

Not only did they recruit and train crews well in our traditional areas such as the Men's Youth Eight, but they also had great success in Novice, Intermediate, Senior and Elite divisions. This resulted in us being the most successful club at the State Championships with winning crews in divisions from Novice to Elite. Your Committee is confident of improving the Club's success and rowing activity at all levels within the Club next season.

Mention must also be made of the continued growth of Masters and Social rowing at the Club. Many members enjoyed participating and winning at the FISA Masters regatta in Adelaide last November. Also the Thursday evening social rowers continue to grow in number and Philippe Batters is already requesting more eights for his squad! Well done to all these members.

I congratulate those many members who have been selected into the national teams and to all our race winners throughout the season. Special mention must also be made of the great season enjoyed by Georgina Douglas who was named the Champion Female Athlete of the National Championships and selected as the national single sculler. Our best wishes to Gina and to our other members in the national teams with their international competitions.

This season I was particularly heartened by the increasing number of younger members wanting to take part in the management of the Club. The younger members are again the driving force behind Club endeavours. This is lifting Club spirit and flowing onto better on water performances.

TO THE MEMBERS

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting the 118th Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ending 30 April 1998.

It is very pleasing to report that the rebuilding of Mercantile as a force to be reckoned with on the water has begin. The past season has seen the Club employ our first Head Coach - Peter Somerville and also make a substantial comeback amongst the novice and intermediate ranks at local regattas.

The decision to employ a Head Coach was an important one. As the sporting world changes and becomes more professional we must also move with the times. Coaching is the single most important factor in generating success on the water. To achieve the level of success that we are aiming for, a new professional approach was crucial. We were fortunate to obtain the services of Peter, last year's scholarship coach at the AIS and Club member for over 10 years. Whilst Peter was relatively inexperienced, he is hungry for success and keen to build a career for himself as a coach. The Club is making a significant investment by creating this position, this investment should be viewed as medium to long term. I urge all members to give their full support to Peter in the coming year.

It has been a number of years since Mercantile has had a presence in Novice and Intermediate events. This year we welcomed to the Club a number of younger members who formed our Novice / Intermediate squad and revived the grand old Mercantile tradition of "Pot Hunting". Under the guidance of Paul Somerville, whom we welcome back to the Club after an absence of more than 5 years, these members raced with great enthusiasm. As a result of their efforts a number of these members are in contention for the Captain's Trophy. The success of this squad and the emergence of an Intermediate / Youth women's squad coached by Bronwyn Monger have lifted the spirit of the Club and gave us a much greater presence at regattas.

The Annual Dinner was held a few weeks ago and was a marvelous night. Congratulations to Simon Morrison who took on the task of organising this year's event. The dinner is now an established part of the Mercantile calendar, so for those members who have not yet had the pleasure mark down May 99 in your dairy. Another social event that has been a regular event for the last few years is "Barrels Bash". Sadly the organisers, Barry Gross and David Yunghanns have declared that this year's event in October will be their last. This has been our most successful social event for the last 5 years. Over \$20,000 has been raised and the challenge must now be laid down for other members to step forward and develop an idea capable of taking the place of Barrels Bash.

DR R. A. COOPER MEMORIAL TROPHY

This trophy is made available by the generosity of the family of the late Dr. R. A. Cooper and is awarded annually to the member who, during the year, has rendered the most outstanding service to the Club.

This year the Dr. R.A.Cooper trophy has been awarded to Paul Somerville. Paul coached our Under 23 Men over the winter months and during the season coached our very successful Novice / Intermediate Men's squad. Paul showed great skill in his first

season of coaching and importantly was able to generate considerable enthusiasm for rowing, winning and Mercantile amongst those he coached. Paul also managed the refurbishment of our gymnasium.

N. W. CAIRNES TROPHY

This trophy is awarded to the most improved coxswain of the season.

This the trophy has been awarded to Katie Foulkes who joined the Club earlier this season and has been selected to cox the Australian Women's Eight at the World Championships in Germany. Katie coxed our Under 23 Men's squad during the season.

JEEF WYLIE MEMORIAL TROPHY

The Perpetual Shield and Trophy for the most improved lightweight rower is donated by the management and staff of Edward Lumley and Sons Pty Ltd and is awarded annually in memory of the late Jeff Wylie, a former captain of the Club.

This trophy has been awarded to Christine Camiller. Christine joined the Club less than a year ago and after a very successful season was selected to represent in the Lightweight Scull to represent Australia at the Nations Cup in Greece.

LATE F. R. BROWNE TROPHY

The Perpetual Shield and Trophy is donated by the family of the late F. R. Browne for presentation to the most improved oarsman.

This trophy has been awarded to Travis Johnson. Travis rowed in our Men's Youth Eight this season. Travis was selected in the Victorian crew which won the Wilkinson Cup at the Interstate Regatta. After the National Championships was given the opportunity to replace Simon Gadsden's pair partner in the National Team Trials. Travis rowed with great distinction for someone so young and only narrowly missed out on being selected in the team for the Nations Cup. Travis has a very bright future at Mercantile.

H.R. FREDERICO TROPHY

This trophy made available by the Honorable Justice H. R. Frederico is awarded annually to the most improved oarswoman at the Club.

This trophy has been awarded to Georgina Douglas. Although Georgina has won this award before, in the last couple of years she has made a brilliant transition to sculling. This season Georgina was undefeated in the single scull and was named Best Female Athlete of the National Regatta. These performances have earned her the right to represent Australia in the single scull at the World Championships in Germany.

KEITH BILNEY COACHES TROPHY

This trophy was established in the memory Keith Bilney who gave nearly 70 years of service to rowing as a coxswain, sculler, oarsman, administrator but, most of all as a coach. He gave of his time freely instilling in his charges a love of the sport, a burning

desire to win but with a balanced approach to life. This trophy is awarded to the coach that is not necessarily the most successful in terms of race wins, but the one who does the most to teach oarsmen & oarswomen how to row, win races and achieve their potential and in so doing develop the foundations of the Club and build and maintain the attitudes of sportsmanship, dedication and loyalty.

This year the trophy has been awarded to Simon Morrison. Simon coached our men's youth eight during the season. Simon was then selected to coach the State Crew as were four of Simon's Mercantile crew and went on to win the Wilkinson Cup. The attitude and approach of his crew was a tribute to Simon's coaching and exemplify what this award is all about.

GENERAL REPORT

During the last year the major focus of the Committee has been to boost the on water presence of the Club. The Committee recognised that to regain our place as the premier club in Australian Rowing priority needed to be given to coaching, recruiting, and the fleet. The first step in this process was the employment of Peter Somerville in the position of Head Coach. The duties of the Head Coach include: the design and implementation of policies for the elite development of the Club's rowers and coaches, specific coaching of the Under 23 men and women, coordination of other Club coaches, coordination of the Club's recruiting, provision of rowing advice to all members of the Club, the allocation of boats and equipment and the planning of our boat and equipment needs.

Peter has performed well in his first season. The level of both participation and success was dramatically improved on the previous season and the attention is now turned to recruiting and winter training. The signs are extremely encouraging. It must be realised though that the level to which we aspire cannot be regained instantly, but the Committee is now confidant that significant progress is being made.

A number of capital expenditure projects have been undertaken in the past year. These include the new trophy cabinet, the renovation of the men's shower and sauna and the re - carpeting of the hall and bar area. The completion of these projects brings to an end the major capital improvements for the Clubhouse which commenced four years ago. Our Clubhouse is now the best on the river bank and provides us with a considerable source of revenue enabling the Committee hold down the cost of membership. The gymnasium was also refurbished during the year. This was made possible by the generosity and hard work of Mr. Barry Gross and Mr. David Yunghanns and their annual Barrels Bash function. Mr. Paul Somerville and Mr. Geoff Barden designed the new gym layout and oversaw the work. All four members are to be congratulated for their efforts. It is intended that in the coming year some more new equipment will be purchased for the gym.

The efforts of our Treasurer, Michael Kelly deserve special praise in this report. Michael enthusiastically jumped into the role of Treasurer eventhough only in his first year out of school. He picked up the threads of Mercantile's accounts very quickly and has shown himself to be very capable, intelligent and responsible. MERCANTILE ROWING CLUB BOATS AND EQUIPMENT REPORT 1997/98

Mercantile this season was able to again increase many parts of its equipment levels while maintaining its present boats and equipment in excellent condition. This was kindly helped along by the continuous personal assistance of Mercantile members and there desire to see Mercantile at the top of rowing. The three most noticeable changes are the addition of two more new ergo's and a new nomex coxless four the "David Boykett" and a new coxless racing pair. Another new coxless racing pair has also been ordered and will be delivered over winter.

The new ergo's are part of a change over of our aging ergo's that was begun last year. This has kindly been organised by David Boykett with the assistance of Firbank Girls Grammar.

A serious boat trailer accident in November last year meant that four of our boats needed major repairs, these were very well done and the boats are now in "As New" condition. The "E. C. White" has since been sold and it is intended to purchase a medium sized coxed four as a replacement. Also sold this year were the "Fosters Lager", "Octa Wilson" and the "Jo Jo Doyle". Minor repairs particularly to our pairs were a significant cost in the past year. The eight Jeffrey Lawrence 1 was fully reconditioned prior to last season and remains in excellent order. With the increased demand this year on boats it is very important for all rowers to look after their equipment in a meticulous manner.

Thanks must also go out also to Walter Rotter for the repairs he has done on various boats in the shed and those who helped with boat repairs.

Rowing - Head Coach Report

From a rowing point of view, this past year has been a period of growth for the Mercantile Rowing Club. If 1997 is seen as a low point for the club in terms of numbers competing and using the substantial facilities of the club, then 1998 should be seen as the year in which the sleeping giant woke.

This year the club has been successful in assisting the highest number of athletes from Victoria and possibly Australia into the Australian Senior Rowing Team. Mike McKay, James Tomkins, Drew Ginn will represent our country in Cologne in the coxed four and the coxed and coxless pairs. Gina Douglas, crowned Australia's top female athlete at the National Regatta and King's Cup, has achieved her aim of winning the right to race at the worlds in the single scull. Ben Dodwell competes for Australia in the coxless four after his crew won the right to race in the this class after being undefeated through all the selection trials.

Our coxswains continue to dominate Australian rowing. The prince of coxes, David Colvin, has again been selected to cox the Australian Eight, with the aim of going two places better than last year's bronze. Katie Foulkes has been chosen as cox of the women's eight. This is great for Katie, as she is young, keen and will keep getting better for a long while yet.

Simon Gadsden will represent Australia for the fourth year straight, since leaving school, this year in the Under 23 Eight to compete in the Nation's Cup. Christine Camiller, has also been chosen for the Nation's Cup team. This has been a great performance as it is her first cap ever, and she only transferred to Mercantile in October last year.

Noel Donaldson will coach the oarsome foursome and Gina Douglas, and I have been lucky enough to be chosen to coach Christine Camiller in her efforts to win at the Nation's Cup. More good news (I think) is that Noel has been appointed King of the Kids, and apart from all his current commitments will act as the Head Coach of the Nation's Cup team in Greece.

These results are great and we all congratulate these athletes on their selection. Just as important from a club point of view has been the resurgence of athletes wearing the red and white in the lower end of the rowing spectrum. The club has won more novice and intermediate races this year than in living memory. The challenge for these athletes is to take these results a step further next year. Both our men's and women's youth eights had great years, with numerous members making the state team.

Perhaps the best improvement in the club over the past year has been the number and quality of the coaching staff. Not only has the club financed a professional Head

Coach, but the other coaches have simply done stunning jobs to raise the standard of rowing here. Paul Somerville completed a great year, in which he recruited a squad of athletes who consistently won week in and week out. The athletes under his guidance formed the social backbone of the club. Paul is currently organising the younger girls into what will be Mercantile's best effort yet in getting members into the youth eight. Simon Morrison won the right to coach the Victorian Youth Eight, which he did to wins in the Interstate Youth race (the Wilkinson Cup), and more impressively, the national senior B eight title. Bronwyn Hall (Monger) recruited a large squad of young girls who also won many regattas and state titles. Other coaches who guided crews and athletes this year are John (Larry) Leeming and of course Noel Donaldson and Peter Somerville.

The veteran athletes (we can call them athletes I suppose!) had a good year. In fact after the World Masters Championships Regatta in Adelaide this year the club now boasts some more world champions. Our Masters D crew of Graeme Boykett, Greg Johnston, David Douglas, Stephen Gillon and cox Bill Webster were consistently the fastest in their division in both fours and eights. Other gold medalists included Sam Patten, Dick Garrard, Peter Philp, Tony Inglis, Libby Douglas, Robyn Brooks, Robyn Taylor and Annita Robson.

TREASURERS REPORT

Over the past club financial year, a number of important thing have been achieved. I will start with the work done on the clubhouse. The most significant improvement has been the refurbishment of the gymnasium, complete with new carpet, paint and a number of new exercise machines. The funding for this redevelopment came largely from the highly successful 'Barrel's Bash' function, whose organisers need to be thanked. In addition to this was the purchase early in the year of four new Rowing Ergometers, co-owned with Firbank school. As I write this report these new facilities are being well utilised by many Mercantilians, keen to improve their performances on the water.

In terms of Rowing equipment, the club has just passed through the first year of a structured boat replacement plan, designed to keep the fleet at the cutting edge of technology on into the future. To this end the club has purchased two single sculls complete with oars as well as a second hand (ex AIS) coxless four and a brand new Sykes coxless pair. These purchases have significantly improved the boats available for our Senior B' athletes. In addition to these, a coaching motor boat and related safety equipment has also been purchased.

Debt reduction was also a primary concern for the past twelve months with a little under \$18,000 being contributed to loan repayments. This has seen the building loan reduced to \$42,200. Another major step forward has been the provision of funds to allow the employment of Peter Somerville, the club's professional head coach.

I would like to take this opportunity to publicly acknowledge the support of Carlton and United Breweries whose continued sponsorship of the club (recently renegotiated by Andrew Evans) is a vital source of revenue. Also the management of the Social functions which utilise the clubrooms, by Kathy Powers of Degrees Catering is a vital source of funding, now more important to the club than any other single source of revenue.

A significant number of members have made donations to the club over the past year, be those monetary, prizes for raffles and auctions or simply the giving of time to the club. All are noticed and all are appreciated. Thank you. Thank you also to those members who stay financial with the club, your assistance is greatly appreciated. However, I must make the yearly plea for members to **pay their subscriptions**, as this will allow the club to continue to grow in the way it has in the past year. With nearly \$34,000 of uncollected subscription fees for the past year, it is easy to see the potential benefits of improved response in this area.
