We must strive to make sure that the many new members joining our ranks to race remain with the Club and obtain from it the same support and friendship that has brought to many a lifetime of enjoyment and satisfaction. That is the spirit which has made Mercantile strong and I hope that it will continue to do so.

TO THE MEMBERS

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting the 104th Annual Report and Finance Statement for the year ending 30th April, 1984.

Members can be justifiably proud of the successes the Club has achieved over the last season. We have clearly cemented our position as the premier Club within Victoria, winning the Champion Club, Lightweight and Junior Premierships of Victoria. Our success over the last season is further reflected in the large number of Club members selected in State and Australian crews clearly establishing our Club as a dominant force within Australian rowing.

Prior to the commencement of the 1983/84 Club season a number of members from our senior heavyweight squad competed very successfully in Australian crews at the World Championships in Lucerne. David Doyle and Sam Patten won the bronze medal competing in the eight oared event while Graeme Barnes steered the Australian lightweight eight to a silver medal. Glenn Deag and Mark Doyle also competed successfully in the Senior B eight, when that squad toured New Zealand.

Under the supervision of Coach David Palfreyman our Senior eight performed well in lead up regattas to the State Championships. In a closely fought race they retained the Victorian Senior Eight Championship with a very fine win. We congratulate the crew of Jeff Lawrence, Martin O'Halloran, Tony Imison, Stuart Moreton, Glenn Deag, Ian Belot, Neil Myers, Sam Patten, Graeme Barnes (Coxswain) and David Palfreyman (Coach) on a very pleasing victory.

Five members, Glenn Deag, Ian Belot, Neil Myers, Sam Patten and Graeme Barnes were selected to represent Victoria in the King's Cup in April.

Our senior members performed with mixed success in the National Selection Regattas leading up to the Kings Cup where Victoria came third behind NSW and South Australia.

Subsequently, the following members were selected to represent Australia in a number of different categories: Sam Patten (Olympic Eight), David Doyle (Olympic Coxless Four), Glenn Deag (Senior B Eight) and David Palfreyman (Coach Senior Lightweight Eight).

On their return from this tour they formed the basis of the Club's Lightweight Senior Coxless Four with Greg Pechan making up the complete crew. The crew, coached by Martin Owen, achieved some excellent rsesults during the season.

Competing regularly against the top lightweight competition in Australia at the national selection regattas, they achieved some most encouraging results, always providing stiff competition for the more experienced and older crews. But clearly their most gratifying result came in the Victorian Lightweight Coxless Four Championship when they defeated arch rivals Melbourne University in a most exciting race. Our congratulations go to them not only for the perseverance and determination they showed during the season, but also on being selected, as a whole crew and coach, to represent Australia as the Senior B Lightweight Coxless Four which is scheduled to compete against New Zealand crews in August/September this year.

Other members of the lightweight squad also achieved success during the season. A crew made up of these other lightweight oarsmen and coached by John Hawkins were successful at a number of regattas culminating with a fine win in the Victorian Champion Junior Four event. Our congratulations go to lan Rycroft, John Grant, Cam Hall, Andrew Douglas and John Leeming (coxswain). These four members then joined with other members of the squad and formed a Junior Eight. This crew continued the success of the four winning almost every event in which it competed, including the Victorian Champion

Junior Eight. Our congratulations go to David Aitken, Troy Deag, Andrew Imison, Ian Rycroft, John Grant, Tom Killeen, Andrew Douglas, Garry Harris, John Leeming (coxswain) and David Fogarty (Coach).

Another pleasing aspect of our success over the last season was our dominance in the very important Youth rowing area. Two youth eight's coached by Paul McGann and Noel Donaldson provided the basis of this success. The number one crew coached by Paul dominated throughout the season winning every event in which it competed. The number two crew coached by Noel performed well but with less success — understandbly so in light of the strength of the number one crew.

Subsequent to the number one crew of Chris Gilford, Richard Howden, Tom Sanchez, Tony Johnson, Mike McKay, Andrew James, Stewart Gula, James Tomkins and Robbie Forsyth (coxswain) winning the Victorian Youth Eight Championship seven members of the crew were selected to represent Victoria in the Interstate Youth Eight Championship at the King's Cup Regatta:

Tony Johnson, Stewart Gula, Andrew James, Mike McKay, James Tomkins, Tom Sanchez, Robbie Forsyth (coxswain) and Paul McGann (coach). At the King's Cup regatta in April this crew gave a fine performance dominating the race and winning by a large margin.

We congratulate our Youth Eight for the marvellous success they achieved this season and look forward to the large contribution I am sure they will make to our continued success in the forthcoming season.

Phil Ainsworth coached our FISA Junior four comprised of Rob Law, Peter Tomanovits, Steve Hair, Stewart Wade and Peter Bester (coxswain). Among the many victories this crew achieved during the season, major events won included Champion FISA Junior Four Victoria, Champion Junior Four NSW and in pair oared events Champion FISA Junior pair without cox.

As a result of their fine performance over the season the crew and coach have been selected, in total, to represent Australia at the FISA Junior World Championships which will be held in Sweden, in July of this year. Needless to say our best wishes will go with them on this very important tour.

Tim Frederico and David Fogarty supervised our maiden oarsmen during the season. Facing strong competition they scored some good wins in both maiden eight and maiden four events. It is important for us to recognise the contribution these oarsmen make within the Club and we congratulate all successful oarsmen who competed in the maiden category.

Once again Vic Ronai and his band of young novices certainly made their presence felt within the Club. Vic's continuing involvement with this group has ensured that beginners and less experienced members have an opportunity to compete four our Club. Apart from this very important aspect, this group had some great wins during the season in both novice fours and pairs. The Club, as a whole must continue to support and encourage the future development of oarsmen within the novice ranks.

At the other end of the spectrum it is good to see the continuing success our veteran members have achieved during the season.

Ian Wilson, Brian Doyle, and Bill Morrison have continued to co-ordinate the very vital and much appreciated involvement of our sponsors Esso Australia and Carlton and United Breweries Ltd. Their continued generous support is gratefully acknowledged and we will ensure that they are proud of a continuing association with Mercantile. Finally, I feel it important to acknowledge, the fact that the success the Club has achieved this past season has been achieved not in one particular area, but over all categories from novice to senior. This is where the strength of the Club lies, and to coin a well known phrase of our equally well known patron, Jim Sprigg, is what makes Mercantile the "Mecca of rowing".

ESSO SCOTCH MERCANTILE REGATTA

The Club again was instrumental in organising a successful regatta this year. The sponsorship of Esso Australia was vital in continuing to make the regatta the largest regatta in Australia, and we thank them for their continued support. Also our thanks go to the organising committee headed by Mr. Bob Aitken and regatta secretary Peter O'Brien.

BOATS AND EQUIPMENT

In line with the Club's policy of aiming to have the best rowing equipment in Australia a racing eight and a set of carbon fibre oars were purchased during the past season. This will enable Mercantile to cater for the whole range of rowing activity from occasional social use to highly competitive State and National titles.

The fleet has been kept in good working order during the season and with a program of ongoing maintenance it is intended to keep up this standard.

Under the sponsorship agreement with Esso the old "J.G.H. Sprigg" and a Brighton Grammar School boat the "Meliora" were refurbished and renamed the "Barracouta" and "Marlin" respectively. These boats were then donated to the Sale Rowing Club.

The "First Lady" was sold to Caulfield Grammar School and the pair the "Bill Bradshaw" sold to the Essendon Ladies Rowing Club during the season.

The new racing eight purchased from Sykes was named the "J.G.H. Sprigg" and is intended for use by our heavyweight oarsmen. A set of carbon fibre oars (12' 7") was acquired to suit the eight, but could also be used by lightweight oarsmen.

Next season it is planned to purchase a racing eight for use by the Maiden/Junior group and a second set of carbon fibre oars.

The Ladies Auxiliary has generously donated \$1,000 towards the cost of a lightweight boat trailer. Delivery is expected in the near future.

To make better use of existing space in the boathouse new steel oar racks have been constructed to replace the wooden racks on the western side of the shed. It is intended to house all existing oars in these new racks thus providing more space on the eastern side for future developments.

GENERAL

Mercantile has again consolidated its position as the 'Mecca' of Australian Rowing. The Club won the following State Titles: Senior Eight, Senior Pair, Lightweight Eight, Lightweight Four, Youth Eight, FISA Junior Four, FISA Junior Pair, Junior Eight and Junior Four.

Mercantile crews won the Australian FISA Junior Four title and also the Challenge Eights at the National Regatta. It was pleasing to see that the Club had the largest representation of any Australian Club at the National and King's Cup Regattas.

The main reasons for the Club's success are a strong Committee and the depth of tallent that exists from novice to senior ranks. All the effort that has been put into recruiting over the last couple of years is paying off and this season saw the influx of a large group of new oarsmen. There is no reason why the success achieved during this season cannot be duplicated or even bettered in season 1984/85. The members should be justifiably proud that Mercantile is Australia's strongest Club and is likely to be even stronger next season.

There has been a jump in the number of financial members and the current membership of 396 is possibly the largest ever.

Our boatman, Lindsay Wallis, has again maintained the fleet as the best in Australia, but because of the skyrocketing costs of repairs and spares, members are asked to take extreme care with the equipment. Because of the expanding number of boats storage is also becoming a problem.

The Committee has decided to make facilities available for women to row actively for the Club in season 1984/85. As there are no Constitutional issues involved the Committee has the power to make this decision in its own right. This matter has been under consideration for a number of years, but only now has the Club been in a position to successfully bring in ladies rowing. This decision opens up more opportunities for Mercantile to win races and be successful at State and National levels. The Committee feels that there is much to be gained for the Club by boating ladies crews, but it is intended to have a phased implementation over several years starting with two four oared crews in season 1984/85. It is the Committee's aim to eventually make Mercantile not only the strongest men's club in Australia, but also the most successful ladies' club. We hope that all members support the Committee in these objectives and welcome the female recruits next season.

We have been well represented on the VRA Executive by Messrs. Bradshaw and Tomanovits.

The regattas have been superbly organised by the dedicated and hard working group of members on the Racing Officials Panel. We thank the following for their efforts: Messrs. Aitken, Bradshaw, Frederico, Harding, Harvey, Mahoney, Morgan, Morrison, O'Brien, Richardson, St. Vincent-Welch, and White. To help ease the burden on our officials members are asked to assist in this area.

Roger Wilson has again provided excellent commentaries of our regattas and we thank him for his untiring efforts. Nick Boileau, has written many articles for the 'Age', the 'Herald' and the 'Weekly Times'. Rowing is starting to achieve a higher public profile and Nick has undoubtedly helped in this area.

We thank the ABC for their excellent coverage of the National and King's Cup Regatta and Channel 0/28 for their coverage of our sport.

Geoff McMahon has provided flowers on all appropriate occasions and we appreciate his continued support.

The Tributors under the leadership of Bill Morrison have again donated generously to the Club.

We regret to record the passing of Roy Thursfield, John Gumley, Phil Jones, Noel Searle and Geoff Hyett. Our sympathies are extended to their families.

OBITUARY R.W.C. THURSFIELD

Roy Thursfield joined the Club in 1931. In his early years of membership he was a consistent and enthusiastic competitor achieving success in maiden, junior and senior events in all classes of boats until he was compelled to retire from active racing for business reasons.

Roy was also much involved in the administration of the Club and of rowing in Victoria. He was elected to the Committee in 1934 and was Vice-Captain in the 1935-36 season. On his return from active service in 1946 he again devoted much of his time to Club affairs and was on the Committee from 1947 until 1954. He was elected a Vice-President in 1957 a position which he held until his death. Roy was also a Vice-President of the Victorian Rowing Association until 1966 and he was elected as the first Patron of the Association. He was for a number of years the joint secretary with Norman Cairnes of the Melbourne Henley Regatta and was the manager of the Rowing Team at the Commonwealth Games in Vancouver in 1954.

Roy was always generous in his financial support of the Club and of all appeals for Victorian or Australian rowing. In 1947 and 1948 he donated a racing four to the Club and imported a set of oars from England for use by the senior crews and these were only two of his contributions over a long period.

Members of recent years will not have known Roy Thursfield or have had the opportunity of enjoying his cheerful company in the Club and at regattas. He was prevented by ill-health from coming to the river for fifteen or more years. Nevertheless he maintained his interest in the Club's activities and in its members and in his passing the Club loses a loyal supporter and many of its members a life-long friend.

Members were grieved to learn during the year of the premature death of John Gumley. John joined the Club in the 1968-69 season and was soon prominent in competitive rowing. He won maiden and junior events during that season and finished the year in the Club's Champion Junior Eight. In the following years he was a regular member of the Club's successful senior crews.

John was dedicated to the Club's success both on and off the water. He joined the Committee in 1969-70. He was Captain in the following year during which the Club commenced its rebuilding programme. He returned to the Captain's office again in 1974-75. John assisted in many aspects of the Club's activities and made his photographic talents freely available whenever required, particularly in connection with the preparation of the Centenary History.

The Club has lost a prominent and valued member and expressions of sympathy have been sent to his widow and young family.

The Club was grieved to learn of the death during the year of Phil Jones who died as the result of a car accident in which his wife was also seriously injured.

Phil joined the Club in 1970 when his sons were active coxswain and oarsmen. He was not himself a competitive oarsman, but enjoyed the occasional paddle on Sunday morning and the social side of Club life. He was a consistent worker about the Club and a regular supporter at about all regatas in which the Club was represented.

In more recent years Phil decided that he should make some return to rowing for the enjoyment which he received from it and joined the V.R.A. Officials Panel. In that capacity he regularly assisted in the conduct of regattas for the benefit of the active competitors.
