## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

## Fellow Members,

It is a matter of great regret to me that I will not be at the Annual Meeting for 1988,- the first which I shall have missed for many years. Unfortunately I have commitments overseas which necessitate departure before the end of June. For this I give my apologies.

We have again enjoyed a successful season. It did not perhaps produce all the results which we would have liked nor all the national selections to which we, possibly not without bias, considered that our members might have been entitled. Nevertheless we maintained a strong entry at almost all regattas culminating in the National Regatta where we must have had the largest entry in both men's and women's events of any Club in Australia, and our fair share of success. On behalf of the Club I thank all those who represented us during the season and my congratulations go to those who were successful, particularly in gaining national selection.

Once again we must be grateful to our Executive Officers and Committee, most of them young men and women with studies and other responsibilities and obligations, for their work during the year. I hope that all members appreciate the immense amount of thought and work required to manage a club and fleet the size of ours and will give those responsible their unhesitating support.

The Committee has recommended that three of our hardworking members be recognised by nomination for Life Membership. I am pleased that this motion, which I most heartily endorse, is being put while they are still relatively young and while the work which they are doing and have done is still very apparent to those who use the Club. Such an honour loses some significance when the main basis for it rests only in the unreliable memory of those members who are reaching their declining years.

# TO THE MEMBERS

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting the 108th Annual Report and Financial Statement for the year ending 30th April, 1988.

During the last season our high profile and dominance of Australian rowing continued. The fact that we have been able to maintain our dominance on the water in an Olympic year is a credit to all our oarsmen and women.

The 1987/88 season has again seen Mercantile win many State and National Titles. At the Penrith National Championships and Kings Cup Regatta Mercantile was once again the most successful club. Six of the winning Kings Cup Eight were Mercantile members. The win by the Victorian crew will go down in rowing history as one of the greatest Kings Cup victories ever. It was an awesome display of power rowing and we congratulate Mercantile members Graeme Barns (cox), James Tomkins, Sam Patten, Mike McKay, Mark Doyle, Andrew Cooper and coaches Brian Richardson and Martin Aitken.

James Tomkins and Sam Patten continued their unbeaten run and again won the National Senior A Pair Championship. We also congratulate James and Sam on winning the Captains Trophy.

Our mens Senior A four comprising Graeme Barns (cox), James Tomkins, Sam Patten, Mike McKay and Richard Howden also dominated its division and recorded a fine victory at the National Championships. Reflecting the success of our Senior A men four members have been selected to represent Australia at the Seoul Olympics. We congratulate James Tomkins, Sam Patten, Mike McKay and David Fogarty (who attended the A I S last season).

Our Senior B group, vital to the future of the Club, had a strong building season. Members of the squad included Bill Webster, Jason Kerr, Jason Kovacic, Tim Howes, Justin Negri, Andrew Cohen, Geoff Barden, Tony Bowyer and Simon Kay. We congratulate Justin Negri and Geoff Barden on winning the National Senior B Pair title, and Justin Negri and Tim Howes on their selection in the Australian Senior B Eight.

The Club also extends a warm welcome to Gary Merritt who moved from Queensland to coach our Senior B group. The move has paid off for Gary as he has been named coach of the Australian Senior B Eight to compete against New Zealand later in the year.

Joe Joyce and Malcolm Robertson were in the winning Australian Champion Lightweight Four and Penrith Cup crew. Richard Wraith also had a successful season rowing in the Senior B Lightweight Scull division and gaining selection in the Australian Senior B Team with coach Martin Owen.

Our mens Junior Four, coached by Jeff Lawrence, finished second at the Australian Titles and Justin Lachal, James Shipton, Matthew Jones and John Hannon were selected to represent Australia in the Trans Tasman series against New Zealand. David Pincus coached what could only be described as one of the best Youth Eights ever to be boated by Mercantile. After an undefeated domestic season the entire crew was selected to represent Victoria in the Interstate Youth Eight Championship. The crew of Simon Morrison, Cameron Jones, Peter Somerville, Eugene Kininmonth, Simon Spriggs, James Baker, Simon Quirk, Warwick Hooper and Paul Baddeley (cox) had a successful National Regatta winning the Mens Senior B Eight Championship and finishing second by the smallest of margins in the Wilkinson Cup.

Cameron Hall coached an impressive second Youth Eight and it was good to see this crew do so well. We are confident that members of this crew will be rowing in our senior teams within the next few years.

Thanks to the coaching efforts of Phil Ainsworth, Daryl Bird, Brad Fry, Paul Joyce, Bob Law, Rob Manning, Steve Mollard, Ian Swann, and Daryl Teschendorf the growth of womens rowing at Mercantile continued.

Congratulations go to Brad Fry who coached Rachael McInnes to victory in the Interstate Womens Heavyweight Four. Janet Cussen was selected in the Victorian Lightweight Four which finished a very close second to N S W. Sue Lee and Jenny Hose continued to improve and we are sure that they will be very competitive next season.

Our womens Youth and Junior Fours performed well despite serious setbacks and we look forward to these girls forming the backbone of womens rowing at Mercantile in years to come. Club member Fleur Spriggs, who rowed in the A I S Junior crew, has been selected to compete at the World Junior Championships at Milan in August.

On the social side Andrew Cohen and Daryl Bird co-ordinated several very successful functions which are detailed later in the report.

Our fleet is undoubtedly the finest in Australia. Next season we will take delivery of a new eight and a set of oars that were very generously donated by Arthur Atkins. This will ensure that our senior oarsmen will continue to have the finest equipment available.

Phil Ainsworth once again was the backbone of the Committee and without his administrative support the Club would not have functioned nearly as smoothly. Vice Captain Jeff Lawrence spent many hours working on the clubhouse and his efforts are greatly appreciated.

Noel Donaldson has done an outstanding job as Chairman of Selectors. Unlike past years the Selection Committee headed by Noel had to make several controversial decisions. Not all decisions were pleasing to some members, but we believe that the Selectors have provided the framework on which success can be built for many seasons to come.

Lindsay Wallis and Steve Reed have spent many tireless hours working on the Club's fleet and the Committee sincerely thanks them for their efforts.

Richard Wraith proved to be a most competent Treasurer and we recognise his efforts in one of the less glamorous jobs that have to be done.

With many of our senior oarsmen planning to retire in the near future it is imperative that we concentrate our efforts on the Youth/Junior level in both the mens and womens divisions. This will ensure that Mercantile continues to be the number one rowing club in Australia.

# TROPHIES

#### CAPTAIN'S TROPHY:

Awarded to the member who has won the most Regatta and Club races during the season; one point for a win, one additional point for a championship.

This year the trophy has been won jointly by Sam Patten and James Tomkins. All members would be aware of the spectacular success of these two outstanding oarsmen and it is fitting that they should win this award. Both Sam and Jim are currently training for the Australian Olympic Eight which will compete at Seoul. We congratulate them on their achievements and wish them every success in their quest for gold.

#### MAX BAILEY TROPHY:

The Perpetual Shield and Trophy are awarded to the coxswain who has won the most Regatta and Club races during the season; one point for a win, one additional point for a championship.

We congratulate Paul Baddeley on a fine season. Paul steered our Youth Eight to many victories including the Victorian Youth Eight Championship and the National Senior B Eight Title.

#### DR R A COOPER MEMORIAL TROPHY:

This Trophy is made available by the generosity of the family of the late Dr R A Cooper and is awarded annually to the member who, during the year, has rendered the most outstanding service to the Club.

Steve Reed, who has only been a member of the Club for a year, has won the trophy this year. Steve has thrown himself into the repair of the fleet and maintenance of the boathouse. These are jobs which are not very popular and which require special skills. Steve has contributed a great deal of time and done some excellent work in these areas over the last year.

#### N W CAIRNES TROPHY:

This Trophy is awarded to the most improved coxswain and has been won by Kirstie Eaton. Kirstie steered the Club's Senior A women last season and has been a particularly enthusiastic young member.

We congratulate Kirstie and hope that she enjoys a long and successful career in rowing.

## JEFF WYLIE MEMORIAL TROPHY:

The Perpetual Shield and Trophy for the most improved lightweight are donated by the management and staff of Edward Lumley and Sons Pty Ltd.The trophy is awarded annually in memory of the late Jeff Wylie, a former lightweight and Captain of the Club.

This year the trophy has been won by Janet Cussen. Janet transferred to Mercantile after being unable to get a row at Banks. She rowed in the Club's Senior A Lightweight Four and was subsequently selected in the Victorian Womens Lightweight Four to contest the Victoria Cup at the Interstate Regatta. We congratulate Janet and wish her well in seasons to come.

## F B BROWNE TROPHY:

The Perpetual Shield and Trophy are donated by the family of the late F R Browne and the trophy is being presented this year to the most improved oarsman.

We congratulate James Shipton on winning this award. James rowed in the second Youth Eight, and when a seat subsequently needed to be filled in the Junior Four, James was selected. The crew finished second in their National Title and were selected to represent Australia in the Trans Tasman Junior Challenge against New Zealand.

# H R FREDERICO TROPHY:

The inaugural presentation of this trophy, made available by Hon. Justice "Freddy" Frederico, is being made to the most improved oarswoman.

It has been won by Narelle Thomas who joined the Club from school having had little rowing experience. Through her determination and enthusiasm Narelle improved greatly throughout the season and ended up as stroke of the Womens Junior Four which came in third at the National Regatta behind two Institute of Sport crews. We congratulate Narelle and wish her well in her future rowing career.

## THE ENDOWMENT FUND

# SOCIAL AND CLUB EVENTS

The live music, warm weather and quite a large volume of liquid refreshment contributed to make this a great day. The second function that took place in December was the Club Christmas Party. The highlight of this occasion was, of course, the singing of Christmas carols by the assembled multitude, the choir being led by Noel "Paverotti" Donaldson.

There were a number of other highlights to the social season but perhaps the greatest was the Annual Dinner held at the Dorchester. The hard work of organising the evening paid off in terms of the Club spirit generated and funds raised by way of the auction. .

The second National Selection Trial was held at Ballarat and Mercantile was determined to afford the local and interstate competitors a night to remember. On the Sunday after the trials the Club turned on a party reminiscent of the never to be forgotten Galas. It was pleasing to see a number of Melbourne University Boat Club members enjoying themselves and spending money in the hallowed halls of Mercantile.

Many people not directly on the Committee have done a great deal of work to support our social functions. We thank these people, especially the girls who have contributed a great deal to the social side of the Club. Mercantile is all about people and it is the members who make the Club what it is. Mercantile stands for more than just putting boats on the water. 1988/89 must be an even bigger year socially and financially if the Club is to grow and meet its objectives in the sport of rowing. # BOATS AND EQUIPMENT

Despite having probably the largest and best fleet of any Club in Australia we are still short of boats to accommodate both our younger and veteran members. Because of the loss of sponsorship the Club was only able to purchase a set of Croker oars last season. We were fortunate however in that Arthur Atkins has donated a new eight and set of oars for our Senior oarsmen, to be delivered in time for next season.

Boat storage space is a chronic problem although this should be alleviated later in the year when space becomes available in what is currently one of the bays occupied by Brighton Grammar.

The job of repairing the equipment requires skill and time, and Stephen Reed and Lindsay Wallis have done some excellent work in this area. The greatest reason for the deterioration of the Club's equipment is lack of maintenance, and this is especially true of wooden-hulled boats. It is an unfortunate fact that while everyone wants to use the Club's boats very few members are prepared to do anything to maintain them. We have, however, managed to maintain the fleet in good condition and reduce the amount of damage and number of breakages compared with previous years. Members whose negligence contributes to damage of the equipment are now billed for a proportion of the repair cost.

The Club has been purchasing plastic boats over the last few years and this policy is paying off with the greatly reduced maintenance of this type of boat and their superior structural characteristics. With falling revenues and rising costs it is essential that we gain as long a life as possible out of our equipment.

The previously unnamed S & B racing four was christened the N L NEWTON during the season.

The MARTIN OWEN was renovated and refurbished early in the season and will be used as a training and social boat.

## **ROWING - GENERAL**

## RECRUITING

The 1987 recruiting drive was conducted along the same successful lines as in recent years. They are invited to attend an open day at the Club on a Sunday morning. Both the mens and womens recruiting days were very successful with approximately one hundred young men and women attending. Unfortunately, the number of people that we can actually boat is limited by a severe shortage of equipment. Even so, the Club was able to boat a Womens Youth Four for the first time last season and a very good second Mens Youth Eight. With the continued success of our Youth and Junior men and women the future looks bright. We welcome these new members and encourage them to continue the enjoyment and success they gained this year.

## COACHING

The Club thanks its coaches for the opportunities they provided for our competitors to succeed. Their untiring work is appreciated by all. ## COXSWAINS

The success of our crews is also very much dependant on our coxswains. # FINANCIAL REPORT

This season has been a difficult one for the Club. At the end of season 1986/87 we lost the sponsorship of ESSO Australia Ltd. and early in season 1987/88 we lost our only other sponsor, Carlton & United Breweries Ltd. As such the Club was left without a major portion of its previous cash flow and at the same time was faced with its most expensive season yet, fielding more crews at more regattas then ever before. The result was that almost no new equipment was purchased by the Club and few repairs carried out on the clubhouse.

The Endowment Fund continued to grow during the year from \$30,655 to \$39,861, a healthy sign. The object of the Endowment Fund is to provide a large and permanent capital base to secure the future of the Club so that Mercantile can continue to dominate Australian rowing as it has so successfully done in the past. To this end donations are sought so that the fund may continue to grow.

# GENERAL

1987/88 saw a decline in the Club's fortunes. Although we boated as many or more crews than in the previous year the season's results as reflected in the number of wins at the National Championships and local regattas, and in Premiership results, were down on 1986/87. The two main reasons for this were weaker performances by our crews and stronger opposition. This is hopefully a passing phase as the underlying strength of the Club, in terms of younger people coming in, is still there. The membership of the Club hit 400 last season for possibly the first time ever. The most pleasing aspect of this is that the growth occured in the ranks of our younger active members.

Finance is a serious problem due to loss of sponsorship and declining revenue from other sources. The Club has been run more efficiently in terms of money outlayed but further economies will be necessary in the coming year if the Club is to keep its head above water. A major problem is the collection of money from active members, as the Club outlays enormous amounts on entry fees and boat transport. This problem has been attacked by requiring active members to "prepay" their entry fees and boat transport. The system has worked well and will be extended and tightened next season.

It is pleasing to report that on the broader front of the survival of rowing on the Yarra, the situation has improved considerably over last year. From a position where it looked as though rowing could be forced off the Yarra by commercial interests, things have improved to the point where we can look forward with confidence to rowing staying on the Yarra for the forseeable future. The Melbourne City Council is now far more sympathetic to our problems than before, and aware of the benefits of rowing to the community at large. Andrew Guerin deserves a great deal of credit for helping turn the situation around. We are still a long way from gaining funding from government bodies as they ultimately regard us as something to be tolerated rather than as an avenue for national and individual achievement. In this respect Australia is far behind Europe and North America where government and business support for activities such as ours is very strong. The Melbourne City Council does give us a concession on our rental when compared with commercial operations and we should be grateful for that. However, it should be remembered that we pay the government 20% sales tax on all boats, oars and parts. Rowing suffers perhaps more than any other sport in this respect due to the high capital cost of equipment. We have been criticised in the past for being "elitist".however, it is because we are starved of funds that we are unable to offer the pleasures of rowing to more people.
