special mention must be made of Messrs. N. W. Cairnes and H. P. Shears. Throughout the year, both of these gentlemen have devoted practically all of their leisure time to the coaching of crews. In 1952, Mr. Cairnes successfully coached the Victorian crew to victory in the King's Cup race at Penrith, and this year Mr. Shears has emulated this feat by being in charge of the Victorian crew which was successful in Perth. The Club has indeed been fortunate in having available the services of two men, possessing the skill required to coach crews to victory in the King's Cup.

Öther members who have rendered valuable service as coaches are: Messrs. D. J. Crichton, D. A. Calder, R. G. Day, J. G. Farmer, J. Hiscock, A. B. Kohn, B. Lochtenberg, D. J. Morgan, R. J. Oliver, G. A. Robertson, J. N. Robertson, J. D. Shears, and T. W. Shears. To all of these gentlemen, we offer our congratulation on the excellent results they have achieved during the season, and trust that they will be able to continue with their valuable assistance during the coming year.

To members who, during the year, have given time to the teaching of Novices, we extend our thanks. In this regard, particular mention must be made of Mr. A. G. Lindblade, who for many years has always been ready to give the benefit of his experience to new members.

# Rowing

# XVth Olympiad — Helsinki

The principal sporting event of the year was the Olympic Games, held at Helsinki, in July, 1952. At the majority of sports at which her athletes competed, Australia had reason to be proud of her representatives' performances. This particularly applies to rowing, as whilst no crew was successful in winning a coveted gold medal, Australian oarsmen returned with one silver medal and nine bronze medals.

In the eight-oared event, the Australian crew, despite an injury to a member of the crew which severely hampered them throughout cheir races, finished an excellent third to U.S.A. and U.S.S.R. Australia's representatives were substantially the same crew as the New South Wales crew, which the Victorians convincingly defeated at Penrith in May of last year.

In the Single Sculls, M. T. Wood reached the final despite an injured arm, but finished second to the Russian representative. In the Coxswainless Pairs and the Double Sculls events, Australia's representatives were defeated in the repecharge after creditable performances.

# Australian Championships 18th April, 1953.

The Australian Eight-Oared Championship for the King's Cup was rowed at Perth. With the exception of Queensland, all States were represented. The race was won by Victoria, who led for most of the

race and finished magnificently to defeat New South Wales by one and a half lengths. Western Australia were six lengths further back in third place, with Tasmania and South Australia following in that order.

Victoria was represented by: W. L. Wallace (Mercantile), bow; B. J. Doyle (Mercantile), 2; J. Hall (University), 3; W. O. Granowski (Mercantile), 4; P. N. Everist (University), 5; N. Howell (Preston), 6; A. G. Barrett (Mercantile), 7; R. R. Aitken (Mercantile), stroke; W. M. Bailey (Mercantile), cox; H. P. Shears (Mercantile), coach; J. S. Rowe (Mercantile) and J. Harwood (Footscray City), emergencies; and D. J. Morgan (Mercantile), manager.

On the same day the Sculling Championship for the President's Cup was held; this event resulted in a win for P. Evatt, of New South Wales, with R. V. Rawlins (Victoria) in second place.

Your congratulations are conveyed to the successful Victorian crew, who won the Championship for the second successive year, and to P. Evatt on his victory in the President's Cup at his first attempt.

It will be noted that your Club was again particularly well represented in Interstate rowing by W. L. Wallace (bow), B. J. Doyle (2), W. O. Granowski (4), A. G. Barrett (7), R. R. Aitken (stroke), W. M. Bailey (cox), H. P. Shears (coach), J. S. Rowe (emergency) and D. J. Morgan (manager). To these gentlemen we extend our heartiest congratulations on well-merited selection and a magnificent victory.

With the annexing by your Club of all three Premierships conducted by the Victorian Rowing Association, it is of interest to quote some facts and figures pertaining to this unique feat.

Whilst Mercantile, with over 250 members, is numerically the largest in the State, only 52 members, or slightly more than 20 per cent. of the total membership, competed in Regatta races of all descriptions during the Season. Throughout the year the Club was represented by eighty-seven crews in all types of races and sculling events. Of these no less than forty-six crews, or 53 per cent. of crews started, were successful.

In the winning of the Senior Premiership, twelve oarsmen represented the Club during the Season, all of whom were successful in winning races. In Junior and Maiden races twenty-four oarsmen were responsible for all races won in the Junior Division; of these seven members also won Lightweight events. It will be seen therefore that a total of only forty oarsmen were responsible for races won by the Club in all Divisions during the Season.
