PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Fellow Members,

Once again we reach the conclusion of a rowing season. It was not perhaps as successful a season, when measured by victories in major races, as some we have had in recent years, but we were, over the year, able to boat a large number of crews in both men's and women's events with our fair share of success. This, after all, as a rowing club, is our primary objective and we like to feel, as perhaps do many other clubs, that the unfortunate cancellation of the finals at the National Regatta deprived a number of members of impending success.

We achieved considerable representation in national crews at various levels and I congratulate those members involved and wish them success. I welcome to the Club all those who joined us for the first time this year. We have had a fine group of young men and women rowing during the past year and we plan for a great season in 1989/90 with strong representation in the World Championships at Lake Barrington.

I will, unfortunately, again be overseas at the time of the Annual General Meeting this year and I therefore take this opportunity to thank the Captain, Jeff Lawrence and his team for their work during the year. The task of recruiting, selecting and boating so many crews and managing the funding for it all requires a great deal of time, patience and tact and it has been well done.

Finally, may I say a word of appreciation to a group who often do not receive the recognition which they deserve and that is the members who coach our crews. A few have prospects of a national appointment as some return for their effort, but for most the reward is just the satisfaction of contributing their knowledge and experience to keep the Club's crews in the forefront of rowing. We value their support and on your behalf, I thank them for it.

TO THE MEMBERS

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting the 109th Annual Report and Financial Statement for the year ending 30th April 1989.

Since the last report Mercantile Members and crews have travelled far and wide to partake in activities involving Rowing. 1988 was of course an Olympic Year and it is appropriate to record here again the achievements of members, James Tomkins, Mike McKay, Mark Doyle, Andrew Cooper and Sam Patten in representing Australia at the Seoul Olympics last September.

It must be recorded also that Mercantile was the winner of the Ladies Challenge Plate in record equalling time at the famous Royal Henley Regatta last July. Our President and a number of members had the pleasure of witnessing the Australian Development Eight rowing as Mercantile and including Tony Johnson, Neil Myers, Geoff Barden, Peter Scott and coach Martin Aitken take out this event.

As with all past Olympic Games Rowing cycles some of the competing oarsmen have since announced their retirement, some temporary, some otherwise. None the less the Club continues to be the number one rowing club in Australia.

This season we have concentrated our efforts on the younger Oarsmen and Women of the Club and continued our successful recruiting programme to ensure that the success seen at the elite level in the past will again be seen in the future. These younger Oarsmen and Women have worked hard to make the most of the many opportunities given to them and the results they have achieved are indeed very pleasing.

Season 1988-1989 has, like seasons gone by been very successful. The Club was successful in 48 races, the majority in the lower and younger levels of our membership and this is proof that our success is far from finished.

Just as many of our Younger Oarsmen and Women met new opportunities this year, so to did our coaches. Senior Coaches from 1987, Brian Richardson and Martin Aitken both found themselves in a position of not being able to continue as planned. Martin Aitken accepted the plum position of Head Coach at the University of London Boat Club while Brian Richardson was forced to step aside due to work commitments. Senior Lightweight Coach Martin Owen also stepped aside to accept a similar position at Melbourne University and Senior B Coach Gary Merritt is concentrating on schoolboy coaching.

The Club is indebted to these gentlemen for the enormous effort and tireless hours expended in coaching our members and thank them for their work. While Brian Richardson was not able to coach our elite squads earlier in the season, he was named coach of the Victorian Kings Cup crew aiming to

win the State's (and his own) fifth successive victory and we are hopeful that he will be able to return to more full-time coaching next season. He has also been appointed Australian coach of the Men's Double Scull containing former World Champion Peter Antonie and his MUBC Team-mate Paul Reedy. It is hoped that the others will be able to return to coaching at Mercantile as time permits.

Their places on the coaching panel have been taken by Paul McGann who co-ordinated both our Senior A Lightweight and Heavyweight crews for much of the season and Noel Donaldson who coached the Senior B Men's crew.

This season saw the completion of stage one of the new National Water Sports Centre at Carrum. This International Standard course was venue for a number of regattas held during the season, though not all were successful due to unfortunate weather conditions. While much work needs to be done to complete the boatshed, starting and judging facilities this magnificent facility will ultimately provide a further training and racing venue second to none.

The unfortunate weather referred to saw the cancellation of several regattas held there during the season. Perhaps this was to prepare us for the disaster to follow in the cancellation of the Final day of the National Regatta and the abandonment of the Kings Cup Regatta for the first time in its history other than in War-time.

Whereas in recent years the Club has been proud to record in this report the success of our members at the National Championships and Kings Cup regatta, this year we have no race results to report on. Only a handfull of titles were contested prior to the Regatta cancellation. The extreme disappointment to all members, competitors and spectators alike, following the cancellation of these events will take considerable time to pass.

Our competing crews had good reason to be upset. Pre regatta form particularly that shown by our Senior B Men's Squad under coach Noel Donaldson clearly demonstrated that Mercantile would continue to dominate the results table as has been done so regularly in recent years.

In spite of this anticlimax to what was a difficult season for the new Australian Selectors, a large number of Mercantile oarsmen and women were selected to trial at Carrum late in April for a possible berth in Australian crews. We congratulate Tony Johnson (Senior A Men), Geoff Barden, Warwick Hooper, Peter Somerville, Jason Kerr, James Baker and Peter Scott (Senior B Men), Fluer Spriggs and Celia Paterson (Senior B Women), Rebecca Joyce (Senior A Lightweight Women) and Samantha Stewart who rowed in the A.I.S. Junior Women's Four, on their ultimate selection in Australian Crews and wish them every success in competition in the coming months.

Our Men's Junior Four was also selected to represent Australia in the Trans Tasman Series against New Zealand combining in an Eight with a crew from Banks Rowing Club. Will Neville, Joshua Mantello, Adam Davenport and James Graham, while denied the opportunity of showing their talents in Western Australia, convincingly showed the New Zealanders the strength of Junior Rowing in this country (and particularly in Victoria) to record a two-nil victory in that series. Will Neville, Joshua Mantello and Adam Davenport are now preparing for the World Junior Championships to be held in Hungary later this year.

Mercantile has of course enjoyed the fruits of successful recruiting in recent years, targeting particularly to achieve success at Junior and Youth level so that we can continually feed our elite crews with oarsmen and women of quality. Many other Clubs are envious of our success and some try to emulate us. None have matched our success and we shall continue to see that they do not. However this year has seen the most aggressive recruiting for some time. The Pink Cloud on the Horizon has been evident — this time we shall be prepared.

The competition amongst Clubs for prospective recruits did not stop David Pincus from again coaching the successful Victorian Champion Youth Eight, David has not lost a Youth Eight race in Victoria in three seasons and he continued on from this success by again being named as Victorian Youth Eight Coach. The Mercantile crew successful in winning the State Youth Eight Championship was James Shipton, Richard Moreton, Jason Platts, David Juracich, Andrew Heath, Trent Schmidt, Andrew Jackman, Cameron Jones and Andrew Barns. Seven of this crew were also named to represent Victoria in the Youth Eight event for the Wilkinson Cup.

The Club also boated a second Youth eight under the direction of Graham McCall. It would appear that Graham has got his second wind. Apart from coaching this crew, Graham also served on the VRA Executive Committee, he leads a sub Committee planning development at the new Carrum Course and he is Victorian Delegate to the Australian Rowing Council. He has lately been seen paddling on the river in his double scull and still finds time to be a regular visitor to the South West Corner.

The second Youth Eight is an important part of our overall success. All new recruits to the Club, this crew competed successfully in many Senior C and Intermediate Events during the season and we welcome members of this crew to the Club.

Our Women's crews had a frustrating season. While our oarswomen generally displayed great potential for success, the Clubs plans were thwarted by selection policies for Victorian Crews which saw many of these oarswomen removed from the Club scene into State squads very early in the season. The Club will be considering carefully the implications of such selection policies, particularly ensuring that the resources developed for our oarswomen in recent seasons are utilised more fully by Club crews.

This is not to say that our oarswomen did not enjoy success. Janine Collier dominated local heavyweight women's events and for her success was rewarded with a berth in the Victorian Women's Heavyweight Four. Sue Lee achieved selection in the Victorian Women's Lightweight Four, and Celia Paterson, Rebecca Joyce and coxswain Kirstie Eaton were chosen to participate in the Victorian Women's Youth Four. Brad Fry was selected coach of the Youth Four.

The undoubted highlight of the season for our women was the Selection of Rebecca Joyce as stroke of the Australian Women's Senior A Lightweight Four. This is Rebecca's first year at the Club, indeed her first year out of School, and her achievement is unparalled in women's rowing in this country. We congratulate Rebecca on this achievement and record with pleasure her selection as Mercantile's first Senior A Australian representative.

The Club extends its thanks to Brian Dalton and Steve Mollard (Lightweight) Graeme Boykett (Youth) and Daryl Teschendorf and Rob Manning (Junior) for their coaching and assistance in developing our women's crews. Thanks are due also to Phil Ainsworth who co-ordinated much of the Women's rowing at the Club. We look forward to the further growth of Women's rowing at Mercantile under the direction of these coaches next season.

It is pleasing to record a return of more Senior C and Intermediate Crews to the Club. In particular we welcome to the Club a considerable number of gentlemen who enjoy the Club's facilities under the banner of the 2XS (to excess) Club. These members under the guidance of Bill Canty are seen religiously at the Clubhouse on Sunday mornings at 10.30 sharp. Those late in arriving, and there are not many, incur a considerable fine and the indignity of sitting out what is otherwise a most unusual but enjoyable row.

In addition to this group a number of other crews were formed which competed regularly at regattas both locally and at Country venues. In fact for the first time in many seasons Mercantile crews also competed at the Christmas Regattas — Nagambie, Yarawonga and Rutherglen and the Easter Regattas — Mildura and Wentworth. The 2XS Club and many other members represented the Club at the annual Horsham and Dimboola Regattas.

There was in addition to all the above-mentioned crews, yet another group containing Mercantile members which performed successfully during the season. Members Andrew Cohen, Simon Spriggs, Simon Quirk, Eugene Kininmonth, Justin Negri, Simon Kay with Coach David Boykett combined in the Monash University Eight which captured the Grand Challenge Cup at Australian Henley before travelling to England to assist Cambridge University in their preparation for the annual Oxford and Cambridge Boat Race. While in England they raced in the Tideway Head of the River race finishing a very creditable eighth in a field of almost 500 crews. In doing so they clearly won their division and were the

leading performers of any international crew in the race. We congratulate these members on their fine performance.

Of course the Club offers more than just the opportunity to race. Many members continue to use the Club's facilities well after their racing careers (elite or otherwise) have finished. Groups of veteran and social oarsmen regularly row and the equipment which the Club is able to provide for these members is continually improving and expanding. It is hoped that the numbers of members in these groups can be increased in coming months to make use of these expanded facilities.

In addition to the Club's fleet, the Committee is conscious of the need to improve the Clubhouse and associated facilities. In particular following changes to Liquor Licensing Laws, the Club intends to improve considerably the South West Corner and surroundings and pursue the application of a Club Liquor Licence. A sub-committee chaired by David Boykett and comprising David Yunghanns, Bill White, Steve Reed and Jeff Lawrence has been formed to investigate the full implications of the licence and recommend any Building alterations necessary. It is hoped that plans can be finalised soon so that work may shortly commence.

Alterations of the magnitude which the committee has in mind will require calls on additional finance and a number of fundraising functions will be necessary over the next season to finance this work. On behalf of the committee I urge you to support these functions and the fundraising drives which will take place to ensure the success of these improvements.

In asking for your support in fundraising I also ask for your support in running our great Club. A Committee good as it may be can only do so much to ensure that everything is in order. This year I believe that our active oarsmen and women have begun to contribute more in their share of duties in and around the Club.

Spending many hours as they do, training and competing for the Club; in recent years a general apathy to do the various extra duties necessary in our Club has seen a gradual deterioration in our usual standards. I now ask for your support in joining these younger members where appropriate to ensure that the necessary tasks, some occasionally thankless are completed and that a fine example is set for our new members to continue.

In keeping with our dominance on the water, Mercantile members continue to represent our interests at the highest levels of the sport. Of course, Mr. Justice Hubert "Freddie" Frederico continues in the Presidency of the Victorian Rowing Association, and now, Reg McKay has been elected President of the Australian Rowing Council. We congratulate Reg on this appointment.

Andrew Guerin who has successfully managed Victorian Kings Cup crews in recent years, will this year be the

Australian Senior A Team Manager in charge of Australian crews to compete at the World Championships in Bled, Yugoslavia. Andrew also devotes considerable time to the affairs of the Victorian Rowing Association and we thank him for the work that he does on behalf of all Clubs particularly in relation to our continued use of the Yarra River and the occupation of our existing Boatshed sites. These issues are of major concern to all City based Clubs and members are asked to consider their actions carefully in any circumstances which could be damaging to our sport.

Both Andrew Guerin and Reg McKay were the driving forces behind the proposed Interstate Challenge races to be held at Carrum in lieu of the abandoned Kings Cup. It was indeed a tragedy that some other members of the officialdom of our sport could not agree on the format of the regatta and a magnificent opportunity was lost to allow our frustrated oarsmen and women a chance to compete. None the less, well done Reg and Andrew on your endeavours.

Your committee too, has been working tirelessly this season in further expanding the benefits of membership of the Club. Vice Captain Richard Wraith in his role as editor of the Mercantilian has ensured the continued growth of this fine magazine. Now issued three times a year this publication ideally supplements the Annual report and gives a good insight into the activities of the Club and its members. Contributions will always be welcome from any member. Richard's efforts with the Mercantilian and his assistance generally are greatly appreciated.

Secretary Paul Somerville and Treasurer Tony Inglis both new to their respective roles completed their duties with distinction and were capably assisted by Ian Jickell and Sue Lee. I thank these members on your behalf for their efforts.

The Social Sub Committee comprising Andrew Cohen, Daryl Bird, Fiona Butler and Narelle Thomas maintained the tradition of some fine Social functions enjoyed by members. These functions are detailed later in the report.

Steve Reed has again won the Dr. R. A. Cooper Memorial Trophy for his outstanding work for the Club. Countless hours have been spent by Steve in working for the Club in areas additional to maintaining the Club's fleet and many of the fruits of his work will become apparent over the next few months.

Noel Donaldson will shortly complete five extraordinary years as Chairman of Selectors. During this time Mercantile's success has been unparalleled and never in our history have so many members achieved so much for their Club, their State or their Country. The role of Chairman of Selectors requires great foresight and planning. Noel has contributed each with abundance and at the end of this season will step down to concentrate on coaching Club crews. We thank Noel for his work during this time.

During the year the committee has considered a number of important matters, including renegotiation of the Brighton

Grammar School Boatshed Lease, continuation of our own lease with the Melbourne City Council, Application for a Club Liquor Licence, Potential Building Alterations and the nomination of Australian Selectors. Each matter has been handled carefully considering the interests of all members.

A particular item of concern to the committee and one in which the opinions of many members were canvassed is the declining standards accepted at the Club Annual General Meeting. As you will have read in the notice of meeting at the front of this report the committee has determined that the meeting this year will commence at 6.30 pm. The committee have proposed a number of new initiatives to restore this evening to the grand occasion of old, and we look forward to your attendance at this important meeting.

The committee has also given great thought to the next season. 1989 sees the World Championships come to Australia and we are more than hopeful that many of our members will be participating. These events do not simply happen. Boats, Equipment, Coaches and Support must be provided. The Club will muster all its resources to ensure that next year is the most successful ever. Given our recent successes a further improvement is not easily achieved but I hope that with your support this improvement is possible.

I hope you will take an active interest in supporting the Club and its members in all these activities during the next season.

CAPTAIN'S TROPHY

The Perpetual Shield and Trophy is awarded to the coxswain who has won the most Regatta and Club races during the season.

The recipient of this trophy this year is Andrew Barns who successfully steered our Men's Youth Eight to many victories. This is Andrew's first year with the Club and he follows closely in the footsteps of his elder brother, Graeme, well known

for his victories in many elite races during recent seasons. Many will recall a clash of opposing Boats coxed by the respective brothers during the 1987 Men's Senior A State Eight Championship, with on that occasion Graeme (steering the Mercantile Senior Eight) coming off the better of the two. Andrew, we are sure, who has learnt much from this experience will continue with success at Mercantile and we congratulate him on winning this trophy in his first season with the Club.

DR. R. A. COOPER MEMORIAL TROPHY

This trophy is made available by the generosity of the family of the late Dr. R. A. Cooper and is awarded annually to the member who, during the year, has rendered the most outstanding service to the Club. Steve Reid has again been awarded this trophy. Steve appears to have no limitations in his ability and enthusiasm in working for the Club. Few members realise the enormous work required in maintaining the Club's fleet and equipment and Steve has undertaken this role with distinction. In addition to this work, Steve has been the driving force behind the expanded range of Club uniform and the forthcoming Ergometer Regatta mentioned in the last Mercantilian. N. W. CAIRNES TROPHY

Unfortunately Meredith is not able to continue a successful coxing career due to the change in FISA rules where all women's events above the level of junior will in future be coxless. However we are sure that Meredith will continue her involvement with the Club and wish her well in the future.

JEFF WYLIE MEMORIAL TROPHY

The Perpetual Shield and Trophy for the most improved lightweight rower is donated by the management and staff of Edward Lumley and Sons Pty Ltd and is awarded annually in memory of the late Jeff Wylie, a former captain of the Club.

This trophy has been won by Scott Reid. Scott was a member of the successful lightweight Eight and later competed in the lightweight Pair, Four and Eight events during the Selection and National Regattas. Scott was selected in the Australian Squad for Senior B lightweights but unfortunately was forced to withdraw due to work commitments.

We congratulate Scott on winning this trophy.

LATE F. R. BROWNE TROPHY

The Perpetual Shield and Trophy is donated by the family of the late F. R. Browne for presentation to the most improved novice rower. The Committee has determined that this award will not be presented this season due to the temporary absence of novice rowers from the Club.

H. R. FREDERICO TROPHY

This trophy made available by the Honourable Justice "Freddy" Frederico is awarded annually to the most improved oarswoman at the Club.

This year the trophy has been won by Rebecca Joyce who will have the honour of being Mercantile's first Australian representative at Senior A level following her selection as Stroke of the Women's Lightweight Senior A Four, this being achieved in her first year after leaving school. We congratulate Rebecca and offer her every support and best wishes for success in the forthcoming World Championships to be held in Bled, Yugoslavia.

THE ENDOWMENT FUND

BOATS AND EQUIPMENT

Mercantile continues to boast a fleet of equipment second to none and we are thankful for the support of members and sponsors for the continuation of this position.

As advised in the last report, Arthur Atkins has generously donated a new Eight and a set of oars for use by our senior oarsmen and delivery of this boat was taken just prior to the Victorian State Eight Championship during December.

The boat christened the *Arthur Atkins* at the Club's Christmas party is of a composite kevlar construction manufactured by Jeff Sykes and Associates of Geelong to a new design which we are confident will remain at the forefront of technology for many years to come, particularly in the light of the anticipated influx of imported boats coming to the country for next year's World Championships to be held at Lake Barrington in Tasmania.

This boat, which will be used only by our senior oarsmen, must be regarded as one of the finest craft on Australian waters and we are sure it was a great delight for Arthur to see the boat being used by the Victorian King's Cup crew and win comfortably the Interstate Men's Eight Challenge race held at Carrum in lieu of the ill fated King's Cup.

The Club also took possession of a new Sykes Heavyweight Coxed Four named *The Jabiru* made possible following the generous donation from Energy Resources of Australia Ltd. This craft is also of advanced design as the Club endeavours to provide the best possible equipment for our members in their endeavours in representing the Club and ultimately their State and Country.

As you will have read earlier in the report, Steven Reid has been awarded the Dr. R. A. Cooper Memorial Trophy for his untiring work in maintenance of the Club's fleet. He has been ably assisted again by Lindsay Wallace and the boatmen from Melbourne Grammar School and Brighton Schools, Walter Rotter and Noel McNichol respectively. We thank these

gentlemen for their work in this regard. This season has seen a resurgence in many more of our active members contributing to maintenance of the Club's equipment and while there remains much work to be done the continued cooperation of coaches and their crews will see a further improvement in the condition of the entire Club's fleet and equipment.

During the year the Club also renegotiated the boat shed lease with Brighton Grammar school and has now claimed one additional bay previously occupied by Brighton Grammar allowing better (although only just) storage of the Club's equipment.

With the addition of the *Arthur Atkins* to the Club's fleet and the refurbishment of the *John Burford* we are now able to provide two Eights and five Fours for use by our social and veteran oarsmen. We hope to promote further this area of rowing during the next season.

The racing four the *N. L. Newton* has been returned to its manufacturer, S & B for replacement and we are expecting a new vessel during the coming season. A full list of the Club's equipment and the condition thereof is detailed below.

Mr. J. G. H. Sprigg

With the death of Jim Sprigg in December last year, the Club lost not just a member and a famous one at that, but one who by his unique enthusiasm and personality had made himself almost part of the Club itself.


Jim joined the Club in 1914. He rowed in maiden (C Grade) events in 1914 and 1915 before leaving for active service overseas. On his return from the First World War, he resumed his rowing career and represented the Club in almost every category of rowing and every class of boat over the next ten years finishing up with a successful season in the Senior Eight in 1927-28. Jim was Captain in 1927-28 and again in 1930. He was elected a Vice-President in 1938 and President in 1955, an office which he filled with great distinction until his resignation in 1983. He was then nominated as the first Patron of the Club.

During his active days, Jim gave good service to the Victorian Rowing Association and in later years to the Old Oarsmens and Oarswomens Association of which he was also a patron.

Jim was always interested in crews competing for Mercantile particularly in Junior crews, and until recent years could always be found on the river bank on regatta days giving spirited encouragement to the Club's crews. Jim will perhaps best be remembered for the Sprigg Time Trial event which he initiated in 1930 and for which he presented the trophies, usually after a dramatic and sometimes fanciful oration, each year until his death.

Jim had a great enthusiasm for the Club and derived much enjoyment from it. His guiding philosophy was to ensure, as best he could, that new members coming to the Club enjoyed their rowing and their association with the Club and become part of it.

He was a valued friend to all Mercantilians whatever their age. May his memory and his message stay with us for a long time.
