## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Fellow Members,

As our Annual Report went to the printers last year the crews selected to represent Australia at various levels of International competition were fully engaged in preparation for the events to come. We are proud of the results achieved by those crews at the 1986 Commonwealth Games, the World Championships and at other venues, and in particular of our own members who were included in those crews, a fitting conclusion to a wonderful season of rowing for the Club.

We have now enjoyed another successful year with a satisfying contribution to most regatta programmes, an impressive list of victories and outstanding small boat performances at the selection trials culminating in a magnificent Club performance at the National Regatta. The King's Cup was retained in Victoria by an all-Mercantile crew, in itself a unique achievement. Once again we have high hopes for the success for our International crews overseas and for our members selected in them.

Such results do not just happen. Much ground work is required behind the scenes in the planning of the season's activities, in the recruiting of new members, in the hours devoted to coaching and organisation and the provision of funds and equipment. I thank all those involved including, in particular, those concerned with the crews in lower categories. For them not the glamour of receiving a medal with a vice-regal handshake to the sounds of martial music; - just the pleasure of rowing and competing at Mercantile.

The achievements of the year must inevitably take their toll in human effort and in equipment. The maintenance of the Club organisation, the Clubhouse and the fleet require the practical support of all our members and particularly those who have the use of the most valuable boats and oars and enjoy the greatest success. The financing of a fleet adequate for a large and successful rowing membership is a formidable task. For the funds we depend largely on sponsorship if it can be obtained and on the generosity of our older supporters. For the maintenance of our fleet it is essential that we have a consistent contribution from our active members.

## TO THE MEMBERS

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting the 107th Annual Report and Financial Statement for the year ending 30th April, 1987.

During the last season our success and dominance of Australian rowing has continued to grow. Australian rowing achieved its greatest ever successes at the 1986 Commonwealth Games and World Championships where the Australian Eight won gold medals at both events. Considering Mercantile had four members in this crew and members in other crews we can now justifiably lay claim to the title of the "greatest rowing Club in the world". Our congratulations go to Mark Doyle, James Tomkins, Andrew Cooper and Mike McKay, all members of Australia's World Champion Eight.

The 1986/87 season has again seen Mercantile win many State and National titles. At the National Championship and Kings Cup Regatta Mercantile was clearly the most successful Club. In the Kings Cup the winning Victorian Eight was an all Mercantile crew. We congratulate Graeme Barns, James Tomkins, Sam Patten, Mike McKay, Iain Belot, Andrew Ambrose, Richard Howden, Mark Doyle, David Doyle and coaches Brian Richardson and Martin Aitken.

Throughout the season the Club has enjoyed unparalleled success at all levels of competition. Brian Richardson and Martin Aitken coached our senior mens squad achieving great success. As a result of this success Mercantile retained the mens Senior Premiership. In addition to those mentioned above congratulations go to Neil Myers, John Lisetto and Peter Scott who were also members of this squad.

Our mens Senior B group had a very successful season. Throughout the year this group, coached by Paul McGann, produced outstanding results. It was particularly pleasing to see Eric Schrader involved with the Club again assisting Paul with the coaching of this group. The Club certainly has a great future to look forward to based on the talent and potential of these young oarsmen. We congratulate Tony Johnson, Tim Howes, Paul Somerville, David Fogarty, Justin Negri, Andrew Cohen, Geoff Barden and Tony Bowyer on the fantastic results achieved.

Martin Owen was responsible for our lightweight squad last season. Alan Borger, Tony Inglis, Tom Sanchez and Malcolm Robertson formed the lightweight coxless four which won the State Championship prior to Christmas. Later in the season Malcolm and Tom were selected in the Victorian lightweight four with Martin Owen as coach of the crew. This season has seen our lightweights produce some outstanding results at Selection Trials and the National Championship and Kings Cup Regatta. We look forward to seeing these results continuing into 1987/88.

As a result of an extremely successful recruiting programme prior to the commencement of the season our Youth squad produced some excellent results. Phil Ainsworth again coached the Junior Four consisting of Simon Morrison, Cameron Begley, Paul Schreier, Peter Somerville and coxswain Guy Begley. This crew won many races and remained unbeaten during the National Selection Trial regattas and Australian Championships. We congratulate them on a splendid first season with the Club and look forward to bigger and better results in the future.

David Pincus coached our Youth Eight during the past season. These young oarsmen achieved great results winning the State Youth Eight Championship as a result of which they were selected to represent Victoria in the Youth Eight event at the Interstate Regatta. They completed a marvellous season by winning the N.F. Wilkinson Trophy as Interstate Champion Youth Eight. Congratulations go to Tim Blackett, Chris Smith, Rob Manning, Dane Manzie, Jason Kovacic, Simon Quirk, Warwick Hooper, Jason Kerr and coxswain Bill Webster.

Cameron Hall and Lindsay Wallis coached our mens Senior C and Novice groups respectively. Some encouraging results were produced during the season. It is most important that we as a Club recognize that not all our oarspeople can compete at elite level. As our President Bob Aitken pointed out in last years Report "An entry at any level, be it successful or not, is as much a part of the Club's activities as a Championship victory".

During the last season we have boated a larger number of womens crews than in previous years. Brad Fry, Steve Mollard and Daryl Teschendorf coached our three womens crews in the Senior A, lightweight Senior B and Junior ranks respectively and achieved some very good results. It was also good to see Roger Wilson coaching a womens under sixteen novice pair and four which included his daughter. These young girls obviously enjoyed their rowing and we hope to see them representing the Club in the future. The Club is keen to build on the success we have achieved in the womens events. Careful planning to ensure that we expand at a controlled rate of growth with our oarswomen should see the Club assume a prominent position in the not too distant future.

At various stages throughout the season other crews competed for the Club in several categories. Bruce Morrison and Graeme Boykett coached crews, both men and women, providing the opportunity for members to represent the Club competitively at a number of regattas.

As a result of our tremendous success at the Selection Trials, culminating with the National Championship and Kings Cup Regatta, twenty-four members have been selected in Australian crews to compete in various international events over the coming winter months. We congratulate the following on their selection:

- Mike McKay, James Tomkins, Mark Doyle, Sam Patten, Andrew Cooper, Peter Tomanovits and Richard Howden all of whom have been selected in the mens elite squad. Paul McGann has been named as coach of the mens elite four and has also been appointed to a six month coaching position at the Australian Institute of Sport.
- Martin Aitken has been appointed coach of the Mens Senior B Eight which includes Club members Tim Howes, Tony Johnson, Paul Somerville, Paul Williams, David Fogarty and Peter Scott.
- Phil Ainsworth is coaching the Australian Junior Four consisting of an all Mercantile crew: Simon Morrison, Cameron Begley, Paul Schreier, Peter Somerville and Guy Begley.
- Martin Owen will be coaching the Australian Senior B lightweight four while Tom Sanchez has been selected in the lightweight eight.
- Rachael McInnes is in the womens elite squad to tour Europe.

During the season a number of very well organised and most successful social functions were held. Not only did these functions provide much needed revenue for the Club but were also greatly enjoyed by all those who attended. They are detailed later in this Annual Report.

Undoubtedly the Club is enjoying an unparalleled period of success in the competitive area. This success creates enormous pressures on our resources to continue achieving such outstanding results and some undesirable side effects are associated with our dominant position.

Our clubhouse at times does not reflect our success on the water. Hopefully some improvements we are making shortly to the bar area will encourage everyone to take a little more pride in the clubhouse and make it a place where we can enjoy bringing friends and guests. It doesn't take much effort to keep the Club clean, and during the next season far greater emphasis will be placed on our active members and coaches to take more responsibility for the appearance of the Club.

As many members would be aware we unfortunately no longer have sponsorship arrangements with either Esso or CUB. With the difficult economic climate many organisations, such as our past sponsors, are rationalizing their sponsorship commitments. Plans are underway to ensure that we develop new sponsorship arrangements. Due to some very successful social functions our financial position is stable and we have again managed to substantially increase the size of our fleet, maintaining our position as the best equipped Club in the country.

Finally, as this is my last season as Captain of the Club there are a number of people whom I would like to acknowledge and thank for their support and assistance over the last three and a half years:

— Andrew Guerin has remained a tireless and invaluable member of the administration. His input has been greatly appreciated and his ongoing association with the administration of Mercantile has contributed greatly to our continuing success.

— Phil Ainsworth has shouldered a mammoth workload during the last couple of years. The Club is indebted to Phil for his efforts and I personally thank him sincerely. Andrew Briggs and Martin O'Halloran, who have both served as vice captains during my captaincy, provided me with fantastic support and assistance for which I am most grateful.

— Noel Donaldson has done an outstanding job as Chairman of Selectors. As we achieve greater success each year it becomes more and more difficult to maintain our dominant position. Through this period Noel and his co-selectors have ensured that we have continued to recruit the best young oarspeople available and our crews were of the highest possible standard. I have found Noel's input in this area to be invaluable and thank him very much.

— Lindsay Wallis, maintenance engineer extraordinaire, has contributed many hours to the upkeep of the clubhouse and fleet. Without his efforts we would not have our equipment in such good condition.

— I would also like to thank those members who have served on the Committee during my term as Captain. In particular I would like to acknowledge the ongoing support of David Pincus and Andrew Cohen both of whom have worked very hard to ensure our continuing success.

I believe that the Club can continue to maintain its dominant position for many years to come. We have a large number of outstanding young oarsmen and women who will undoubtedly continue to achieve great success. But I would urge all members to remember that there is much more to having a great Club than simply winning races. Just as much effort must be made off the water as on the water. This is not an easy task considering the competitive pressures our oarsmen and women face. There will always be plenty to do and we most certainly need an increasingly greater contribution from everyone.

I am sure we will face the future challenges successfully and continue to maintain our position as the greatest rowing Club in the world.

## BOATS AND EQUIPMENT

The Club has maintained its policy of developing and improving rowing skills by adding two coxed racing fours, a coxless racing four and a coxless racing pair to its already formidable small boat fleet this season. One of the coxed racing fours will be named the "R.R. AITKEN", the coxless four the "PHIL AINSWORTH" and the pair is to be named the "LINDSAY WALLIS". These craft are the "plastic" type and have proved very successful to date in top class racing.

With the ever increasing production costs of wooden hulled craft and the subsequent higher cost to the buyer, the trend more and more now is towards the plastic boat for senior and elite rowing. This is not only from a cost point of view but the maintenance aspect as well. Due to improved techniques in production the plastic hulled boat has now proven a durable craft and very little ongoing maintenance during its life is required.

The whole of the fleet was used at some stage this season and with general ongoing maintenance no serious breakages occurred. The aged racing four "RICKY LOVELESS" was sold to Geelong Grammar School.

A further three carbon fibre oars were purchased to replace broken ones to keep our store of these oars at a constant level. Due to their susceptibility to breakage and high cost the latest purchase of oars was a wooden set and this policy of purchasing wooden oars will probably continue for the foreseeable future.

A twin axle boat trailer was also acquired to relieve the chronic boat transportation problem. Our thanks to Club member Angus Milligan for his excellent work in building this trailer.

## FINANCIAL REPORT

The Club finished the season in a most satisfactory position due to continued sponsorship, high levels of donations and successful social activities. The Club records its gratitude to our sponsors, donors and members who have helped to achieve this fine result. Despite the result achieved, the Club's recurrent expenditure still far exceeds its normal income. Therefore the Club relies solely on donations, sponsorship and social functions to balance its books and purchase new equipment. Even a cursory perusal of our income and expenditure statements shows clearly the significant gap that must be overcome by abnormal income items before new equipment can be purchased.

The most notable item in the balance sheet was the establishment of the Endowment Fund, the capital of which stood at \$30,655 at the end of the financial year. Substantial donations during the year from the Patron, the President and the Scotch Mercantile Regatta Committee enabled the fund to be established. It is vital that the Endowment Fund is established with a large capital base to protect the Club's long term interests. Donations to the fund are sought to assist in maintaining the Club as the major force in Australian rowing.

We acknowledge the generous assistance of our sponsors ESSO Australia Ltd. and Carlton & United Breweries Ltd. and regret to advise that ESSO will be unable to continue in this capacity in the following season. Accordingly, the Club is seeking new sponsors and any members who may be able to assist in this area should advise the Captain.

In addition to our sponsors, we thank the following people for their generous donations:- R.R. Aitken, A. Ambrose, J.W. Bradshaw, D. Brooke, J. Burford, L. Cameron, N.W. Cairnes, P. Cooper, A.W. ## GENERAL

1986/87 was probably the best year ever for the Club. We boated more crews and were more successful at the elite level than ever before. This success did not just happen and is the result of the recruiting effort over recent years and better management of the Club.

Mercantile is probably unique in Australia in that we have more talented rowers than we can boat, although we also have the largest and best fleet of any Club in the country. In season 1987/88 we will face a shortage of boats for all those who want to row and equipment will have to be hired or rationed.

The major problem facing the Club now is lack of finance. We do not have the financial resources of some other local and interstate Clubs and we have recently lost both sponsors. Unless new sponsors can be found the financial outlook is bleak and there will be no major purchases of equipment in the coming season. Expenditure has been tightened and the rate of collection of outstandings improved dramatically last season. However, this will not in itself make up for the loss of sponsorship income. Members are encouraged to advise the Committee if they are in a position to organise sponsorship or have suitable contacts. Also, if members are able to assist in the provision of goods and services to the Club please speak up. For example, the printing costs for this report are great. If we were able to have it produced cheaply we would be able to spend the money on improving the Club and equipment.

The other difficulty we face is to find people who have the time and energy to help out around the Club. There are many jobs to be done but very few who are willing to tackle them. It is mainly a matter of changing people's attitudes so that they do not take everything for granted.

I emphasize the importance of members paying their bills promptly. We are no longer able to offer credit for payment of subscriptions and entry fees. Subscription renewal is expected by 30th June and entry fees will continue to be billed in advance. Unless the Club's finances are managed very closely we will suffer financial collapse. Members with subscription renewal outstanding at 31st December will cease to receive mail from the Club, except under exceptional circumstances.

## **OBITUARIES**

### **STEPHEN BOSTOCK**

Time must eventually take its toll of our older members but it is sad indeed to record the death of Stephen Bostock who had only just joined the Club and had not at the time of his death represented the Club in competition. Stephen came to us from Geelong Grammar at the end of 1986. He was a close and valued friend to those few members who knew him and it is sad that his premature and sudden death has deprived the rest of us of the opportunity to know him better and Stephen himself of enjoying the fellowship of the Club.

### **DOUGLAS C.L. BROOKE**

There would be few members and former members of the Club who did not know or know of Doug Brooke. He joined the Club in the season 1924-25 and was still rowing regularly and vigorously on Sunday mornings until shortly before his death in December 1986.

Apart from those years when he was posted interstate in the course of his business or was on war service Doug was about the Club as an oarsman, coach, Committee member and finally as a social oarsman for the whole of his term of membership. His impressive list of successes on the water commenced with the Maiden (now Senior C) Eights at Albert Park in February 1926. He won the Champion Eight in 1929 (with our Patron Jim Sprigg in the 4 seat) and was a regular member of the Club's senior crews for the next six or seven years. Doug's most famous victory was in the King's Cup in 1930 when he and five other Club members were in the crew which won the Cup by three feet over the three mile course at Mannum in South Australia. This was Victoria's first win for eighteen years.

Doug served on the Committee from 1930-35 and during that period was one of the Club's delegates to the V.R.A. He was an active coach during the late thirties both before and after he ceased active competition. He was made a Life Member of the Club in 1983 in recognition of his outstanding service.

### **DEANE J.R. MORGAN**

Deane Morgan joined the Club in season 1934-35 and his first recorded appearance in regatta racing was in a Maiden Eight at Henley in November 1934. He rowed consistently and with varying success in Maiden, Junior and Lightweight events for the next five years when he left, as did so many other Club members, to serve his country.

Returning from active service in 1945 Deane was immediately back with the Club and rowed for some seasons in Junior crews. But it was in the administration of the Club and of rowing that Deane made his major contribution and from which he derived much enjoyment and well deserved satisfaction. He had been on the Club Committee briefly before the war and was elected again in 1946, serving continuously until 1964. He was Captain from 1947 to 1951, a period of great expansion in membership and success on the water.

Deane was on the V.R.A. Committee for a number of years, first as the Club's delegate, and then as an Executive member from 1951 until 1962. Apart from his contribution to the Club and to the Association Deane was also active in Regatta organisation as secretary of the Upper Yarra Regatta Committee and of the Melbourne Amateur Regatta Association (Henley).

He was also closely involved in the conduct of rowing events in the 1956 Olympic Games. Deane managed several Victorian teams at the Kings Cup Regatta and was well known to a wide circle of friends in rowing throughout Australia.

In recognition of his service to the Club and to rowing Deane was made a Life Member in 1958 and elected a Vice President in 1964.

Due to a long illness Deane had not been about the Club much for some years and our younger members would not have known him well, if at all. To those of us who rowed with him, worked with him and enjoyed the relaxations of the Club with him, we will miss him greatly.

The following obituaries appeared in the February 1986 edition of the Mercantilian but were omitted from the 1985/86 Annual Report.

#### **DR. PETER M. GIBBS**

Peter Gibbs joined the Club as a Junior member in season 1961-62 after rowing for Scotch College in the 1961 Head of the River. A son of Alan Gibbs, a long time Club member, he was the third generation of the family to have a close association with rowing and with Mercantile. Peter rowed actively for the Club during the next few seasons and his enthusiasm was rewarded by a run of four successes in Maiden Fours at Henley, Barwon, Colac and Scotch Mercantile in 1963 and the Ballarat, Barwon, Henley treble in Junior Eights in 1965.

Study in Australia and overseas first in Dentistry and then in Medicine kept Peter away from the Club for a number of years though he occasionally found time to coach Junior crews. In more recent times he derived much enjoyment from regular Thursday evening and Sunday morning outings and was instrumental in encouraging others to participate. Peter was greatly interested in the Club and concerned with its organisation and success.

In latter years he suffered a terminal illness. Despite the knowledge that his years were limited he still devoted much time to his medical practice and to further study to enhance his skill in the treatment of others. In the midst of his manifold activities and care for his young family he still found time to enjoy his rowing at Mercantile with unflinching enthusiasm and humour and never with complaint. Peter is a friend we miss and an example to those who remain.

#### **JAMES K. McKEOWN**

Jim McKeown was also an old Scotch Collegian. He joined the Club for a brief period when he left school just after the Second World War and returned again to participate in Sunday morning rowing in the season 1965-66. He was a cheerful and energetic member of the social rowing group from then until shortly before his death and seldom missed a Sunday at the Club.

Jim was not one to take the benefits of Club membership without making a contribution in his own way in return. His way was to undertake the task of supervising and indeed personally carrying out the maintenance of equipment, a task for which his abilities as a general handy-man well fitted him. A quiet worker, he sought no reward except that of knowing the job was done and done well. The McKeown interest and help to Mercantile did not end with Jim's activities. His wife Isla was a hard working member of the Ladies' Committee which over many years has done so much to raise funds for specific Club projects.
