## The Ninety Fifth Annual Report

of the

## **Mercantile Rowing Club**

#### To the Members,

#### Gentlemen,

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting to you the 95th Annual Report and Financial Statement for the year ending 30th April, 1975.

All members will be pleased to know that despite difficulties over the past two years in the re-construction of the Boathouse, the Club was successful in winning the Lightweight Premiership for the second successive year. This result was due to the dedicated preparation and training of the coach, Martin Tomanovits, and crew members Ian Duthie, Michael Fudge, Dick Garrard, Andrew Guerin, Michael Kerin, Martin Owen, Bob Richardson, Glen Robertson-Smith, Tony Spriggins, Rod Stewart, with Tim Ling coxswain, who were unbeaten throughout the season who, in addition to winning five lightweight eight races at V.R.A. Regattas, won the Lightweight Eight-Oared Championships of Victoria, New South Wales, South Australia and the Australian National Championship.

Senior rowing in Victoria was seriously disrupted by the premature selection during September, 1974, of a State Squad for training for the 1975 King's Cup race held in April, 1975, resulting in a number of Clubs being deprived of their senior oarsmen and the V.R.A. permitting the boating of composite crews contrary to its rules.

It is interesting to note of the 11 points won by the Club in the Senior Premiership, seven points came from wins in the single sculls by Ken Leach in the early part of the season and Peter Benjamin in the second half of the season. Peter Benjamin being finally selected to represent Victoria in the President's Cup race for the Australian Championship.

Mercantile was represented in the State Team which competed in the Interstate Championships in Queensland by Paul Guest (coach). Andrew Withers (6), and Bruno Romanin (emergency) in the King's Cup crew; Peter Benjamin, Single Sculls for the President's Cup, and in the Lightweight Four with Cox, which won the Penrith Cup, by Peter Philp (coach) and Tim Frederico (coxswain).

The Lightweight Four later competed in the National Championships, as a Lightweight Four without Cox, winning the event and selection to represent Australia at the World Championships at Nottingham. England, later this year, defending the Lightweight Four without Cox in which this crew won the Gold Medal at Lucerne, Switzerland, in 1974.

We congratulate our members on their State selection and wish them continued success in the future.

The Lightweight Four without Cox earned the congratulations of all Australian oarsmen in winning the World Championship in 1974 and will carry our good wishes to the World Championships, 1975.

Bill Liley and Bob Richardson of Melbourne University have been selected in the Eight-Oared Squad and we wish them and all Australian crews and scullers success in the World Championships, 1975. Early in the season a Victorian Colts Eight was selected under the coaching of Phil Cayzer to tour New Zealand, the squad consisting of A. Sloan, S. Dherrifs, S. Webster (Mercantile): R. Widmer, D. English, M. Ross, R. Renou, cox (Melbourne University); M. Manley, D. Worthley (Monash University); C. Wilson (Power House) and A. Withers (Melbourne Grammar). Although not winning in the tour, the crew aquitted itself well and we congratulate the members on their selection and performance.

It is most satisfying to be able to report that the Contractor has now completed the work on the Clubhouse under his contract and the members are putting the finishing touches to the project in painting, fitting the gymnasium, sauna and cleaning up and finalising small jobs which we undertook to keep the cost of re-building to a minimum at a time of high inflation.

#### **Finance and Boathouse**

The Income and Expenditure Account again shows a satisfying surplus. This result is largely due to transfer from the Social Account, reflecting support by members, and particularly the Sunday morning oarsmen, of the facilities offered by the Club and the functions conducted by the Social Committee. In addition the Club received nearly \$4,000 in interest on insurance monies on temporary deposit. No rental was received from Brighton Grammar School during the year as the premises were not available to the school. In addition the Club paid \$600 to Melbourne Rowing Club for temporary use of its premises during the year.

The surplus of nearly \$7,000 has been applied either directly in payments connected with the new building or in transfer to the Building Fund. The cash position was further improved by limiting purchases of equipment to a set of oars, an outboard motor and other minor items, the total cost of which did not absorb the depreciation allowance included in the accounts.

Donations by members and friends of the Club to the Building Fund exceed \$11,000, making total direct contributions of nearly \$22,000 since the fire two years ago.

Expenditure on the new building during the year totalled more than \$66,000. As members will be well aware the delay in commencing the building resulted in substantial increases in the contract price negotiated in October, 1973, and the Club was compelled to re-negotiate the contract on a rise and fall basis. The support of the members under the quite remarkable leadership of Ted Sorani has enabled the Club to save substantial amounts in various aspects of the contract and certain parts of the work, notably the ground floor concrete slab, the concrete columns, steel rigging, roofing, floor sanding and painting have been entirely carried out with Club labour. The Club is indebted to those members such as Ken Hume, Ron Negri, Warwick Hutchins, Russell Sherwood and others who made available their own time and that of their organisations to assist in the work.

It is difficult to express the appreciation which the Club owes to Ted Sorani and his many helpers. It is disappointing that the cash savings resulting from their work have largely disappeared in cost increases, but your Committee now believes that with the balance of funds on temporary deposit and an overdraft limit of \$25,000 we should be able to complete the building as planned ,install a limited number of lockers and a sauna bath. It is fair to say that without the help of Club labour on the job, this could never have been achieved. What of the future? The expenses of running the Club will increase and the cost of equipment continues to rise. The Club has negotiated with the Bank to pay off the overdraft by half-yearly instalments of \$1,250, including interest, a very satisfactory and generous arrangement on the part of the Bank.

At the present subscription rate normal rental, including rental from Brighton Grammar, will barely cover outgoings, and as in the past the Club must look to donations from members and to support of the Club's social activities to replace and improve the fleet and facilities which the Club hopes to offer its members.

## OBITUARIES

#### J. HARVIE PICKEN

Harvie Picken joined the Club in the early years of this century and for a number of years was a regular attendant competing in regatta and Club races. Shortly after winning a senior eight in the early 1920's, he found that business commitments did not allow him sufficient time to train for racing, and he became for many years a regular week-end rower. For a number of years he was associated with the Picken-Marsh Combination Eights, and on the death of the late Tom Marsh he joined with the late M. S. Williams in sponsoring the Picken-Williams Combination Eights.

Harvie took a keen interest in Club matters and was a generous donor to affairs of the club. With advancing years and failing health, we rarely saw him in recent years, but he retained his interest in the Club until the end.

#### **ROBERT T. RUSH**

Upon retiring from League football after 10 years loyal service with Collingwood Football Club, Robert Thomas (Bob) Rush, then a noted athlete, joined Mercantile towards the end of the first decade of this century and commenced to learn to row. In those days many difficulties faced the novice, but with characteristic determination, Bob perserved and by 1913 had won a Maiden Eight which was followed by a Junior Eight at Henley, 1914. These races were forerunners of a number of victories which included senior eights and fours. Before retiring from active racing, Bob had developed into a very useful senior stroke.

During his rowing life, Bob maintained a keen interest in football and for many years held administrative positions with Collingwood Football Club and the Australian National Football Council. When the field of Birthday Honours was enlarged to cover sporting personnel, Bob was awarded an O.B.E.

He was a great Clubman and always interested in Club matters. He passed away at the advanced age of 93 years, but enjoyed regular week-end rowing until well after his 91st birthday, which is possibly a Victorian record. Mercantile members and sportsmen generally regret the passing of this noted athlete.

## JAMES H. O'REILLY

Jim O'Reilly joined this Club in the early years of this century. He won a number of races, but thought he was cut out for a life in the country and in 1912 he moved to Echuca, joining a well known firm of stock and station agents. Most of his holidays were spent in Melbourne and he moved about with Club members and enjoyed a special place in the South West Corner. In 1926 he commenced farming at Lake Cargellico in New South Wales, remaining there until the end, although during recent years, with a son managing the property, he spent a considerable amount of time in Melbourne and at the Club, and enjoyed a trip to the Olympic Games in Japan with the rowing supporters.

He was 87 years of age and for approximately 67 years a member of Mercantile. He supported our various activities and was keenly interested in our re-building projects to which he was a substantial donor. We regret the passing of an old and loyal member.

#### **ALEXANDER P. MILLER**

Known as "Streak" throughout Victorian rowing, he was an active carsman, Club administrator and a regular competitor at all regattas, with a particular affinity to country regattas and later visiting all country regattas as a supporter where his friendly personality made him a well known and popular visitor.

Joining Mercantile in 1927, he won his Maiden Eight in 1928 and followed with successes in Junior Eights and Pairs and Senior Eights over the next six years. At the same time he took an active part in the Club administration, being elected to the Committee in 1929 and later becoming Vice-Captain, Captain and Vice-President.

He regularly attended at the Club and its functions, including the South West Corner, until an illness restricted his activities and even then remained a regular supporter of the Henley Regatta, and whenever possible made a visit to the South West Corner.

"Streak" will be sadly missed from Mercantile and Victorian Rowing.

### A. T. LOVELESS

A. T. (Ac.) Loveless was a recent member of the Club who became interested through a coxswain son and stayed to support the Club in many activities. He enjoyed the facilities of the Club and the friendship of the members.

We regret the passing of a friendly member.
