# The Eighty-Eighth Annual Report of the Mercantile Rowing Club

#### To the Members.

Gentlemen.

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting to you the 88th Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 30th April, 1968.

Once again, the Club has had a very successful season, although perhaps not quite up to the standard of last season. Club crews retained Victorian Senior Eight, Junior Four, and Lightweight Pair Championships and also gained the Australian Champion Senior Four, Junior Eight, and Lightweight Eight titles at the 4th National Regatta. The Senior and Junior Premierships were won by your Club, but unfortunately Barwon proved to be too consistent in competition for the Lightweight Premiership. Our congratulations to Barwon Rowing Club for winning both the Lightweight and Country Premierships for 1967/68.

During the season, an Australian Rowing Team consisting of an Eight, Pair and Sculler, toured New Zealand and competed in a series of Test Races. Your club was represented by G. A. McCall (coach), R. Garnsworthy, R. Garrard, M. McKenzie, P. Renouf, V. Mulder with B. Morrison (cox), and in the Pair by R. P. Lachal.

After an extremely close finish between New South Wales and Victoria in the Coxed Fours event during the Test Races, the Mercantile-Melbourne University Boat Club Composite Four was finally selected as Australia's representative to compete at the St. Catherine's Regatta, Canada. The crew, coached by Hugh Frederico, was bow: S. M. Gillon (Mercs.); 2, J. R. Harry (M.U.B.C.); 3, D. G. A. Douglas (Mercs.); stroke, G. H. Boykett (Mercs.); cox. T. C. Daffy (Mercs.). The crew won convincingly at St. Catherine's, and also won the North American Championships. In Vichy, France, the Four put up a good performance in the European Championship. Upon its return, the crew broke up, and was re-formed about a month or two before the Australian National Championship Regatta, held at Murray Bridge, S.A., in May, 1968. The Four won its event, which was nominated as a Test Race for Mexico Olympics Selection, but unfortunately was not included in the squad announced by the A.A.R.C.

The 1968 King's Cup Regatta was rowed on the Nepean River, Penrith. N.S.W., on 29th-30th March. The regatta was to be held on Lake Wendouree, Ballarat, but due to the severe drought conditions experienced throughout the State, a suitable waterway could not be provided in Victoria. New South Wales and Victoria therefore, exchanged the dates on which they were scheduled to host the King's Cup, and Victoria will now hold the King's Cup in 1970.

The 1968 King's Cup was again won by a fine crew from New South Wales. Your Club was represented in the Victorian Eight by G. H. Boykett (stroke), S. M. Gillon (7), D. G. Douglas (6), H. Doerner (bow), with T. C. Daffy (cox). The crew was coached by Hubert Frederico, D. Palfreyman was emergency.

The Penrith Cup for Lightweight Fours was won by New South Wales, and the President's Cup for Sculls was won by Queensland.

A squad for the Mexico Olympics has been announced by the A.A.R.C. and it consists of the New South Wales King's Cup Crew, and the winning Coxless Pair at the National Regatta. The squad emergencies are B. Shirlaw and D. G. A. Douglas of your Club.

As in the past, a sub-committee led by your captain, has campaigned vigorously to recruit new members to our ranks. These efforts have been a feature in the expansion of the Club in recent years.

The Committee is concerned about the condition of the Clubhouse and a special sub-committee has been investigating proposals for additions and alterations to improve the facilities and accommodation, and the means of financing such an undertaking.

In this regard, discussions have been taking place with one of the Public schools, with a view to financing the additions for the mutual benefits of both your Club and the school.

#### Financial

The Club's financial statements for the year disclose a small deficit after allowing \$2,087 for depreciation of the fleet and other assets.

Revenue showed little variation but, once again, the casual approach of members to their obligations to the Club is reflected in the large amount of subscriptions and entry fees which it has been necessary to write off and the balance of entry fees and subscriptions outstanding at the end of the year. A substantial amount of the entry fees written off is due to the scratching by the Club of crews entered in regattas and subsequently unable to start, partly the result of the increased number of regattas now held and our own Club's higher active membership.

The support of members for the facilities provided in the South West and North East Corners is reflected in the donations and sundry income. Unfortunately, other social functions were not well patronized and contributed little to Club revenue.

During the year, the only expenditure on new equipment was the sum of \$780 for the new pair and \$250 for six oars.

As a result of this, the Bank overdraft was reduced by some \$1,000. The higher figure for Sundry Debtors is due to the fact that, at the end of the year, the annual payment from Brighton Grammar School of \$400 and the Social Committee donation of \$500 had not been paid to the Club's account.

Members must realize that the present basis of revenue and expenditure scarcely provides sufficient funds to meet the minimum fleet replacement programme adopted by the Committee. It allows nothing for major repair and renovation of the Club's premises, the need for which becomes yearly more apparent.

Your Committee has under consideration proposals for major extension and rebuilding, perhaps in conjunction with one of the Public Schools. When these come to fruition, the Committee will look for, and confidently hope to receive, generous support from all members of the Club. Meanwhile, early and willing payment by members of their commitments will greatly assist the Committee in its task.

The only addition to the fleet in the past season was a new racing pair "Bill Bradshaw", built by Messrs. Sargent & Burton Pty. Ltd. A set of six 12'5" Ayling oars were purchased in the early stages of the season.

As yet, no firm orders have been placed for any new equipment for delivery prior to the beginning of next season, but at the time of this report going to press, consideration was being given to the ordering of another boat, under the boat replacement programme adopted by your Committee.

The pre-season maintenance on the fleet was carried out enthusiastically, with special attention being given to the Tub boats. However, as the season progressed, failure on the part of crews to carry out the necessary routine preventative maintenance, led to many breakages and a general deterioration of the standard of the fleet. Members are urged to report damage or breakages of equipment to a member of the Boats and Oars Sub-Committee, or to the Captain.
