General intent of changes:

- 1. Introduction of Associate Membership, being those members who do not have a right to use the club's boats and oars.
- 2. Deletion of amateur rule as it no longer applies in rowing in Australia.

Details of changes:

- 1. The addition of Associate members to rule Rule 4 (1) as follows: The Club shall consist of Life, Senior, Junior, Honorary, Associate, Temporary and Country
 - Members,
- 2. The removal of Rule 4 (2).

All Members shall be bona fide amateurs according to the definition laid down by the Victorian Rowing Association Inc.

3. The addition of Associate members to rule 4 (6) as follows:

Life, Senior and Country Members shall have all the rights and privileges of membership of the Club and shall be eligible for election to any executive office or to a seat on the Committee, Junior Members shall not be entitled to have any voice or voting power at any General Meeting of the Club nor hold any executive office or seat on the Committee. Associate Members shall have all the rights and privileges of membership of the Club but no rights to use the boats and oars of the Club.

- 4. To elect office bearers for the ensuing year.
- 5. Presentation of Trophies and Awards.
- General Business
- 7. Any other General Business that may legally be brought forward.

Nominations for Office-Bearers for the ensuing year close on the notice board at the Clubhouse on Saturday 30th June 2007 at 4.00pm.

My thanks to Bill Webster for his continuous hard work as the longest serving club Secretary in our history. We have made him Secretary for Life whether he likes it or not! We would all be at sea if it wasn't for his unselfish devotion to the club and the amount of time that he puts into rowing in general.

Thank you to Tom Courtney for such a successful season and for managing our athletes so well.

John Nickson has completed a wonderful year as Treasurer and has brought his many years of elite business skills to the club to properly ground our financial position. We are blessed to have him and are very grateful for his guidance.

Where would we be without Mark Groves who attends to everything and anything to do with the clubhouse and spends endless hours with Melbourne City Council protecting and promoting our interests.

Our coaches have completed a very good year and they unselfishly spend a huge amount of time, year in and year out, in rain or shine for no financial reward. These gentlemen are David "Chipper" Colvin, Bill Tait, Simon Harrison, Peter Somerville, Peter Woollard and David Fraumano.

I would also like to recall a special thanks to David Orchert for the years he spent coaching at Mercantile and to wish him every success in the future.

Our captain Henry Edgar has been a great driving force in the club and his energy and competence is greatly appreciated.

Thank you to our committee members Jenny Fraumano, Dale Forbes, Fleur Chew, Nick Mitchell, Mick Young, Tom Nickson, Anthony Bergelin and Mark Groves.

Where would we be without our athletes? These marvellous men and women who year in and year out strive to achieve and they certainly have succeeded. Their successes will be recorded in detail in other reports.

However, things are far from perfect and we need continual renewal and enterprise to keep our place as the Mecca of Rowing.

Rowing is entering a very difficult time finding young athletes keen to pursue excellence in our sport. There are now so many choices available for young people and so many demands on their time with study, employment and recreation. A further problem is that many 1st VIII crew are fed up with the pressure when they leave school and are not prepared to re-engage

with that pressure when they enter club rowing and so recruiting numbers are down all over the country.

We just can't accept the reduced ranks without a struggle so we need to be innovative in what we do to ensure that our supply of athletes if sufficient for our needs.

Our finances are fragile as we do not have a major sponsor and rely on our members to finance our activities. I ask that all members pay they membership and racing fees promptly. We have a body of members that are tardy in their payments and this brings the whole club into danger. Serial non-payers will be deleted from the membership list after appropriate warning. If you have hardship please contact Bill Webster and appropriate arrangements can be made discreetly.

The club has major access problems with car parking and this is particularly difficult for our old members. Consideration is being given to running a mini bus service to the club from a nearby location with easier parking for major club functions or our senior citizen members. They have contributed so much to Mercantile and deserve to be included in our major activities without the current difficulties.

I urge all to attend our club functions and to attend the barrel on Thursdays and Sundays. This is where we receive much needed funds for the club.

Without doubt the most important message that I can deliver is that we must ensure that our financial basis is very sound so that Mercantile can power into the future. We have a number of tax deductible funds that you can donate to and Andrew Guerin would be delighted to explain them to you in detail if you are able to contribute. Our plan is to have a corpus of money, which can fund our boats and equipment purchases going forward. These donations will not disappear into general revenue and it is vital to send this message to our members.

Congratulations to our former President Andrew Guerin on his election to Rowing Victoria. His expertise will be much appreciated through out the rowing community. Special and constant thank you to "Trader Al" Sean Colgan for his exceedingly generous donation to the equipment fund. Sean's son Driu rowed during the season with Mercantile and won a Victorian Championship and a medal at the National Championship.

Thank you to James Harvey for his great help in mustering the older Mercantilians and for his sage advice.

Tom Nickson is applauded for his very successful year as social manager and specially for his brilliance in organising the Post- Nationals party at the club, which raised a tidy profit.

A Mercantilian many forget to remember is Roger Wilson who has been a constant commentator around the country for many years. Vice-President Roger is a legend in rowing and we are very proud to call him our own.

Finally, I sent out a questionnaire to the members recently and we have received approximately 40 replies. This is very necessary information for the committee to plan for the future and I ask that you return the filled out questionnaire promptly. TO THE MEMBERS

On behalf of the Mercantile Committee it is my pleasure to submit the 127th Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ending 30 April 2007.

In my first year as Captain of Mercantile, the club has had what I will describe as a normal year. Outstanding results on the water and steady progress by the club in support of these results.

Australian Representation

The focus of our rowing program and what we are most proud of at Mercantile is our international representatives. So it was most pleasing in 2006, to see so many not just representing but also winning medals.

Looking forward, Mercantilian's have once again achieved a strong level of representation on National teams. I would like to add my congratulations to all those selected to represent Mercantile for Australia. We all have much too look forward to.

Nationals

It was another outstanding set of results from Mercantile at the National Championships at Nagambie Lakes. Equal 2nd in the National medal tally. Mercantile had athletes in no less than 21 medal winning crews and 8 of these were GOLD. To some degree this has been helped by the vast array of composite crews that our athletes were spread amongst. However, with a program that is designed to deliver individuals into national teams this is the way forward. It also appears that there is no shortage of rowers from other clubs around Australia who jump at the chance to row in a crew with a Mercantilian.

Awards

At the recent Rowing Victoria Awards Night, Mercantile were winners of the Men's A Grade Premiership. This is an award not won by the club since 1995. This demonstrates resurgence in the depth of our Men's squad and should hopefully move its way through to victories in the key big boat events on the calendar.

Katrina Garvey was the winner of the Female A Grade Rower of the Year. This award recognises the strong year that Katrina has had in both sculling and sweep events. David Colvin was also acknowledged by Rowing Victoria for his contributions to coaching of Mercantile and Victoria.

Rowing Department

Tom Courtney has once again demonstrated that his program for getting athletes onto national teams has been a success. Mercantilian's won some 83 medals and pots throughout the season. This is a substantial increase over previous years. The other coaches within this program also deserve our thanks and acknowledgement.

Women's Henley & Henley Royal Regatta

In the early part of the club's year, much effort was put into the preparation and fundraising for our Men's and Women's quad sculls rowing at Henley. Both crews represented the club well and importantly gave all athletes involved a great launching pad into the coming season. The best example of this was Tommy Bertrand's subsequent success at the Nationals and National

Selection.

Finances

A great deal of effort has gone into getting the club's finances into order this year. John Nickson is to be commended for his time and effort in both delivering auditable accounts and reorganising accounting systems. The latter makes a big difference to the way in which your committee can make responsible decisions for the allocation of funds.

At the start of the year the club initiated a new fund known as the Hubert Frederico Equipment Fund. This fund is designed to add structure to the way that the club buys its boats. In time it will also provide a lasting legacy for benefit of future members.

I would like to thank Andrew Guerin, Warwick Hutchins and Tim Frederico for each taking on the role of trustee and fund raiser. Tax deductible donations can be made to this fund. Our founding donor was the ever reliable Sean "Trader Al" Colgan. It is also worth noting that his son Driu just spent an enjoyable season rowing for Mercantile.

Equipment & Building

The Committee remains committed to upgrading facilities and equipment for all members. Mark Groves has put in a great deal of work over the past year. Especially in relation to MCC correspondence, facilities upgrade for the Head Coach's new office and new water heaters. Fleet upgrades have also been made, including 3 new boats. Also planned is a complete turnover of the club's sculls. This is designed to have a direct impact on performances at selection regattas.

Social

Continued thanks are also extended to Tracy, Paul and Tani who run the Thursday Night Barrel. This operation continues to be at the core of our weekly social fabric.

The after Nationals Party organised by Tom Nickson was also a great success. The event not only raised some \$7k but also continues the fine tradition of Mercantile showing Australia that we row hard and play hard too. It might seem unimportant, but it does play some small part in attracting athletes from other clubs around the country. They can say they have seen us do well on the water and then been to Mercs and had a good time.

Lastly, it is important for all Mercantilian's to get involved in the club. Whilst we all take great pride in the top level performances demonstrated by our athletes, it is only possible if the club is socially and financially strong. Every member has a role to play.

HEAD COACH REPORT

It's with great pleasure that I present to the members of Mercantile Rowing Club the rowing report for the 2006/2007 season.

INTERNATIONAL SUCCESS

2006 saw Mercantile members perform strongly for Australian crews at the Senior, U23 and Junior World Championships.

Drew Ginn led the charge with Gold in the Men's Pair, this time with a new partner in Duncan Free. Drew was ably assisted in his Gold Medal hunt by Robyn Selby Smith who won Gold in the coxless four and Bronze in the Women's Eight. Robyn was joined in the women's eight by Emily Martin. David Crawshay was Mercantile's other Senior World Championship representative and came 9th in the Men's Quad scull.

In the underage ranks Alex Scharp was in the Men's Quad Scull which brought home a bronze medal at the World Junior Championships, David McGrath, coxed the U23 Men's Four which obtained a silver medal and Eddie Inostroza came 6th in the U23 Lightweight pair.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Club performed strongly at the 2007 National championships placing within the top 2-3 clubs on medals won by athletes. This was a fantastic effort by all athletes and coaches. A full list of medal winners is attached to this report. Once again medals were won across a full range of categories – Men/ Women, U23, Heavyweight and Lightweight.

A highlight at the interstate regatta was David Crawshay's win in the President's Cup. This is a race which has eluded Mercantile scullers for many years and there couldn't be a more deserved winner than our own "Captain Victoria".

NATIONAL SELECTION

In April this year, Mercantile athletes competed at the National Selection Regatta at Penrith. The regatta saw the return of *James Tomkins* to the National Team in the Men's Eight, *Drew Ginn* in the Men's Pair, *David Crawshay* in the Men's Double, *Robyn Selby Smith, Sarah Outhwaite* and *Emily Martin* in the Women's Sweep Squad, *John Linke* in the U23 Men's Eight, *Tom Swann* in the U23 Men's Quad and *Tommy Bertrand* in the U23 Men's Lightweight Four. In all 9 Mercantile members made National teams.

Special mention must go to John, Tom and Tommy on their first National team appearances. Tommy and Tom are in their 2nd year out of school and John is in his first year out of school. A great effort by all three considering they are of youth age.

COACHING

Mercantile was again privileged to have the service of so many volunteer coaches. The club has more volunteer coaches coaching high end athletes than any other club in the country and this is a strength which needs to be encouraged and worked upon. Very often we all take the work that these coaches do for granted and on behalf of the whole club I would like to thank them for their tireless work. We are very much indebted to them. GENERAL REPORT

The 50th Scotch-Mercantile Regatta was held at Nagambie on Saturday 3 March and we welcomed the renewed interest and energy of both Scotch College and the Cardinal Club in the running of the regatta. To mark the occasion new perpetual trophies were established honouring four members – Robert Aitken, David Boykett, David Douglas and Drew Ginn – with a significant connection to both the school and the club. The presentation of these trophies along with the Mercantile and Cardinal Cups and of medallions to all winners continues to make our regatta special in the minds of young rowers. Our Regatta Secretary Richard Wraith does a fantastic job.

The Club and the Regatta Committee work hard to make the regatta a success but the compressed season and being reduced to a schools only format make this a difficult task. Also our members miss the formerly coveted opportunity to win a Scotch-Mercantile goblet. Next season it is again likely that that regatta will be held on the Saturday before the National Championships and will also clash with the Head of the Schoolgirls. In 2009 the Nationals may finally change to a later date and we urge Rowing Australia to fully consider the impact on States and Clubs when setting the date for the National Championships. Rowing Victoria has in the last couple of years demonstrated some leadership in working towards a structured approach to the regatta calendar. This is encouraging. The RV Competition Committee must also now consider rationalising or limiting the number of events on offer at regattas. The current plethora of events, often with small fields results in very long (boring?) regatta days. The small fields make it almost impossible for organisers to provide decent trophies.

The Committee has decided to reinstate the category of Associate Member. As before this category is aimed at those members who are not actively rowing or using the equipment but still wish to maintain a tangible and social connection with the Club. It was felt that the current structure did not adequately cater for these members. A motion to effect this change will be put to the Annual General Meeting.

A separate office space for our Head Coach has been created adjacent to the gymnasium. This provides a much better work space for both our Head Coach and administration. Thanks to Mark Groves and Jeff Thompson for their work in constructing the new office. The kayak storage container will be repositioned immediately behind the main stairs and another container placed on top for the storage of our tables and chairs. This will de-clutter the hall.

For the past two and a half years the Club has benefited from Rowing Australia's Elite Club Funding program. This recognised the role of the Club in the development and preparation for the National Team. The program ends on 30 June 2007. It will be partly replaced by a new program, the Elite Development Program. This new program is focused on the development of rowers through the Junior and Under 23 age groups and the establishment of a solid pathway through to the Senior National Team. Funding is specially provided for staff costs but requires that we do something additional to our existing activities. Consequently the Club has recently advertised for a part time Development Coach.

Thanks to the efforts of Vice Captain Fleur Chew our highly successful women's squad has

gained a sponsor – Triumph International. Triumph's support allowed the purchase of a new set of oars for the women's squad.

At the instigation of Past President Andrew Guerin a new fund – the Frederico Equipment Fund has been established. The aim is to build a fund that will in time provide for all the equipment needs of the Club. Ten percent of all donations to the fund will be capitalised until the fund reaches the required level.

Following the sad passing of Joyce Loveless late last year the Club has recently received her bequest. In accordance with her wishes the Richard Loveless Award for the Most Outstanding Female Rower has been established and will be awarded for the first time at the end of next season.

In the next year it is intended to strengthen the committee with the formation of dedicated subcommittees for finance and social with definite targets.

BUILDING AND MAINTENANCE REPORT

Throughout the course of the past year a number of smaller projects were undertaken, including the creation of a coaches room in the south west corner of the gymnasium area, replacement of the water heaters in the mens showers, additional security measures and the partial re-wiring of the Dining Room area. All in conjunction with the usual maintenance which unfortunately are often damage items that should not be occurring in the first place.

Arrangements have also been put in place to carry out the repair of the corroded columns at the front of the building and to install a new swipe card (keyless) access system to improve access control and security and to simplify administration and reduce costs. Members will be advised on the timing of the change over and how the system will be implemented in coming weeks.

Projects planned for the current club year include the refurbishment of the club's façade, balcony and entries. This work will be carried out in a series of working bees which all members will be asked to assist with. An alternative under consideration is for individuals to pay a levy in lieu of their attendance. Members will be advised.

Also planned for the current club year is the provision of a second container for storage purposes, which will free up the dining room area for future functions. Ideas for bike storage would be welcomed from members as the current arrangements aren't satisfactory and will be changed.

Overarching all these activities is the on-going effort to secure our longer term future at Boathouse No 5, Boathouse Drive. Current progress is building upon the approval by Council 18 months ago of the precinct plan which included our plans to partially rebuild and extend the club house to provide additional athlete changeroom, gymnasium and other facilities, particularly orientated toward the needs of our female membership, and fulfilling a number of other identified needs.

The Lessor as represented by the Melbourne City Council, administers the lease through it's Parks & Recreation division, who are currently drawing up new lease terms for approval by State Government and the lessees. This is a lengthy process and the potential time frame will be dependent on a number of options under consideration for inclusion in a future lease. Principle among these are lease term and rental levels.

BOATS AND EQUIPMENT REPORT 2006/07

The Head Coach has developed a complete boat replacement program for our fleet. This program takes into account our current fleet, our expected needs over the next five years and our financial capacity. The program considers the different types of boats and the needs of members in terms of both elite level competition including national selection and also recreational use. Our aim is to ensure that we have the best possible fleet of boats to satisfy our members' needs. Given the priority of pair oared rowing in terms of national selection, our pairs will be maintained as the youngest group of boats in the fleet. Fours will be renewed less regularly and eights will generally be kept until the end of their life. During 2006/2006, the club purchased three boats, a coxed four and two coxless pairs. One pair has been christened "Robyn Selby Smith" and the other will be named "Peter Philp" and christened soon, the coxed four will be named "Bill Tait". In the near future the Club will purchase 6 new racer/trainer single sculls, our old trainer sculls will be traded in as part of the deal.

Thanks must also go to Walter Rotter for the repairs he has done on various boats in the shed.

OBITUARIES

Warwick, O. (Wizzer) GRANOWSKI

A terrific example of an 'Elite Oarsman' who continued his work for, and supported Mercantile Rowing Club (in Dollars) for <u>decades</u> after his elite rowing years (1951 – 1955) were over.

Warwick was a stubborn, determined, shy, humble, gentle, inventive, strong, competitive, gregarious, perceptive, intelligent and generous man with a unique sense of humour. A born prankster. Following his time at Scotch College he made it quite clear last year that his racing years (1950 to 1955) at Mercantile Rowing Club were just the best. The luck of life found about ten likely lads from various 1949 school crews joining the club in 1950 or soon after. Warwick then rowed in Mercantile crews that won numerous State Championships, a Founders Cup (1950), four Grand Challenge Cups (1951-1954) and a Stewards Challenge (1954) at the Australian Henley Regatta.

He was in five Victorian Kings Cup crews, winning in1952-3-4 and second in 1951 and 1955. He was a World Record Holder – winning the 1954 three mile Kings Cup Race in 14 minutes 14 seconds which stands unchallenged as the distance was changed to 2,000 metres.

His interest in rowing and in Mercantile in particular was always strongly maintained. Following the 1970 destruction of the Mercantile Boathouse by fire, Warwick provided the fabricated steel for the new structure.

Throughout his life he was dedicated to the family engineering business through thick and thin. He took over the business following the death of his father when he was quite young. His skills and inventiveness gained him a wide reputation in Australia and overseas. He showed his determination in a very tough industry.

The "Wizzer" element in Warwick was just a cover for a man with many talents and a dedication to his wife and family, his business and his many other interests and his many friends - *ONE OF NATURE'S GENTLEMEN*.

John Emmert (POPS) FOLEY

John came to row at Mercantile late in 1955, to make up the crew numbers, as there were a good number of Mercantilians absent for training and competition in the 1956 Olympics. He was a few years older than the others, so that is how he acquired his Victorian nickname.

Following service in the RAAF, John completed an Economics Degree at the University of Western Australia and also took up the sport of rowing, representing Western Australia in the Kings Cup in 1949 (6) at 12s 1lb and 1950 (Stroke) at 11st 12lbs.

John coached a number of Mercantile crews including the winning Maiden VIII at Henley in 1960, and then he played the big part in setting up the rowing program at Genazzano and coaching the girls!

On his retirement from RAAF in 1975 he joined RMIT as a Planning Officer until 1991. He rowed Tuesday, Friday and Sundays.

John's keep fit rowing was in many crews with Mercantile members – most of whom he outrowed! His last crews were with Ron Richardson in the double scull "*Kamulla*" and with Bill White in a coxless racing pair on Fridays (from which they had a couple of spills) –then early in the winter of 2006 the decision was taken that the landing was a bit slippery and dangerous so they then did their 'miles' in the Mercs Gym on the ergometers, bikes, weights and other torturous equipment.

The Sunday Morning Barrel boys have virtues that on their birthdays (most) *shout the bar*. Sometimes the shout may be a little late but they get there. This February, sure enough, Pops arranged for Geraldine to shout the bar on his behalf for his 81st birthday in January.

Joan CARR

Joan was the widow of John "Thumbscrew" Carr. She was a marvellous supporter of Mercantile over many years and much remembered for the etching she drew in the late 1960's of the old clubhouse. This is an ending of a long family association with the Club and we pass on our deepest condolences to the family.

Harold WALKER

Harry joined Mercantile in 1952 and was taught to tow by Bill Shears. In 1953 he rowed in a strong maiden eight stroked by David Boykett and coached by Jack Shears. Later he rowed Junior VIII's and IV's before retiring. Harry was a very popular man in the Southwest Corner on Sundays.

FINANCE REPORT

The 2006/7 year has again been financially challenging for Mercantile, balancing income from subscriptions, leasing (both boat space and catering), elite club funding, the Victorian Institute of Sport, and members generous donations, against the cost of providing the best possible fleet for members and maintaining the Clubhouse to its current state. This has been a constant theme in past Treasurer's Report.

In the current year, the Club's fleet was added to with the purchase of two near new pair/double sculls via the Australian Institute of Sport and a new coxed four. The cost of these boats was partially offset through the disposal of a number of our older boats, as we aim to provide active members with the best equipment we can afford. The current year will be no exception with a proposal to purchase a fleet of sculls, for club training and, if possible, additional sweep oared boats. Our Master rowers also require competitive equipment. It is the committee's hope that funds will be available from the recently established Frederico Fund (refer to comments made earlier on the Clubs Trust Funds), from donations channelled through the Australian Sports Commission.

As mentioned in previous years, the Clubhouse constantly needs repairs. Renovation will, in the near future, be required to meet the expectation of members, both active and social, and to allow the Club to fully exploit the commercial function (social) potential of our southbank site where we have a magnificent outlook across the Yarra and City. Any future renovation will require the resolution with the City of Melbourne of the extension of our current lease together with an imaginative fund raising programme.

Further to this, additional monies will be required over and above subscriptions and traditional income sources, just to keep Mercantile as the "Club of Choice" for men and women keen to further their rowing careers and to retain their membership into the future.

With the years ahead likely to be challenging, the costs of running and maintaining a Club such as ours and the provision of the best fleet possible will require careful thought and creative ways to provide the required funds.

Any suggestions and hands on assistance in this endeavour would be gratefully accepted. Finally, we can all ensure the clubs finances keep in shape by paying our subscriptions as early as possible.

R A Cooper Fund

This fund was established by Dr R A Cooper to enable a trophy to be given annually to the Clubman of the year. It also has the purpose of assisting Mercantile members who need financial assistance in their participation in international competition. Your current trustees are David Colvin and Andrew Guerin.

For the 2006 Australian teams, the trustees granted \$800 to each of Alex Sharp and David McGrath to assist in their participation in the Under 23 National team. In the 2007, your trustees have granted \$1,000 to each of John Linke and Tommy Bertrand toward their participation in the Under 23 national team.

The assets of the Cooper Fund are now approaching \$100,000 which is pleasing for both the trustees and potential recipients of grants from the fund. The trustees hope that there will be many more club members in national teams in the future to benefit from the income.

MERCANTILE ROWING CLUB ENDOWMENT FUND

The Endowment Fund was established by James Sprigg at the urging of David Boykett with a generous donation of \$20,000 in the early 1980s and other generous donations and bequests have followed. The purpose was to create a fund of sufficient size to protect the Club in an emergency. The initial aim was to get the fund to \$1,000,000 before any calls were to be made on it for recurrent items. The size of the fund has grown to approximately \$600,000 over the past few years due to the booming stock market. In the absence of a calamity, this aim appears to be realistic.

Your trustees again kept the fund fully invested in the stock market and have made some minor changes to the holdings. We also benefited from the takeover season and still have two substantial holdings under offer. Accordingly, we enjoyed another 20+% rise in the value of the fund before the adjustment mentioned below. Whilst this boom will not go on forever, your trustees are of the view that any down turn will only put a dent in the massive rises already achieved in recent years.

As a result of the Club needing to have resources available for day to day operations and the useful life of the renovations undertaken many years ago coming to an end, the Trustees have agreed to forego the \$20,000 loan for club renovations made many years ago. Accordingly, the net gain in the value of the Fund was reduced by that figure.

HUBERT FREDERICO EQUIPMENT FUND

Late in 2006, Mercantile established a new Fund named in honour of our Vice-President, past top rower and coach, Hubert Frederico for the purpose of meeting the equipment needs of the Club.

The Fund will develop in three stages.

- 1. In the first 10 years of the Fund or thereabouts, we intend to build up a capital base sufficient to allow the Club to eliminate its contribution to the equipment. In this period, the equipment needs will be met by equipment sales, donations and Club contributions. In the first ten years of the Fund, the capital base will be created from all the income of the Fund, non tax deductible donations received, 10% of all boat sales proceeds, Club contributions to equipment and donations received. The critical variable in this stage of the Fund is the assumption that we will receive regular and material capitalised non-deductible donations or raising excess donations above the target set by the Club and so equipment sales proceeds can be capitalised in part or in whole.
- The second stage is in the period 10-20 years hence when it is hoped that the equipment needs of the Club will be met solely from income from the fund, equipment sales proceeds and donations.
- 3. The last stage will be in about 20 years time when it is hoped that the income of the Fund and equipment sales proceeds will be sufficient to meet the equipment needs of the Club.

In the first few months of the Fund, we have been able to capitalise over \$4,000 and we hope to build up the capital to \$25,000-30,000 by 30 April 2008. We have been promised some generous donations already and look forward to a good first full year of operation in 2007-08.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2007

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act of Victoria. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act of Victoria and the following applicable Accounting Standards:

AASB 101:	Presentation of Financial Statements
AASB 108:	Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors
AASB 110:	Events after the Balance Sheet Date
AASB 116:	Property, Plant and Equipment
AASB 117:	Leases
AASB 118:	Revenue
AASB 1031:	Materiality

No other applicable Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The report is also prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following specific accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this report:

(a) Fixed Assets

Other fixed assets are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset was held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The carrying amount of fixed assets is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of those assets.

The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

(b) Leases

Leases of fixed assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership, are transferred to the association are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

Lease incentives received under operating leases are recognised as a liability and amortised on a straight line basis over the life of the lease term.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2007

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(c) Revenue

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Other revenue is recognised when the right to receive the revenue has been established.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(d) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense. Receivables and payables in the Balance Sheet are shown inclusive of GST.
