# The Ninety Sixth Annual Report of the MERCANTILE ROWING CLUB

#### To the Members,

#### Gentlemen,

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting the 96th Annual Report and Financial Statement for the year ending 30th April, 1976.

With the completion of the re-building of the Club House at the end of last season, our crews were able to boat out of our own premises resulting in an influx of young oarsmen and an improvement in our regatta racing results. The Club won 50 events in the season as compared with 31 events in the previous season and again won the Lightweight Premiership and finished third in each of the Senior and Junior Premierships.

During the season the rowing of our lightweight oarsmen was again outstanding, the Lightweight Four coached by Martin Tomanovits being unbeaten in this class of boat and on being selected to represent Victoria the crew went on to win the Australian Championship for Lightweight Four with Cox for the Penrith Cup and also competing in the Four without Cox in the National Championships, won this event and was graded by the Australian Selectors fourth in world standard of the competitors at the Championships. We are justly proud of this crew consisting of John Hawkins, Peter Macartney, Ian Porter, Terry Thurtell (stroke), Vic Ronai (cox) and Martin Tomanovits (coach).

Our Lightweight Eight which except for minor changes has been together for the past three years during which they have been unbeaten in this class of boat. Failing to get satisfactory competition in Victorian Regatta racing the crew competed Interstate winning the Champion Lightweight Eight of South Australia, New South Wales, Victoria and the Australian National Title.

The lightweight oarsmen set a standard of hard training, co-operation and enthusiasm which we hope to see continued by all our oarsmen in the coming season.

We tender our congratulations to Monash University on winning the Senior Premiership and to Banks on winning Division 1 of the Junior Premiership and to Albert Park on making a great recovery to win Division 2 of the Junior Premiership.

In addition to the selection of our Lightweight Four to represent Victoria in the Australian Championships, our members Andrew Withers and Tim Young were selected to row in the Eight which finished a creditable second to New South Wales which won the King's Cup and Selection to represent Australia at the Olympic Games.

Peter Benjamin and Ken Leach of Mercantile were selected No.1. and No.3. to represent Victoria in the Australian Sculling Championship for the President's Cup. Peter Benjamin was successful in winning his heat but unsuccessful in the final which was won by Ted Hale of New South Wales who was also selected to represent Australia in the Olympic Games.

We congratulate New South Wales on winning the King's Cup and Ted Hale on winning the President's Cup and wish success to the Australian Rowing representatives at the Olympic Games.

Since the re-building, the Gymnasium has been in constant use and last season was used for pre season training by a number of our members and presently the Club is negotiating with a professional instructor with a view to winter training for our young oarsmen in preparation for a stronger showing in all classes of rowing during the coming season. The equipment of the Gymnasium has been continuously updated by Ted Sorani, who with the assistance of a number of members has built and erected a great deal of equipment including the construction of a rowing machine.

The Sauna is in operation, the amenities room is furnished with Table Tennis Tables and Snooker Tables and with the carpeting of the Club Room making for greater comfort the members are making greater use of the Club facilities particularly on a Thursday evening when refreshments are available at the S.W. Corner.

A new lightweight four-oared boat, convertible to use, with or without coxswain was purchased and named the 'N.W. Cairnes'. An eight-oared boat has been urgently needed and at the end of the season the opportunity was taken to purchase at a satisfactory price from the Victorian Rowing Association the new Sykes Boat used by the King's Cup Crew.

#### FINANCIAL

The increasing costs of running the Club and servicing the overdraft \$25,000 resulting from the re-building made it necessary to propose an increase in subscriptions, the motion for which was submitted to an Extraordinary General Meeting held on 11th April, 1976, and adopted unanimously by the members present. This was the first increase in subscriptions since 1969 and it is estimated that it will be barely sufficient to cover the running costs of the Club and the purchase of new equipment will have to be financed entirely by social activities and special efforts which require the whole hearted support of all members.

The Committee has been active in its endeavour to reduce costs but with current inflation, interest charges and greater insurance cover, find the means of reducing expenditure are limited and alternative sources of income have been sought with emphasis on hire of the Club Room which is proving successful, plus the installation of a pay phone which will considerably reduce telephone charges.

The renewal of the rental agreement with Brighton Grammar School has and will continue to be of great assistance to the Club.

Our lightweight oarsmen who in regatta racing and rowing activities have made such a great contribution to the Club also by the means of special efforts organised by themselves donate \$940 for a new set of ten oars and we are very grateful to these young members who have made such a tremendous contribution to the welfare of the Club.

The support and contributions of the Ladies' Auxiliary has continued to be beneficial to the Club's activities and is appreciated by all members.

The purchase of the new convertible four was made possible by the contribution of \$3,000 by the Social Committee and we are grateful to those members who have loaned and promised to loan to the Club money free of interest to enable the purchase of the new eight at a cost of \$4,500 ahead of the boat replacement program thus providing our senior eight with the use of a good boat for the whole season. To permit the final payment on the purchase of the eight we are looking forward to receiving the remainder of the promised loans.

The final payment to the building contractor was made in March, bringing the total cost of the re-building project to \$85,614. The Club is indebted to the remarkable support given by so many members in the completion of this project. We now have facilities not dreamt of till recently.

The Building Fund overdraft limit \$25,000 has been almost fully utilized and will not be drawn upon again. A meeting with our Bank is planned for September to discuss the repayment terms of this loan.

The future holds many financial burdens with the effects of inflation and more particularly the maintenance and repayment of our overdraft. The Committee is confident these problems will be overcome with the continued support of the members of the Club.

With 50 wins to our credit during the season 1975 - 76 it is estimated that the total sum to be contributed by the Tributors will amount to \$1,000 the whole of which is to go towards the purchase of the new Regulation Four.

The new season 1976–77 now approaching more Tributors are required to back the Club crews encouraging them to know that every time they win it means greater financial support for Club equipment.

#### **BOATS and OARS**

At long last the four eights, seven fours and five pairs which make up the fleet are housed in the shed. The new rack configuration is more than adequate for the current fleet and indeed the Club was able to house the boats of the following crews with space to spare — Y.W.C.A., four; V.R.A., eight; four; and Scull, Scullers have not been forgotten and the shed sports a series of specially designed racks for the sculling boats and their blades. This facility was designed, constructed and installed by Alan Blaxland to whom all scullers offer their thanks for a first rate job. Currently ten single sculls and three double sculls are housed with the facility to provide for another three sculls if required. Space has also been made available at a fee to a number of canoeists who train from the shed.

The return of the fleet has brought with it the problem of several years of minimum maintenance when most voluntary effort was directed to re-building the shed. Boats used for competition were reasonably maintained, although on an adhoc basis; however those used on an irregular basis deteriorated badly mainly because of an apparent philosphy of 'use and abuse' by the occasional user.

The hard facts of the matter are — to buy a reasonable racing eight today costs \$5,000 and a single oar costs just under \$100! These costs coupled with the Club's increased financial commitments and the fact that the boat replacement program funds were diverted into the building fund make it imperative that the Club gets the maximum life out of its equipment. The Club cannot afford to pay to have the equipment maintained or reconditioned by skilled tradesmen so it relies heavily on voluntary labour. The answer is for all members to look after equipment used and if minor damage occurs to accept responsibility for it and repair it if possible or at least take action to see that it will be repaired. Occasional users should take note of the example set by a group of veterans who used the 'Caltex & Dealers' on Sundays — they completely refitted and varnished the craft themselves.

Currently, 50% of the fleet is rated as less than good. Note – that each boat thus rated requires sanding down, and revarnishing, Riggers sanded and painted and all internal fittings to be refurbished. The time involved is considerable. The Club needs help with its boat maintenance program.

During the year we took delivery of a racing four suitable for lightweight oarsmen, a coxed boat convertible to coxwainless, at a cost of \$3,650, a set of ten Croker oars valued at \$960 donated by our lightweight oarsmen.

The four 'Sir Benard Evans' (1966) and the eight 'Cock Robbins' were sold.

Over the past month or so a concentrated effort has been made to recondition all oars over five years old (about 60 in all). This task will take several more months with the current group of volunteers. To date about \$150 has been paid to a boat builder for repairs to oars beyond the capacity of the voluntary workers.

A special effort will be required in the current year if the overall deterioration of the fleet is to be arrested.
