PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I am very pleased to be able to tell you of the outstanding success of our renovated clubhouse. The club committee really stretched our dollar a long way, although we spent more than we originally budgeted. The extras, such as a ceiling in the auditorium, carpets, a room for management, and a room for the organisation of food, have made our clubhouse a real centre for excellence. We have not finished. When we have, it will be a centre second to none in Victoria.

It is this excellence that we strive for both in management and on the water. In management the club has been well served by its Captains of 1995 - Peter Murphy and Simon Morrison, and the committee. Jeff Lawrence has given magnificent service as Treasurer and we are all delighted to welcome Henry Edgar into that position for the coming season. Rob Manning's appointment as Club Administrator is a new position. It was a difficult decision to make, but your committee felt that it was imperative that we have a supervisory presence at the club.

We still have trouble getting our young oarspeople to work around the club. Two recent 'working bees' had four people each. This is a vital part of Mercantile tradition. We have prided ourselves in being a training ground for young people. We must improve in this area.

On the water our results have been good. We have introduced a new bunch of oarspeople to the Mecca of Rowing. They have the desire to win. Australian representation has come to seventeen members..... a wonderful effort.

But we cannot rest. We are planning for at least sixteen <u>new</u> young people to row and race next season, and a trip to Royal Henley by a Mercantile crew is planned.

I thank all coaches, and all members for their valued support this year. Rowing-wise, and financially, we are strong - due to your efforts. Let us keep building Mercantile in the years to come. Planning is one thing - making plans into reality is the challenge.

TO THE MEMBERS

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting the 115th Annual Report and Financial Statements for the Mercantile Rowing Club Inc. for the year ended 30th April 1995.

The most obvious change to the club over the past twelve months has been the renovations to the club rooms. The renovations not only provide the club with a more presentable appearance but also represent a sound investment in the future of the club. Members should be very proud to bring their guests to some of the growing number of social functions held at the club rooms. On behalf of the members I would like to thank those who invested many hours in negotiations and planning to ensure the project was completed to the high standard it has been. It is now for the committee to see that this resource is managed and maintained carefully whilst not losing sight of the fact that we are first and foremost a Rowing Club.

The committee has taken the administration of the club in a new direction this year by appointing a Club Administrator in a professional capacity. Members can be assured that this is a necessary step in ensuring the smooth and professional operation of the clubs growing administrative needs. We must recognise that as Australia's premier rowing club, running an operation which must compete successfully on the water with the growing number of professional Institutes of Sport and operate a successful social program there is a very real need for a Club Administrator. If we are to maintain our Club identity at the top level the committee must be able to call on a Club Administrator to help carry out many tasks that were simply not being done adequately.

Once again Mercantile is proud to have a large number of members in the National Teams which are detailed later in this report. Three points of significance though, are:

- The return of the Awesome Foursome to International competition
- Peter Murphy's selection in his seventh consecutive Senior National Team
- The return of a 'Mercantile' Australian Junior crew.

I feel the last point is of significance as it shows much promise for the clubs success beyond 1996. Congratulations to all members who gained Selection.

The highlight this year for me as Captain was 'The Return of the Annual Dinner' the support members gave to this function was overwhelming. It was very encouraging to see the large cross section of members in attendance all enjoying a very successful evening in our own club rooms.

Our Social Manager, Rob Manning, has done an excellent job injecting new life into our traditional Thursday evening Barrels. Rob introduced us to McRobs Burgers which helped keep the Barrel open well past Ten O'Clock regularly through the season.

As we look forward to the coming season our immediate goal is the appointment of coaches for the forthcoming season. Finding people with available time and the skills required to take our athletes to an international level is a task which I am finding takes many hours on the phone, talking to key people and keeping my ear to the ground. Over recent years schools are finding more and more money to boost their rowing programs thus attracting many of the people who might otherwise be more heavily involved at the club level. However, having said that by doing our homework we are slowly building what I believe will be an excellent group of coaches, with the ability to take our athletes to the heights we have come to expect at Mercantile.

I have made a number of references to our elite program and this is clearly the main focus of our on water activities. However at the management level of the club we must be acutely aware that the majority of members do not fall into the elite category and without these members we would not have the resources to be Mercantile Rowing Club. Philippe Batters has successfully lead a group of our more mature oarsmen back onto the water once or twice a week, they are backbone of our monthly luncheons and regulars on a Thursday evening.

Another regular crew is our 'Elite Eight' from the '60s which includes Olympians such as David Douglas and Tony Walker. These men can be seen on the water in the early hours of the morning. Mr Walker has also enjoyed coaching a senior Ladies crew who I met at the Annual Dinner. On that note I must stress to all our new members that you are most welcome to use the club facilities at your convenience and I encourage you to join in our social functions.

Finally, I would like to thank the many people who have supported me and given me guidance as Captain. I wish all members well for the coming season in all your endeavours both on and off the water.

The Perpetual Shield and Trophy for the most improved lightweight rower is donated by the management and staff of Edward Lumley and Sons Pty Ltd and is awarded annually in memory of the late Jeff Wylie, a former captain of the Club.

This trophy has been won by Redmond Lloyd. Red was a member of Rob Manning's lightweight development squad which formed the nucleus of the successful lightweight Eight at Henley. Red joined us from Caulfield Grammar School and has displayed commitment and talent in a difficult area for young oarsmen. We congratulate Red on winning this trophy.

LATE F. R. BROWNE TROPHY

The Perpetual Shield and Trophy is donated by the family of the late F. R. Browne This trophy is awarded by the committee to the most improved oarsman overall. This year the trophy has been awarded to Drew Ginn. This is a back to back win for Drew.

H. R. FREDERICO TROPHY

This trophy made available by the Honourable Justice Frederico is awarded annually to the most improved oarswoman at the Club.

This year the trophy has been won by Georgina Douglas who will have the honour of representing Australia in the women's eight this year at the World Championships. We congratulate Georgina and wish her all success at the World Championships in Finland.

KEITH BILNEY COACHES TROPHY

This trophy is awarded for the first time this year. It has been established in the memory of Keith Bilney who gave nearly 70 years of service to rowing as a coxswain, sculler, oarsman, administrator but, most of all as a coach. He gave of his time freely instilling in his charges a love of the sport, a burning desire to win but with a balanced approach to life. This trophy is awarded to the coach that is not necessarily the most successful coach in terms of race wins, it still could be, but the one who does the most to teach oarsmen & oarswomen how to

row, win races and achieve their potential and in so doing develop the foundations of the club and build and maintain the right attitudes of sportsmanship, dedication and lovalty.

With these criteria in mind the trophy has been awarded for the first time to the coach of our successful junior four, Peter Somerville. Peter has put in countless hours of work to bring his charges up to a standard high enough for them to be selected to represent Australia at the Junior World Championships in the Coxless Four. He has imbued in them a sense of pride in themselves and in the club and guided them to many race wins while maintaining a sense of humility. We congratulate Peter on being such a worthy first recipient of this award.

OBITUARY

KEITH ALEXANDER BILNEY

With the death of Keith Bilney in September last year Mercantile and Victorian rowing lost one of their most unselfish quiet achievers who gave nearly 70 years of service to the sport.

Keith was first introduced to Mercantile as a coxswain by Ron Shannon during the 1926-27 season. During his coxing career he won Most Improved Coxswain and then twice won Champion Coxswain. He then moved on to rowing as a lightweight when the limit was 10 stone (63.5 kg) and was a member of the Mercantile crew that visited Sydney in 1937.

Following World War II, amongst other things, he won the Herald Shield for scullers and stroked the Mercantile Senior 4 at Henley in 1946. He retired from active rowing shortly after only to begin coaching maiden and Junior crews at Mercantile in 1950.

In 1961 he turned his hand to lightweight rowing and produced the Victorian Champion lightweight four that went on to represent Victoria for the Penrith Cup. The next year he again coached the Penrith cup crew that still holds the record for the largest winning margin. That crew later formed the nucleus of the first Australian Champion Lightweight 8.

He went on to coach more Victorian and Intervarsity crews but the highlight of his career was coaching the first Australian Awesome Foursome Coxless Four to the Olympic Games at Tokyo in 1964.

In 1965 Keith moved to coaching school crews at Melbourne High and then Carey in 1966. He helped establish rowing at Carey and ultimately coached crews at all levels from the boys and girls firsts down to the very beginners. He remained interested and involved in Carey rowing almost to his last days.

During the 80's and early 90's his passion for coaching was boosted by the involvement of four of his five grandsons in rowing. The Ryan boys in the USA, all of whom rowed for the USA at the Junior World Championships, and Richard Wraith for Wesley, Mercantile and Australia at Junior and Senior B level.

In his later years he could be seen toiling his way up and back along the bike track with his old tin megaphone in his hand encouraging his stable of enthusiastic scullers. In fact he rode over 25 km coaching, on his bike, a little more than a week before he died.

A memorial service was held in his honour on Sunday 9 October at Mercantile and a large crowd listened to moving speeches from David Boykett, Daryl Wraith his son in law, David Hume and Geoff Thomas from Carey and witnessed the spreading of his ashes on the grass and in the river in front of the club as he requested.

Coaching rowing was his great love and over the years he was more than happy to offer his services to anyone who asked. He ran coaching courses complete with slides and diagrams long before the level 1 and level 2 courses were ever thought of. He coached crews and scullers from at least 14 clubs and schools, one way or another, over his career. All this would not have been possible without the never ending support of his wife Bernice. The work she put in gave him the extraordinary amount of time needed to contribute so much to rowing. To honour his memory the Keith Bilney Memorial Trust Fund has been established to provide funds for coaching education and development at Mercantile and an annual trophy to be presented at the AGM to the coach who best exemplifies the qualities of the ideal coach at Mercantile.

Rowing - General

The last year has seen radical changes made to the method of selection for all of our National Teams. With the appointment of a new National Head Coach has come a new year-round training program as well as a new format for team selection.

These changes follow what, by comparison to previous years, was a less successful World championships in Indianapolis, USA. This has resulted in a national program designed to follow the European season, and major selection criteria on-water based around a 5000m. time trials. The unfortunate down side to these changes is that our elite athletes have had fewer opportunities to race over 2000m. against their opposition than ever before. However, we look forward to the forthcoming World Championships in Finland to see how the results of the new National Program.

On the home court, it is now more important than ever, that Mercantile look to furthering the development of its new and younger athletes and coaches. To that end, it is extremely good news to see Peter Somerville's junior four being selected for the Junior World Championships, a first for Mercantile since Phil Ainsworth era of the 1980's, as well as Rob Manning's young lightweight squad, and Nick Boileau's youth women's squad.

Remembering the results of this and the next few years are the Olympians of Sydney in the year 2000, it is critical that we combine to develop our ranks in the younger age groups.

Finally, I wish to congratulate all members on their respective success throughout the last season. Success never comes easily, so any rewards are richly deserved.

BOATS AND EQUIPMENT

The 1994-95 rowing season saw Mercantile consolidate it's fleet of superb rowing equipment. Although we did not buy any new boats, those boats which are part of our fleet were overhauled and maintained to their highest level. Members must be thanked for their part in keeping the fleet clean and operational.

The two Nomex pairs purchased from Jeff Sykes last year, remain the newest boats in our fleet of pairs. One of the boats was named the "David Yunghanns," in appreciation of his service to the club. The boat christening took place at the Presidents lunch in December 1994. The committee is yet to determine a name for the other pair. Both pairs were used this year by our Under 22 men.

Sean "Trader Al" Colgan continued his very generous support of Mercantile by donating another ten Cleaver Blade Carbon Fibre oars. These oars were used by the United States men's lightweight eight at the 1994 World Championships in the USA. The oars were used by the Mercantile senior eight which won several major races this season, including The Head of the Yarra.

The colours of Mercantile have often been neglected from the equipment. This year, however, it was decided that the blades of all oars should be repainted and a blue stripe added to the tip of the blade. Thanks go to Warwick Hutchins and his employees for providing the necessary materials to paint the blades. Most of the

clubs oars have now been painted and the distinctive blue stripe makes Mercantile crews more easily identifiable.

The emphasis placed on safety has been increased this year. With the popularity of rowing increasing, more and more inexperienced athletes are using the Yarra river for their training Melbourne Water are beginning to enforce the long standing regulation regarding lights. The regulation requires all boats on the water during non daylight hours to display a light which is visible through 360 degrees. Members should note that fines of up to \$1000 are levied the crews concerned not the club.

The "J G H Sprigg" has undergone a complete overhaul by boat builder Walter Rotter. Walter has achieved fantastic results in his rejuvenation of the "J G H Sprigg" which has been in our fleet since 1983. We extend our thanks to Walter for his magnificent effort. The Veteran VIII are planning to race the "Sprigg" at this years Masters Games to be held on Albert Park Lake.

This year also saw a complete rewiring of the club boat trailer and an overhaul of the ergometers.

BUILDING REPORT

In May 1994 Mercantile embarked on it's most ambitious rebuilding program since the great fire of 1973. A rebuilding sub committee comprising Jeff Lawrence, Andrew Evans and Warwick Hutchins was formed to liaise with the club architect Anthony Lucas in the finalisation of the design and working drawings for submission to tender.

Using as a basis, the famous "Boat House Row" in Philadelphia USA, the sub committee settled on an innovative set of designs incorporating a clerestory ceiling effect to highlight the interior of the front of the boat house and incorporating a balcony and a gabled front elevation in the design to provide a relief to the stark existing structure.

Thus the whole of the exterior was remodelled to effectively harmonise with the newly completed Melbourne Rowing Club next door in an effort to give cohesion and approximate similarity to both boat houses and hopefully to set a pattern for any future redevelopment or renovation along the river bank. The entrance stairs were repositioned to the side of the club and the interior was completely rebuilt around the centre piece of the new bar which was designed with the invaluable input of David Yunghanns. Fold up doors gave access to both the balcony and the rear section of the club house enabling the bar area to be completely isolated when necessary.

The successful tender was, happily, a long standing club member and well known Australian light weight oarsman Malcolm Robertson, his crew commenced work in May 1994. The work proceeded with only the normal delays expected with any extensive renovation works of this nature, and the entire works were finished to operational status save for minor finishing touches in August 1994.

Not only have the renovations enhanced the overall look of the club but they have also made the club more amenable to social functions thus promoting that important aspect of club life. Mercantile now has a boat house to be proud of, equal to any and superior to most on the river bank.

However it should be made clear to all members that your committee, in authorising such extensive works, has committed the club to an ongoing financial responsibility and it is incumbent on all members, both young and old to support the club in it's efforts to extinguish the debt in the shortest possible time frame. TREASURERS REPORT

As with our success on the water, the financial strength of the Club continues to improve as new directions and member activities see an increase in the benefits of membership of the Club.

As mentioned elsewhere in this report, the focus of the Club during the past season, particularly from a financial point of view, has been in the fantastic building renovation program undertaken during which over \$215,000 has been spent in providing the first class clubrooms which we enjoy today.

To undertake the building works the Club has entered a 10 year loan program with our bankers. Westpac Banking Corporation for borrowings of \$75,000 which has been guaranteed by 10 members of the Club. Other borrowings were obtained from the Mercantile Endowment Fund (\$14,364) and the Scotch Mercantile Regatta Trust (\$5,000)

During the past few years some funding has been set aside for this work, and long term lease arrangements were completed with our sub tenant Brighton Grammar School who provided a capital contribution in return, and while the Committee agreed to additional works some \$60,000 over our initial budget, this was achieved without increasing borrowings beyond the original limits sought by the Club.

While the additional works necessitated a temporary halt to our annual boat replacement program as available funds were diverted to the Building, the final works completed have exceeded everyones expectations. Next season further works will see Heating and Airconditioning and the memorabilia collection completed, while it is also hoped that other neglected areas such as the Gymnasium can be improved.

Once again **Cartton & United Brewerles** have continued their magnificent financial support of the Club both in product and financial assistance. This is the third year of a five year agreement with Cartton & United Breweries which this year saw us receive the amount of \$11,500 plus 60 barrels of their delightful products. Also a significant sum was donated to assist in the renovation of the new bar. We thank Cartton & United Breweries for their continued support.

Sean "Trader AI" Colgan continued his magnificent assistance to the Club with the donation of a further set of 10 Carbon Fibre Oars and also a sum to assist in the Building works.

In addition to the above, during the Season the Club also received generous donations from a number of members as follows: Andrew Guerin, Harry Mahoney, Peter Boykett, Ketth Bliney, Graeme Richardson, Graeme McCall, Bill Unwin, Phil Alnsworth, Ian Duthie, Rob Connolly, Justice Hubert Frederico, Vic Mulder, Norm Calrnes, Russ White, David Boykett and Stephen Gillon. Thank you to all these members for their kind assistance.
