We also have one member in the Lightweight Four for the World Championships in Montreal and a number of members in the Eight which will compete as representatives of the Victorian Institute of Sport at Amsterdam and Henley-on-Thames. Our various oarsmen and oarswomen in less prestigious categories had a season of varying results culminating in a large and competitive entry in the National Regatta where we were represented in twenty-four of the forty-four men's and women's events. I thank those members for their efforts and enthusiasm which I hope will provide a sound basis for success in the years to come.

Now we must plan for the future, perhaps with the Atlanta City Olympics in 1996 as our ultimate goal. We have a large and upto-date fleet of boats achieved by stretching our financial resources to the very limit. We must encourage our younger members to make full use of this our essential and most valuable asset, encourage them to enjoy their training and rowing and above all encourage them to become part of the Mercantile tradition from which our older members have derived so much satisfaction and which we value so highly.

To those older members I urge a continued support of the Club and its hard working executives, a participation in all its activities whether on or off the water and an enthusiastic interest in the members competing for us. It all helps to keep Mercantile in front.

# TO THE MEMBERS

Your committee has pleasure in submitting the 112th Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ending 30th April 1992.

You are of course able to read this report one full month earlier than usual, with the Annual General Meeting brought forward for this year only to 30th May. In reading the report I hope you will gain a personal satisfaction from the achievements of the Club and its members during the year.

The fact that the meeting is to be held one month early is due in no small way to the success of our members during the season and in their selection in a number of State and National representative crews. Many of our members would otherwise have been away overseas at the end of June, either in competition or in final stages of their preparation, and we believe that all of these members should have the opportunity of attending the Annual General meeting. The achievements of our members continue to be unparalled and are detailed throughout this report.

The Australian Heavyweight Men's Four comprising members Andrew Cooper, Michael McKay and James Tomkins, and with Nick Green of the Melbourne University Boat Club and their coach Noel Donaldson, again dominated the International Rowing scene, once again winning the Gold Medal at the World Rowing Championships and a number of other European regattas leading up to the Championships to repeat their fantastic success of the previous year.

The Olympiad of 1988 saw 5 Mercantile members selected in the Australian Eight and Coxless Pair. In 1992 10 members have been selected to represent Australia in the Men's Eight and Men's Coxless Four. We congratulate Sam Patten, Peter Murphy, Simon Spriggs, Ben Dodwell, David Colvin (Cox) and Brian Richardson (Coach) upon their selection in the Australian Men's Eight, and Andrew Cooper, Michael McKay, James Tomkins and Noel Donaldson (Coach) upon their selection in the Men's Coxless Four.

The strength of our Men's Heavyweight squad continues to grow and reflects the emphasis placed on the Club's selection policies in line with the National selection criteria established over the past 10 years. The excellent performance is again a credit to the hard work of our oarsmen and coaches and in particular Noel Donaldson and Paul McGann.

May the successes enjoyed by our crews this year carry on into the Olympic Games, and may every member feel justifiably proud of these crews when they compete in Barcelona.

We have also 6 oarsmen selected to represent a Victorian Institute of Sport crew at Royal Henley regatta. Brad Kerr, Matt Anstee, Jason Kovacic, Warwick Hooper, Tony Johnson and Brett Hayman (cox) have been selected in a development crew aimed at providing our up and coming Victorian oarsmen a taste of International experience and developing them into potential Australian representative oarsmen of the future. The last development Eight to compete at Royal Henley was in 1988, when an Australian Development Eight coached by Martin Aitken, and rowing as Mercantile was the winner of the Ladies Challenge Plate, in then, a record equalling time. May this be sufficient incentive to this year's crew to keep the winning record intact.

Derek Mollison has been successful in being selected to represent Australia at the World Lightweight Rowing Championships, where he will compete in the Men's Lightweight Coxless Four. For much of the season Derek was based in Geelong, rowing with a squad of whom many believed to be well past their peak. In fact Derek's coxless pair partner Phil Gardiner from MUBC turns 40 years of age later this year. Derek and Phil were unbeaten in Lightweight Pair oared races this season and both were rewarded with positions in the Australian Four. We congratulate Derek on this achievement and wish his crew well in Montreal.

With these fantastic results it is sometimes easy to overlook our shortcomings. Once again the lack of coaches inhibits our ability to properly boat a full range of crews particularly in the Women's areas and to a lesser degree in the Junior and Youth areas. Our Women's programmes suffer from the lack of continuity. We currently cannot put together an effective recruiting and development plan as we are continually being forced to apply short term remedies to long term solutions. The Club **must** take stock of its Women's rowing programme and strive for the same development and success as we were required to do with our Men in the early Eighties. Coaches must be found. If we fail to make it work now the opportunity will be lost for quite some time.

The 1992 Australian Rowing Championships and Kings Cup regatta were conducted for the first time at the new National Water Sports Centre at Carrum. Generally the weather conditions were ideal however strong winds on the semi finals day and both wind and rain on the Sunday of the Kings Cup tested competitors and officials alike and certainly dampened the enthusiasm of many spectators. The regatta otherwise was conducted smoothly and with many impressive performances from athletes from around the Country. There can be no doubt that the standard of Australian Rowing continues to rise. The organising committee of the Regatta including John Harry as chairman, David Pincus, John Nickson, Joe Fazio and David Boykett are to be congratulated for the success of the regatta.

Last year I raised the issue of composite crews, both locally and interstate. While the situation interstate remains too complex, Victoria has decided to take a welcome stand. In an Olympic year in particular any change in the rules, or at the least a revised interpretation of the rules could cut across many plans whether they be local or National selection policies or the personal goals of our athletes. In conjunction with policies formulated by the Victorian Institute of Sport and the Victorian Rowing Association, and certainly with the total support of Mercantile, all Clubs were obliged to enter crews in regattas leading up to and including the Victorian State Championships, only in events in which that Club was represented totally by members of that one club. All Mercantile oarsmen and women competed in the State Championships in what was probably one of our largest entries ever. With the full support of our coaches and athletes some established combinations were altered for the championships to give everyone the opportunity of racing in at least two events. The no composite ruling meant that several interstate entries were rejected for the regatta, however, Club crews from Sydney, Mosman, Torrens and Adelaide University did make the trip over, some returning home with the spoils of victory.

Mercantile obviously has a position of strength in this regard, and we were successful in a number of State Championships. However, as feared by many of the smaller Clubs, we did not dominate the regatta, and the competition provided by those clubs forced to boat solely club crews proved to be certainly stronger than they expected. I believe that this competition must be encouraged if we ourselves are to continue our own high standards. Perhaps with Olympic commitments over, the time will be ripe to further expand this policy in Victoria, and then to work through the National scene.

Those members present at the National regatta will appreciate only too well the lack of Club identity associated with the regatta by the many interstate composite crews present. Many of our own crews were well beaten by these composite crews—indeed these composites often served their purpose in putting together the fastest boat and beating our solely club crews—however the composite win achieved nothing for their Club nor for the spectators. Our policy of allowing crews to compete at the regatta perhaps without the potential of winning is I believe of greater benefit to the Club, the sport and our athletes.

There are so many people who have given enormously of their time for Mercantile, and in particular I would like to pay tribute to and thank on your behalf, our hard working executive—Bill Webster as Secretary, Susan Lee as Treasurer, Steve Reid as Boats and Equipment Manager, Andrew Cooper as Social and Fund-raising Manager and Daryl Teschendorf as Chairman of Selectors. Also to the general committee members—Andrew Evans, Warwick Hutchins, James Tomkins, Michael McKay and Felicity McCall, and the selectors—Noel Donaldson and Richard Wraith. Each member of the executive and committee has an enormous role to undertake and the success and smooth operation of the Club would not have been possible without their efforts.

So many others are listed throughout this report be they providers of financial or physical assistance and I say again on behalf of all Club members thank you to everyone who in any way has helped the Club to continue to enjoy the position of the World's number one Rowing Club.

#### TROPHIES

The following trophies will be awarded at the Annual General Meeting to be held on 30th May 1991.

## CAPTAIN'S TROPHY

This trophy is awarded annually to the member who has won the most regatta and club races during the season on the basis of one point for a win and one additional point for any championship.

This year the tophy has been won jointly by James Tomkins and Andrew Cooper.

This year, they went through the entire season undefeated in all classes of boats in which they rowed. They were members of crews that won the Victorian Championships in Senior "A" Eight and Four and then repeated the effort in the same categories plus coxless Pair in the Australian Championships (not to mention the World Champion Coxless Four).

Along with Michael McKay and Nick Green, they topped off their year by being named as Australia's Olympic representatives in the coxless Four for Barcelona.

Both are to be congratulated on a truly outstanding effort.

# DR R. A. COOPER MEMORIAL TROPHY

The family of the late Dr R. A. Cooper donate this trophy annually to the club member who in the opinion of the Committee has rendered the most outstanding service to the Club.

The Committee are delighted this year to award the trophy to Andrew Cooper.

Andrew's rowing achievements, outstanding in their own right, have been put to one side as this award was made to acknowledge his efforts in taking on the onerous responsibility of organising the social side of the Club's activities.

In an area that has often suffered from lack of interest and neglect in the past, Andrew joined the Committee after last year's General Meeting and re-invigorated the social life of the Club.

At the best of times this task is a demanding one. Andrew has managed through good promotion, hard work and enthusiasm to turn a profit of some \$8,000.00, and, as at this time of the year we have normally been looking at a break-even situation, the Committee considered this no mean feat.

On behalf of the Club members the Committee congratulates Andrew on his award and acknowledges the fact that our more successful oarsmen are returning to the club some of the benefits they have reaped by mentioning that all the members of the "Awesome Foursome" Mike McKay, James Tomkins and Andrew have served on the Committee this year. We look forward to more of our active oarsmen following this example in the future.

## MAX BAILEY TROPHY

This perpetual shield and trophy is awarded to the coxswain who has won the most regatta and club races during the season.

The trophy this year goes to Brett Hayman who won ten races during the season. Brett's season is covered more fully later in this report as he is a dual winner having also won the Norm Cairnes Trophy.

#### H. R. FREDERICO TROPHY

This trophy is made available by the Honourable Justice Frederico for presentation to the most improved oarswoman in the club.

The recipient this year is Pip Cant.

Pip joined Mercantile from R.M.I.T. and this is her first full year's rowing. Pip has virtually gone from novice to Women's Senior A in this year and if she were to continue to improve at this rate, great things could surely be expected from her in years to come.

We congratulate Pip on winning this award. It is around Pip and her ilk that Mercantile hopes to greatly strengthen the women's rowing division of the club in years to come.

## N. W. CAIRNES TROPHY

One of our more famous and successful coaches and current Vice-President Mr Norman Cairnes makes this trophy available for the most improved coxswain for the season and this has been won this year by Brett Hayman.

As well as being our most successful cox, Brett was also considered by the Committee to have developed considerably as a coxswain during the season.

Brett, who was the youth cox eight last year, progressed to being perhaps the second most senior cox in the Club to steer our Senior "B" and some Lightweight crews this year and capped off a very successful season by being named as coxswain of the VIS development eight which will be racing in the United Kingdom this year at "Royal Henley".

# JEFF WYLIE MEMORIAL TROPHY

This perpetual shield and trophy is donated by Edward Lumley and Sons Pty Ltd in memory of Jeff Wylie who was tragically killed whilst serving as Captain of the Club.

It is awarded to the most improved lightweight rower(s) and this year has been jointly won by Andrew Glass and Nick Sadler.

Andrew and Nick, in only their second year at the Club have rowed in all the lightweight crews—Eights, Fours and Pairs during the season. Having several wins and a number of close placings, both these members demonstrated that they will be outstanding oarsmen in the not so distant future. It is the young lightweight oarsmen such as Nick and Andrew that Mercantile is relying on to restore it to its rightful place as the top lightweight club in Australia.

#### LATE F. R. BROWNE TROPHY

For many years this trophy has been awarded to the most improved novice oarsman although in recent years due to the lower novice numbers at the Club the Junior and Youth areas have been included in the selection criteria.

This year the Committee has decided that, with the paucity of novice oarsman in the club, and the difficulty of selecting candidates from the Junior & Youth ranks who are in their first season at the Club, the criteria for the award should be expanded. Therefore this trophy will be now be awarded to the most improved oarsman overall, a previously unrecognised and long overdue category.

It will come as no surprise to members that this year's winner is Ben Dodwell. Ben's climb this year has been meteoric.

From a disappointing Senior "B" season last year he has progressed this year to selection in a key seat of the Australian Olympic Eight. Starting the season with victory in the Mercantile State Champion Senior Eight, he followed this with some fine performances during the Season including the final National selection trial in the Men's coxless Pair race where, combining with Peter Murphy he came third, yielding by just a narrow margin to the two Pairs made up by members from the "Awesome Foursome".

He was also a member of the winning Victorian Kings Cup Eight and showed potential to follow in some Awesome footsteps when he topped the Australian Ergometer rankings—all at the tender age of nineteen.

From Senior "B" to Olympic Eight in one year. We congratulate Ben on this outstanding achievement and pay tribute to his coaches Noel Donaldson, Brian Richardson and in particular Paul McGann for their assistance in Ben's great leap forward.

We are delighted to have such a worthy winner for this re-constituted award. The perpetual shield and trophy are donated by the family of the late F. R. Browne.

# **ROWING—GENERAL**

"Psychoanalytic images of the rower depict him or her either as an erotomaniac or as a saintly masochist."

We tried a new approach this season in an effort to increase cooperation between rowers, coaches and selectors.

Regular coaches meetings were held to discuss boat allocations, coaching and training programmes and developments as well as establishing a coaching "Think Tank" where a flow of ideas could be considered.

Noel Donaldson's direction and input was invaluable. Next season, with the assistance of Noel we are endeavouring to develop an even more effective coaching support group.

Coupled with these coaches meetings regular group meetings were also held with our oarsmen and women, to acquaint them with such matters as committee decisions, selection policies, programmes, club events and matters in general. The support of our athletes for these meetings was welcomed. These meetings will be ongoing in order to involve all our athletes in the Club and the various decision making processes.

One of our major objectives next season is to introduce a more professional approach to training and coaching methods so as to attract more young people into rowing at Mercantile.

This season we introduced a 4 year development programme for heavyweight and lightweight men. The programme was named "Atlanta Assault 1992-96". It began with a recruiting day, targeting oarsmen for junior, youth and our development squads.

Prospective recruits were introduced to members of the "Awesome Foursome" and our Senior A squad and boated with these experienced oarsmen. This "interlink" system blends experience with youth and has the potential to fast-track youth development programmes.

Both Paul McGann and Noel Donaldson contributed valuable time and expertise to this programme and the Club hopes that they can find the time next season to take this project on to Stage 2.

The other successful aspect of our interlink strategy in recruiting was the development of a very successful lightweight squad under the enthusiastic direction of Richard Wraith. Richard's lightweight squad was the most successful group to develop this season and we anticipate this squad expanding and developing as their program develops through to Senior A level.

Our women's programme was based around the Heavyweight A & B squads. Peter Philp committed himself to taking the A Squad through to the Nationals and Phil Ainsworth joined Peter during the season and coached the B squad. Our primary aim for next season is to develop these squads based around these experienced oarswomen.

It was pleasing to see our Youth programme develop this season, and with the experience our coaches have gained this year, we are on track toward greater achievements next season.

The recruiting and development cycle for our youth programme is 3 years, and with a fresh start to recruiting and training methods this year we expect 1992-3 to be far more rewarding for coaches and rowers alike.

Two of the key areas we concentrated on developing this year were:

- Expanding our depth of coaches and increasing the knowledge base.
- Increasing the opportunities for recruiting members at all levels to row at Mercantile.

It is becoming more difficult to attract coaches due to economic conditions. People are finding it more difficult to make the time allowances needed to coach, also there are many good coaches being attracted to schools were there are job opportunities or at least remuneration for services rendered.

Being able to recruit dedicated and committed coaches to fill all the areas of our rowing programme is the biggest challenge we have facing us at the moment.

Our coaches this year have been exceptional in the way they have communicated and co-operated with each other. Not all their aims and goals have been achieved this season but they have established a solid support base to build on and strengthen for next season.

Each season we continue our recruiting programmes, however next season we must endeavour to compete at more V.R.A. regattas in both the city and the country. This is by far the most effective way of introducing our club to new recruits as we have a captive audience when we are present and competing.

Finally, on behalf of the selectors and committee we congratulate all oarspersons and coxswains who represented Mercantile this year and to their coaches, well done.

#### BOATS AND EQUIPMENT

During the season we continued our plans of up-grading the fleet as much as finance would permit.

While in season 1990-91 we concentrated on improving the quality of our Eights and Fours, in 1991-92 the emphasis was placed on our coxless Pairs.

Three Sykes coxless pairs of nomex construction were acquired during the year which have been allocated one each to our Heavyweight Men, our Lightweight Men and our Heavyweight Women. The boats have been named **Sam Patten**, **Michael McKay** and **Andrew Cooper**.

The need for a further Men's Coxed Four, and an opportunity to acquire a boat at reduced cost arose in November and with the aid of a short term loan from the Scotch-Mercantile Regatta committee a Sykes nomex coxed Four named **E C White** was purchased. The boat was used by our number two men's heavyweight Four crew otherwise known as the Four with more.

Sean Colgan (Trader AI) again made the very generous donation to the Club of a set of 10 Dreissigacker Oars which were used by our Youth Eight. We again thank Sean for his generosity to Mercantile and look forward to welcoming him back to the Club when he is next in Australia.

A number of boats had not officially been christened from the previous season, and with the 4 new acquisitions, a grand christening celebration of 10 boats occurred on Sunday 1st December 1991. The Eight Jeffrey Lawrence, the Fours NW Cairnes, Noel Donaldson, EC White and Graeme McCall, and the Pairs James Tomkins, Andrew Cooper, Michael McKay, Warwick Hutchins and Peter Watkin were all christened on this day in what was truly an amazing display of new rowing craft.

#### BOAT HOUSE

Members will be aware of the continuing development of the Boathouse, particularly, the upstairs Clubrooms, Bar, Kitchen and Toilet facilities.

While we must unfortunately report that we were delayed in our major plans for the year due to problems with the issue of leases by the Melbourne City Council for all the City based boathouses, we have continued our work to bring the Clubhouse up to scratch.

A working bee during November saw all our active oarsmen and women involved in a number of projects and a major cleanout of the Clubhouse. This working bee in particular led to the replacement of the blocked and damaged drainage system at the front of the Club and connection of the western side downpipes to the drainage system. The continual flooding of the front of the Clubhouse and entrance is now a thing of the past.

During January the new Men's Toilets commenced under the supervision of vice captain Mal Batten, and only final installation of hand basins, new mirror, hand dryers, some painting and other minor work remain to be done to complete these toilets to a standard that even the Hyatt Hotel would be proud.

During March, a further working bee led to the demolition of the old Men's Toilets and part of the Gymnasium dividing wall and this has meant a greatly increased area available for the Gymnasium. Flooring protection and carpeting of this additional area in the Gymnasium will occur shortly.

Over the next season it is hoped that the additional area available in the Gymnasium will be further enhanced by installation of additional weight training equipment and relocation of some of the existing.

The relocation of the Men's changeroom has been completed save for some minor work and final painting to fully finish this area.

During the year a further set of boat racks was constructed specifically to correctly and safely house the ever-increasing number of Pair oared boats. Functions conducted in the Clubrooms continue to provide a good income and all funds from these functions are reinvested in the improvement and maintenance of the Clubrooms.

While our major plans did not get underway as proposed, we would like to take the opportunity of acknowledging the financial support provided by the following to our plans:

The first major event conducted during the season was a Victory dinner to celebrate the successive victories of the Awesome Foursome at the 1990 and 1991 World Championships. This was conducted in the Great Hall of the National Gallery on Cup Eve 4th November 1991. In a spectacular evening the crews from both years were honoured while guest speaker John Bertrand spoke of his experiences in Yachting and the Olympic Games. The South West Corner continues to function smoothly, and provides a modest income to the Club, for both the development of the Clubrooms and the purchase of equipment.

#### GENERAL

Despite our continuing success at the highest level of the sport our performance at the lower levels has not matched the heights of the mid-1980's when Mercantile crews ruled the water at every level. In parallel with this situation on the water there has been a feeling of disinterest amongst some members who despair at poor performances at local regattas.

It should be noted that for the first time in recent years Mercantile failed to win a V.R.A. premiership. This is simply not good enough for a club such as Mercantile! What the Club needs is the involvement of all its members.

Mercantile has over three hundred members and a rich rowing history, yet there are many of our members who are only seen once or twice a year. It is not enough to simply post a cheque to the Club once a year. Members need to play a greater role in the life of the Club. Memories of past success, when Mercantile victories were the rule rather than the exception, should be used to provide inspiration, a tradition and an atmosphere that surrounds our younger members and gives them a sense of what it is to be a Mercantilian.

In the past year the Club christened a record number of new boats. This has been possible only because of the efforts of the Captain, Jeff Lawrence. The fact that Mercantile has one of the best fleets in the country is a testament to his efforts.

We must also recognise the efforts of our Vice Captain Mal Batten. In the past year Mal has organised working bees to fix the drainage problem at the front of the Boatshed, the demolition of the old men's toilets and the painting and cleaning of the Clubhouse. Mal also constructed much of the new men's toilets.

Our Treasurer, Susan Lee has continued to maintain the Club's financial records in a very professional manner and capably guide the club through tough economic times.

Upon his triumphant return after the World Championships last year, Andrew Cooper stepped into the role of Social Manager. He organised a number of successful functions which managed to do something that social functions failed to do—raise a significant amount of money for the Club. We congratulate Andrew on these functions and thank him for his work in raising much needed funds for the Club.

The Victorian Institute of Sport provided a great deal of support to our members this year in their quest for selection for the Olympic Games and World Championships. We thank them for the service and support that they provide to our active members. The Victorian Institute of Sport is now in its third year and has become an established part of competitive rowing. It is up to the clubs to ensure that the Club system can survive and prosper by using the V.I.S. to full advantage. The "Yarra Bank Sprints" the Australian Indoor Rowing Championships were held for the third time last October. This event has gone from strength to strength and is now a recognised part of the regatta program and is starting to pay dividends to the Club.

Many other members have assisted the Club and it is appropriate that they be recognised in this report.

# TREASURER'S REPORT

Over the past two seasons the financial focus of our club has been to upgrade our fleet of boats. This has been achieved by stretching to the limits all our financial resources and very generous donations from our members.

In particular I would like to thank "Trader AI" (Sean Colgan) who kindly donated a further set of 10 oars. Over the past 3 seasons Trader has donated 30 carbon fibre oars to the Club, not just being of enormous value to our oarsmen and women who are using these oars but enabling the Club to purchase our very much needed boats with finance which would otherwise have had to be spent on oars.

The result has been a tremendous improvement in the condition and competitiveness of our equipment used by all our active crews.

The South West corner has provided \$11,000 towards the purchase of equipment and we are grateful, once again, for the generous donation of barrels from Carlton United Breweries.

Andrew Cooper, as Social Manager seems to have turned his "green thumb" for landscape gardening to fundraising very successfully for the club. The social functions held throughout the year contributed in excess of \$7,000 towards equipment purchases.

However it is not without the support of our major equipment supplier Jeff Sykes & Assoc. whom provided very reasonable credit terms that many of our purchases were possible, and we thank Jeff Sykes and Associates for their assistance in this regard.

Member donations have also played a tremendous part towards financing equipment and keeping our club up and running. We thank the following members for their donations during the season.

During the past three seasons in excess of \$40,000 has been spent upgrading the Clubhouse in areas such as fire safety improvements, gymnasium and changeroom renovations, new toilets, electrical switchboard and wiring, and drainage rectification works. This work has been financed totally from members donations and hall hire receipts.

Overall the financial position of the club has improved tremendously compared to last season in terms of monies outstanding and the achievements throughout the year. However the club still exists in a "hand to mouth" state and it is only with the support of members and hard working social committee that we shall be able to achieve our goals for the coming season.

I must also thank all members who paid their subscriptions promptly during the season. Our outstanding membership amount at the end of the season has been reduced dramatically due to your help.
