The Eighty-Ninth Annual Report of the Mercantile Rowing Club

To the Members,

Gentlemen,

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting to you the 89th Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ending 30th April, 1969.

The Club has had a most successful season, despite a marked decrease in the number of races won during the season. Club crews again retained the Victorian Senior Eight and Junior Four-Oared Championships and in addition won Lightweight Eight and Junior Scull Championships.

A crew from the Club also won the New South Wales Junior Eight-Oared Championship.

The Club secured the Senior and Junior Premierships, but once again Barwon convincingly won the Lightweight Premiership. The Country Premiership was won by Corio Bay. Our congratulations go to both these clubs.

Following the Test Race rowed at Murray Bridge in May, 1968, Mercantilian David Douglas was selected in the Olympic Squad training from Sydney Rowing Club. David subsequently went on to row in the four seat of the Eight-Oared crew which won the Silver Medal for Australia at Mexico. Our congratulations go to David and the members of this crew.

Our congratulations also go to David Ramage and Paul Guest for their commendable performance in the Coxless Pairs event at Xochimilco.

The 1969 King's Cup Regatta was rowed at Bundaberg, Queensland, on 25th and 26th April.

The King's Cup was won by Victoria. Your Club was represented in the Victorian Eight by J. Shanasy (2), G. H. Boykett (stroke), S. M. Gillon (7), D. G. Douglas (6), G. Godkin (cox). The crew was coached by D. H. Boykett.

The Penrith Cup was won by New South Wales. Your Club was represented in the Victorian Lightweight Four by P. H. O'Brien (stroke), T. J. Hogan (3), R. W. Connolly (2), M. Owen (cox). The crew was coached by P. J. Downey. The President's Cup for Sculls was won by Tasmania.

Recruiting this year has been significantly lower than in previous years and a feature next season will be an intensive campaign to recruit new members to our ranks. This campaign is being organized by a small sub-committee led by your Captain.

The Committee has approved in principle a scheme for the financing and construction of alterations to the front section of the Boathouse and work will commence on these alterations immediately. Details concerning the re-building are given later in this Report.

Financial

During the past year the Club's Revenue Account showed a surplus of \$480 compared with a deficit of \$153 in the previous year. This small improvement was due almost entirely to the increase in donations which in turn was largely the result of the enthusiastic work of the recently formed Ladies' Committee. If income from such sources, totalling in all, \$1,800, is disregarded it is once again only too clear that our subscription revenue is just not sufficient at present levels to provide for running expenses and for essential replacement of the fleet.

This is a situation which in the view of your Committee cannot be allowed to continue, but proposals to increase the subscription have been deferred pending the development of a project for major renovation of the Club House to which reference was made last yar. This project has now reached the stage at which it will shortly be submitted to members in detail and your Committee will be recommending to members increases in the subscription rates which will adequately cover both the maintenance of the fleet and the financing of the Club House plans.

In view of the substantial rise in the cost of all services and of new equipment these increases are inevitable. If we are to provide for present members and those who follow on a Club House and fleet of which Mercantile can be proud it cannot be done on a shoestring.

The complete fleet is operational and generally in fair condition.

No firm orders have been placed for any new equipment prior to the commencement of the 1969/70 season, but is recommended by the Boats and Oars Sub-Committee that a new eight be purchased during the coming season in accordance with the boat-replacement program adopted by your Committee.

Additions to the fleet this season include a new racing four 'The First Lady' built by Messrs. Sargent and Burton. This boat was donated by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Club and to these hard working women we extend your sincere thanks.

A speedboat was completed this season mainly due to the efforts of Warwick Hutchins and materials donated by Mr. Miles Gillon. The boat seemed to be appropriately named 'Miles and Miles'.

Two sets of oars were purchased from Sargent & Burton this season, i.e.:

10 x 12'-2" Oars. (Construction for Lightweight Oarsmen.) 10 x 12'-4" Oars. (Senior Crews.)

Mr. K. H. Boykett has generously donated \$300 towards the purchase of a set of English Ayling Oars.

The Racing Eight "Lloyd Williams" was sold to a syndicate of Club Members for their Sunday morning rowing and the syndicate allows the Club the use of the boat at most other times.

Mr. Jim McKeown has been the backstay of maintenance on the fleet, and most Saturday afternoons during the season one would see Jim and

the occasional helper looking after the Club's interests in the total maintenance of our enormous fleet.

Younger members should be ashamed of their efforts in this respect during the season, and I would predict that unless all members participate in maintenance work on the fleet before the commencement of the 1969/70 season, the fleet will show a rapid permanent deterioration.

Jim has also been responsible for a re-organization of the Boathouse Store which now contains all the material, paint and hardware lines necessary for maintenance of the fleet—all the Club needs now is YOU to do the hard work.

Simon Newcomb chaired the Sub-Committee this year which attended to many small matters during the year.

The facade of the shed was re-painted, the shower area walls re-lined, and considerable repairs undertaken envolving the tiled roofs, guttering and downpipes.

Brighton Grammar School generously donated a series of new oar-racks at a time when considerable damage was being done to oars left on the floor of the shed due to insufficient rack space.

The Club is to be fumigated against borers and rodents sometime between now and the commencement of the next season and members will be given approx. a month's notice to clear their lockers.

The major problem of cleanliness of the changing rooms appeared to be overcome by the rostering of racing crews to clean the premises each Sunday morning before rowing.

OBITUARY

SQUADRON LEADER A. H. G. CLARKE, D.F.C., M.B.E.

With the untimely death of Hugh Clarke on 7th September, 1968, at the age of forty-eight years, the Club lost one of that loyal band of members whose continuing enthusiasm and loyalty have over the years shown what the Club has meant to them and what it can mean to those who come after them.

Hugh joined the Club as a Junior Member in 1938 following in the footsteps of his father, Alex Clarke, who spent a lifetime in the Club, the last thirty years of it as Treasurer.

Hugh's rowing career, interrupted by five years of distinguished service with the R.A.A.F., culminated in his selection in the Victorian crew which won the first post war King's Cup race at Penrith in 1946.

He was active also in Club administration and served as Captain in the 1946-47 season. Upon the death of Frank Brown in 1952, he accepted the position as Auditor, in which capacity his co-operation and advice have over the years proved invaluable.

Hugh was a man of wide and varied interests not only in the accounting and commercial fields but also in charitable activities, particularly those associated with the Air Force. For these services, he was honoured in 1966 by the award of Membership of the Order of the British Empire.

Despite all these many activities, Hugh still found time for rowing, for the Club and for its members, and there are many who from time to time have had cause to be grateful for his unobtrusive assistance. Hugh was a Mercantilian and all who claim that honour have lost a staunch and loyal friend.
