The Eighty-Fourth Annual Report

of the

Mercantile Rowing Club

To the Members,

Gentlemen,

Your committee has pleasure in submitting to you the 84th Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 30th April, 1964.

The season now concluded signified the return of the Club to supremacy in Senior rowing, the Premiership being won by the easiest of margins. In the Lightweight section we were relegated to second position after holding the Premiership for three consecutive years. Third placing was gained in the Junior competition.

Senior eight-oared rowing got away to a good start with an easy victory in the Two and one Half-Mile Championships. This success was continued by convincing wins over Banks in the pre-Christmas regattas. During this period a Senior Four raced without defeat and a Senior Pair operated with some success. Unfortunately, the Senior Eight Championships brought a reversal of the record when Banks narrowly defeated our crew.

By Christmas, an unbeatable points score had been amassed and with the exception of Henley, we were unable to attract a crew to race the Senior Eight. Thereafter Senior rowing was confined to two fouroared crews who met with limited success.

In the Junior division, it is pleasing to record that for the second year wins were obtained in the Beginner and Novice classes at the Winter Regattas. Many of the competitors here later achieved success in Maiden ranks. Junior class crews themselves were a disappointment, a Junior Four recording one victory early in the season and a Junior Eight competing unsuccessfully after Christmas. We are not proud to record that from Christmas time to the conclusion of the season, only three races carrying Junior points were won, the last being the Novice Eight at Wentworth Regatta.

Lightweight rowing was highlighted by victories in the Victorian Eight-oared, Four-oared and Pair-oared Championships, by the inclusion of six members in the winning Penrith Cup squad and finally by a splendid victory in the Australian Eight-oared Championship, thus maintaining our undefeated record in that race. Our second placing in this Premiership was gained with only five wins during the season.

Following the December Championships, the King's Cup and Penrith Cup squads were selected. The Club was honoured by the inclusion of Messrs. D. H. Boykett, R. P. Lachal, G. A. McCall, D. E. Norwood and M. G. Tomanovits in the King's Cup squad and Messrs. D. Palfreyman, E. J. Smith, J. J. Wylie and G. Xouris in the Penrith Cup squad, with Mr. W. N. Wallace as Coach and Mr. C. Fordyce as Cox. The success of these crews at Penrith is well known and details of all races appear elsewhere in this report. This year the King's Cup race was virtually a test race for Olympic selection as were several of the races held at the Australian Championships on Lake Burley Griffin, Canberra, in April and May. At this latter regatta, our Senior Coxless Four elevated themselves to Championship status and gained the right to represent Australia at Tokyo. Our crew here consisted of Messrs. P. L. Gillon, S. H. Newcomb, R. J. Garrard and A. M. Walker, ably coached by Mr. K. A. Bilney. At the time of writing, the Australian Olympic Federation had not met to select the Australian team. However, we very much hope that in the Coxless Four. Mercantile will have achieved its first representative Australian crew.

With this crew and our members of the winning King's Cup crew, your Committee at this stage feel justly proud of the result of the twoyear plan to have as many members as possible compete at Tokyo.

However, whilst certainly feeling proud of these results, your Committee has maintained its constant attention to the future of the Club. Having special regard to the relative failure of our Junior division oarsmen in the past season, and the ever increasing age of our active Senior oarsmen, a Recruiting Sub-committee has been formed. The main object of this Sub-committee will be to attract recruits who have previous rowing experience. In this way it is hoped to proceed to increased representation at the 1968 Olympic Games, and if possible, at the 1966 World Rowing Championships.

A more detailed account of the Club's activities is submitted hereunder for your review:----

This is a further increase over last year's record membership. During the year 57 new members were admitted, in the following categories: Senior 20, Junior 34, Country 1 and Associate 2. There were also several transfers from one type of membership to another. Overall membership, however, has increased only by two following the acceptance of six resignations and the writing off of a large number of unfinancial members. The decrease in the number of Junior members from the previous year has, of course, mainly been caused by the number who attained the age of 21 years and were transferred to the Senior list. However, only 34 Junior members were elected this year against 45 in the previous year.

Therefore, the call is again made to members to introduce as many young persons as possible to the Club in the ensuing year.

Financial

As members will have observed from the Notice of Meeting, the Committee is recommending that the Annual Subscription be increased from the commencement of the 1965-66 season. The committee has taken this decision with great reluctance, but it is satisfied that an increase is essential in the best interests of the Club.

Although the year's accounts show a small surplus of $\pounds 21$, it is apparent that this has resulted partly from reduced expenditure on new boats and repairs and partly from the usual substantial receipts from social functions and members' personal donations. It is obvious that the Club's fixed running expenses will not become less, and as the age of the Boathouse increases, expenditure on maintenance of it may be expected to rise, quite apart from the increasing cost of repairs to the fleet.

More important, however, is the situation of the fleet itself. Your Committee has estimated that, with a carefully planned replacement programme, an average annual expenditure of £950 will be necessary to maintain the existing fleet in its present condition, and this is not regarded by the Committee as wholly satisfactory from the point of view of either the age of the boats or their state of repair.

In addition, the Club now enjoys the largest membership in its history, and during both the racing and winter season it has become apparent that the existing fleet of racing and tub boats is inadequate to meet our requirements. Quite apart from maintaining the existing fleet therefore, the Committee feels that it must take steps to increase it.

With this in mind, the Committee has decided that it is essential to provide an increase in the annual subscription revenue of approximately £500, which is what the higher subscription is estimated to produce after allowing for removal of the locker fee and possible loss of members.

A consideration of the latest quoted prices for racing boats and oars which is as follows:---

We have also had a Coxless Racing Pair on hire from the Victorian Rowing Association.

In January, 1964, your Committee were pleased to make the "Lloyd Williams" available to the King's Cup crew for training and racing at an extremely low hire fee. The "J. H. Picken" was also used by the Penrith Cup crew. Following the hire of the "Lloyd Williams", the Club had insufficient craft to boat all eight-oared crews and had no alternative but to hire a boat from the Albert Park Rowing Club for a period of eight weeks.

Following the National Regatta, "The Morell" was sold to the Australian National University Boat Club. Earlier in the year the tub pair "F, R. Browne" was sold to Yarrawonga Rowing Club.

During the year two sets of oars were received, one set from Geo. Towns & Sons Pty. Ltd. and the other from Sargent & Burton Pty. Ltd. Neither set have proved satisfactory and are now incomplete. Late in the season a racing pair was received from Sargent & Burton Pty. Ltd. This boat is fitted with the coxswain's seat in the bow and has already met with racing success. The Committee have decided to call this boat "Keith Bilnev".

The fleet as it stands is in good order, the newer tub boats having been completely overhauled during the latter part of the season.

Full strength of the eight-oared fleet will be regained in September next, when Messrs. Geo. Towns will deliver a racing eight. An order has also been placed with that firm for a racing four for delivery at the same time, and this will give the Selection Committee the long wanted fourth racing four.

Coaching

We are deeply indebted to the following members for their services as coaches during the season, and trust that they have been rewarded by the efforts of their crews:--Messrs. W. S. Arnold, K. A. Bilney, D. H. Boykett, N. W. Cairnes, M. J. Farmer, H. R. Frederico, S. G. Richardson, J. C. Thomas, W. N. Wallace, P. K. Watkin and Dr. L. S. Williams.

Of these, Messrs. K. A. Bilney, M. J. Farmer and W. N. Wallace distinguished themselves in coaching Australian Champion crews and we congratulate them on this achievement. Mr. J. C. Thomas has continued his good work in the Beginner, Novice and Maiden ranks, and already the results of his efforts are being seen in the more senior crews.

Your Selection Committee have been again forced to boat many uncoached crews during the season, and appeal to more of the retired members to interest themselves in the most rewarding work of coaching next season.

Rowing

AUSTRALIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS, 1964

This year two Australian Championship Regattas were held, the first on the Nepean River, Penrith, N.S.W., and the second on Lake Burley Griffin, Canberra, A.C.T.

King's Cup Regatta, Nepean River, Penrith

The King's Cup race was conducted in heats and repechages on Friday, 20th March, 1964, with the final of the King's Cup, President's Cup and Penrith Cup on Saturday, 21st March.

Details of the races are as follows:-

KING'S CUP.—The crew was B. J. Vear (Banks), bow: D. H. Boykett (Mercantile), 2; R. P. Lachal (Mercantile), 3; D. Ramage (Banks), 4; P. M. Guest (Banks), 5; G. A. McCall (Mercantile), 6; M. G. Tomanovits (Mercantile), 7; T. R. Davies (Banks), stroke; K. Wickham (Banks), (cox); A. N. Jacobsen (Banks), coach; and C. J. Lehman (Banks), emergency.

Victoria won the heat from South Australia by five lengths, recording fastest time of the day. Other finalists were New South Wales, Queensland and Western Australia, who had won the repechage.

At the start Victoria and New South Wales, both rating in the midforties, broke away from the field, and it was soon obvious the winner would come from these two. Maintaining a long stroke and a lower rating, Victoria moved away from N.S.W. and at 1,000 metres had over half a length lead. Toward 1,500 metres a three-quarter length lead was held and Victoria appeared comfortable in front of a rushed N.S.W. crew. With 300 metres to go N.S.W. increased rating to 44 strokes per minute and made a slight impression on Victoria. Then, with a well timed sprint, Victoria raised rating to 42 and sprinted home to win by three-quarters of a length from New South Wales, with Western Australia some lengths back in third position.

PRESIDENT'S CUP. — The Victorian representative was Mr. P. Edwards of the Melbourne Rowing Club.

This race was very close up to the 1,000 metres, with the Tasmanian sculler holding a slight lead from Victoria, with Queensland closeup. Between this point and 1,500 metres Victoria overhauled the Tasmanian and went away to a win of one and a half lengths.

PENRITH CUP.—The crew was P. McC. Doyle (M.U.B.C.), bow; G. Xouris (Mercantile), 2; J. J. Wylie (Mercantile), 3; D. Palfreyman (Mercantile), stroke; C. Fordyce (Mercantile), cox; W. N. Wallace (Mercantile), coach; and E. J. Smith (Mercantile), emergency.

For the first time in the history of this race all States were represented. The start, Victoria take a slight lead, rating 38 over N.S.W. and W.A. Victoria drop rating to 34 and swing out to a long stroke. N.S.W. pass at 40. At 300 metres W.A. take lead of $1\frac{1}{2}$ lengths from N.S.W., with one length back to Victoria. Other States falling well behind. Going to 1,000 metres, W.A. and N.S.W. maintain high ratings, with Victoria third on 35. At 1,250 metres Victoria move up. N.S.W. have caught W.A. 1,400 metres, Victoria now with N.S.W. and increase rating. W.A. now lying third. 1,500 metres, Victoria commence final sprint and at 1,900 metres have one length clear of N.S.W. Victoria now rating 39. W.A. close up. Five strokes to go Victoria falter, but hold N.S.W. (42) to win by three feet, with W.A. three-quarter length further back in third position.

This was a magnificent day for Victoria. No State had ever before won all three Australian Championships on the one day. Our congratulations are extended to the eight and their coach, who becomes the sole Australian selector for the eight-oared crew for Tokyo; and to the Four and Sculler on their victories.

Second Australian National Regatta and Test Races for the Olympic Games

This regatta was conducted in heats, repechages, semi-finals and finals on April 30th. May 1st and 2nd, 1964, on the new Lake Burley Griffin, Canberra, A.C.T. The lake filled only in the week before the regatta, and the course, when calm, proved quite satisfactory.

The Club was represented by a Coxless Four, two Coxless Pairs, a Coxed Pair and a Lightweight Eight.

Details of the races are as follows:-

COXLESS FOUR: The crew was A. M. Walker, bow; R. J. Garrard, 2; S. H. Newcomb, 3; P. L. Gillon, stroke; K. A. Bilney, coach.

This crew impressed in their heat when they started at 49 and broke away from the field by one and a half lengths by 300 metres. In their semifinal they were defeated by Leichhardt-Colleagues but qualified for the final. In the final their high rating start assisted them to a one and a half length lead by 850 metres, where the course passed under a bridge. This bridge presented some difficulty and the lead was taken by Leichhardt-Colleagues. However, the crew were not accepting defeat and increased rating and gradually drew level about 250 metres from home. Rating 42, our crew fought out the finish with the Leichhardt crew and won by 0.3 seconds or approximately three feet.

COXLESS PAIR No. 1.—The crew was G. G. Willis, bow; F. S. McArthur, stroke. This crew, which trained uncoached on Lake Bolac and travelled long distances thereto, performed creditably. Unfortunately they were defeated in their heat and repechage.

COXLESS PAIR No. 2.—Th crew was A. Leadley, bow; G. H. Boykett, stroke; D. H. Boykett, coach.

This crew was also defeated in heat and repechage.

COXED PAIR.—The crew was A. Leadley, bow; G. H. Boykett, stroke; C. Gilmour, cox; D. H. Boykett, coach.

They were defeated in heat and repechage.

LIGHTWEIGHT EIGHT.—The crew was T. Hogan, bow; H. P. Green, 2; J. P. McDavitt, 3; G. G. Smith, 4; A. Fox, 5; G. Xouris, 6; J. J. Wylie, 7; D. Palfreyman, stroke; C. Gilmour, cox; M. J. Farmer, coach.

Their race was a first and final. The crew established a lead of threequarters of a length from a high rating Sydney Rowing Club crew prior to the 500 metres. By 1,500 metres a full length was held, and from there to the finish another length was added, the winning margin being 7 seconds.

State Championships

The Championships for Eight-oared, Four-oared and Pair-oared Crews were in the last season divided between the Lower Yarra and Ballarat courses. The Senior Eights, Junior Fours, Lightweight Fours and Senior Sculls were held at Ballarat on Saturday, 14th December, 1963; the Senior Fours, Junior Eights and Lightweight Eights on the Lower Yarra on 15th February, 1964; and Senior, Junior and Lightweight Pairs on the Lower Yarra on Saturday, 4th April, 1964.

Conditions for all Championships were very good.

Eight-Oared

Daffy (cox), H. R. Frederico (coach). The Banks crew got away at the start and half-way through had three-quarters of a length lead. Our crew fought back, and in a thrilling finish were defeated by the narrow margin of three feet.

JUNIOR.—Our crew was I. C. Watkins (bow), G. W. Richardson (2), G. Bird (3), M. S. Lorimer (4), P. M. Gibbs (5), G. H. Boykett (6), B. B. Gross (7), B. C. Sierakowski (stroke), A. C. Thomas (cox), H. R. Frederico (coach). This crew finished in third position.

LIGHTWEIGHT.—The crew was R. Weatherhead (bow), K. Nicholas (2), T. Hogan (3), J. Davidson (4), E. J. Smith (5), G. G. Smith (6), A. Fox (7), H. P. Green (stroke), C. C. F. Tweedie (cox), N. W. Cairnes (coach). This crew dead-heated with Richmond. In the re-row they asserted their superiority by one and a half lengths.

Your Club entered five crews in this event, which was again successfully conducted by the Hawthorn Rowing Club. Our No. 1 crew gained second placing in the Open Section with a time of 33 mins. 23.2 secs.
