HEAD COACH'S REPORT

The new training protocols for the 2012/13 season ensured that training at Mercantile is now a year round program. No sooner had the 2012 Nationals finished, the new season was being put into place. Of course the long journey home from Perth presented challenges as the trailer lost one axle on the closing stages of the Nullarbor.

However once rescued by the President and Sandy Mitchell, the trailer and boats not to mention two exhausted coaches returned home.

The twelve-month training program is important since continued progression can only be achieved with a consistent effort throughout the year. This is not to say that training is at full effort all year, but rather a targeted, periodised and focused effort throughout.

The season is split into four periods: transition (3 weeks), foundation (16 weeks), pre-competition (20 weeks) then competition accounting for the final 13 weeks.

The transition phase was taken up with gym work and cross training of all sorts with many going on long bike rides with the occasional row. That said, the final trials in Penrith were looming for those up for National Selection, so the idea of any holiday or transition was far from their minds.

Meanwhile at home the foundation phase commenced on 24 April 2013.

Cayzer Cup

The Cayzer Cup was held in Sydney this season and in custom with the rules, it is open for those athletes who did not gain national representation. The crews decided on were a men's VIII, men's quad, lightweight men's IV, women's VIII and women's quad.

Races were held over 5km, 2km and short sprint races of uncertain length! Mercantile has been the dominant force in this match race and once again we came through to win in convincing style. Much praise was expressed for Sydney for putting on a wonder reception and a good time was had by all!

Under 21 report

With the Youth Cup regatta being run and won a couple of weeks ago, I thought I would keep everyone up to date with how our Mercantile women athletes performed. Don't want to be overshadowed by the fantastic results at Under 23 world champs!

Overall, the girls - Adriana Marulli, Katrina Werry, Addy Dunkley-Smith, Jessye Watt, Jennifer Cleary and Ebony Tsomaropoulos - conducted themselves very well both on and off the water. This attitude was reflected in the results, with all the girls taking a more mature approach to racing and gaining a greater realisation of what is required to take the next step to Under 23.

The Youth Cup Regatta was a success, not necessary in results, but in lessens learnt. I hope it gives all the girls more motivation for the remainder of winter training.

Under 23 report

After selection Dave De Lang and Sean Lake were relocated to train out of WAIS in Perth. Rebekah Hooper was relocated to Brisbane with the women's quad. Katrina Bateman's IV was located in Melbourne.

Prior to the Under 23 championships in Trakai, Ukraine, the team took the very wise decision to race at a regatta prior. This year Henley Royal was chosen and despite the different format it was decided for this team in this year it was a good decision.

The lightweight men's IV was entered into the Stewards Race, which is the open men's IV. They drew an Estonian crew in the first round, which they duly dispatched before being beaten in the semi-final by the New Zealand heavyweight IV.

The women's quad had the enviable task of doubling their entry into the Princess Grace Race, W4x with the Remenham Challenge – the women's open VIIIs, with the coxless IV. The girls do not have a IVs event at Henley Royal (yet) so had only one event to concentrate on.

Meanwhile, training in all world championship boats continued at Pangbourne, upriver of Henley.

At the regatta, the lightie men were drawn in heat 1 and despite a good start, where they lead for 1000m, they came in second behind the Poles. Heat 2 looked ominous with all five crews posting faster times, but heat 3 showed our boys were definitely in the mix. With 3 through to the semi final A/B from each heat much would depend on the draw.

In a change of profile, the boys were fourth at the first marker, but came through the Germans and Kiwis to be in an impressive second place with 500m to go. Unfortunately the Germans rallied to push us out to third but that was still an A final, which is a huge achievement in itself in what many consider to be the tightest event in world rowing.

The A final, though, is where some find new energy and despite a valiant effort form the outset they came in sixth, which is still a commendable result given the recent history of the event.

The girls came through an unusual selection process and indeed the selectors needed to goes at it to decide the final crew. Based in Melbourne, the girls found some decent speed early on and impressed in the Canberra Camp half way through the training cycle.

Upon arriving in the UK, the girls raced at Henley. The quad impressed form the outset only being challenged by the Kiwis in the semi. In the VIII, the scratch crew with a late substitution did well up to the semi-final where they met the German VIII.

At Trakai, the quad looked in control and despite a second place to the Germans in their heat, were definitely the crew to watch. In the final the Germans, once again in true form, lead out of the blocks but by the half way stage our girls came through in commanding style and took the lead to the line along with a world best time of 6:22.11. The coxless IV raced in the second heat and cruised through to the A final behind the formidable Canadians. The previous heat suggested a podium result was on the cards and the girls did not disappoint.

With the Kiwis throwing all their cards on the deck in the first quarter, all crews knew they had a demanding race on their hands. Our girls held their nerve and, with a fastest third 500m, they came through to hold second place off a fast-finishing Russian crew. Silver medal was a fabulous result for a crew not given much hope at the outset.

The Olympic Report

My report will seems quite sparse but given I was watching it with most of our members on the big screen at the club, you will have to forgive me. Chipper gave out his now customary predictions, which I believe turned out to be quite accurate (no surprise there then).

Much has been published about the run in for our crews and no more so than the men's coxless IV with Drew Ginn going for his fourth gold and the crew already having a interesting rivalry over the previous world cups with the GB crew.

I will not say anything about the race, apart that I think most of us at home thought we very nearly had it and despite the result the cheer at the end was awesome! Obviously the whole event was kick started by the women's pair of Sarah Tait, Kate Hornsey and coached by Bill Tait. Disappointment for the men's double and Captain Victoria himself as well as Tom Swann in the men's VIII.

Cayzer Cup

Back at home, the Cayzer Cup marks the end of the foundation phase and no

sooner had we returned, the national time trials were upon us. Almost all Mercantile senior athletes put their name forward for national selection.

Melbourne Heads

Alongside the trials preparations for the heads were also under way. Melbourne Head was included in the run up to Head of the Yarra.

At Melbourne Head, the men were narrowly beaten by Melbourne Uni, who rowed first and we last due to our athletes also rowing their small boats first. The difference in time meant a difference in stream, which we believed had an effect on hull speeds. Nonetheless, our women impressed with convincing winning margins.

Wins at Head of the Yarra

The main focus though was at the Head of the Yarra. On a fine day, Mercantile lead from the start in both men and women events and did not look back for one stroke.

The men won by 47 seconds and the women by 12. Our B crews also came home to winning margins with the men only seconds off an overall second place. A wonderful day for Mercantile!

Penrith time trials

December was marked by the reintroduction of the national time trial at Penrith: three days of 5k time trials. Mercantile took its hopefuls to Johnsonville (the location of our annual club camp) so we could familiarise ourselves with 5k racing on a straight bit of river.

The results at Penrith were very encouraging and everyone put themselves into contention for inclusion for the national training camps in January. These camps would pretty much decide who would make up the crews for the first World Cup.

January Camp

Once again Mercantile used Johnsonville as our location for the annual club camp. The idea this year was to arrive with crews formed off the time trial results and train hard in preparation for NSW Regatta, which would also be the selection regatta for the first World Cup. The camp focused on volume as well as threshold work.

The hosts also had the welcome news that the local council are close to building a pontoon for easier access as well as a marked out 5k course.

Competition phase

The club raced at Barwon Regatta in preparation for the NSW State Regatta. Barwon was very successful with multiple wins as well as the over all most successful club.

NSW Regatta goes from strength to strength and was very competitive with crews entering from overseas. Notable performances came from all our VIS athletes as well as Jen Cleary and Jordan Hooper.

To ensure we all went home on a high the Under 23 men's VIII rowed a very well timed and determined race to overcome Melbourne University in the final strokes and claim a credible third place.

After the regatta, the following were selected for the World Cup team:

Men: Josh Dunkley-Smith, Tom Swann, Shane Jackson, Sean Lake, Redmond Matthews, James Wilson and Jordan Hooper. Women: Jen Cleary, Rebekah Hooper, Katrina Bateman and Charlotte Sutherland.

With a somewhat disappointing number of entries, I think its fair to say the results flattered the host nation but so much was learnt by all that it was without doubt a very positive experience.

State Championships

At the Victorian State Championships, Mercantile's policy was to race the allimportant qualifying boats for national selection for the various world championships on the Saturday followed by a number of club crews on the Sunday. By the end of the weekend, some athletes had raced in more than five events and 10 races in total. Suffice to say the club won 19 gold, 11 silver and 12 bronze to easily place itself at the top of the medal tally.

Entries were made in the Mercantile Scotch Regatta as well as Australian Henley where the club added to its 2011 tally by winning the men's and women's open VIIIs and placing second in the men's and women's open sculls.

National Championships

The final regatta of the season for some is the National Championships. This year the regatta was doubling up with the World Cup 1 making it a huge event with entries to match. Junior and club crews rowing alongside the international superstars - it really was the rowing extravaganza the organisers had promised.

Our entries were based on national selection and thus were small boat dominated. However the Youth and Under 19 crews stole the show with races that will be remembered for a long time. Leading the way was the men's Under 19 VIII and women's Under 23 VIII, both races which were televised live on Foxtel.

The success of this year's program is summed up with the list of Mercantile athletes that claimed national team seats: 29 in total - I believe a new high and one we can all be proud of. The efforts put in by all the coaches and support team has been phenomenal.

A large number of Mercantilian's raced the surf season with varying levels of success. With Robbi Brain having the most success, winning bronze in the 90+ Ski Relay at World Championships, then picking up the Victorian state titles in the 30-34 men's single, double and 110+ ski relay champion

At the National Wild Water Championships held on the Mitta Mitta River in Victoria, Mathew French managed to win the Open Men's Classic Australian Title and pick up a silver medal in the Rapid Sprint.

This signals an exciting time with the kayak club gaining a permanent structure to store kayaks in. This is a massive step forward for the club.

FINANCE REPORT

This year it's been all about the renovation.

As at the date of this report, we have spent about \$1.3m of the \$2m budget. Fortunately, we've been supported by our sub-tenants, Brighton Grammar School and St Catherine's School. In addition, we could not have even contemplated the redevelopment without the support of the Endowment Fund, which has slowly been accumulating in preparation for just such an endeavour.

Redevelopment loan

Nevertheless, to underwrite Mercantile's share of the redevelopment, we will need to borrow approximately \$250,000 from the bank. In order to minimise interest charges, we must pay off the loan as quickly as possible, and then, to provide a legacy for future generations, we must commence rebuilding the Endowment Fund.

Fortunately, the increased rental income as a result of the renovation will allow the club to start this process, but the assistance of club members is also sought.

Tax-deductible donations

To facilitate donations, we have now obtained tax-deductible status for donations (through the Australian Sports Foundation), and the necessary form is available on the club's website.

We have also spent considerable sums refurbishing our boat fleet and, with the assistance of the Frederico Fund and member Andrew Cleary, we have acquired two IVs, three pair/doubles and a number of sets of oars.

Thanks to our donors

We've also been very fortunate to have received donations from many members, whose names are listed at the opening of this annual report. No matter how large or small the donation, it is greatly appreciated.

Thanks to the athletes

In addition, over the year we have had a number of members donate time and materials willingly and without recognition. I am particularly appreciative of the junior and senior athletes who have given up their Saturdays in order to help with the renovation. Each time they did this, the club saved thousands of dollars in labour costs.

Finally, a special mention to the hastilyformed Fundraising Committee who hit the ground running, securing approximately \$21,000 to assist unfunded national team athletes pay their seat fees.

In terms of the overall result, the auditors hadn't completed their review at the time of going to press and so I am unable to report a result. The report will be available at the annual general meeting and will be published on the website soon after.

MERCANTILE ROWING CLUB ENDOWMENT FUND

The Endowment Fund was established in 1980, by past President Jim Sprigg with a substantial donation. The fund is intended to provide the Club with a level of security in an uncertain world.

The Club does not have an institutional or government backer to provide assistance in our attempts to remain at the leading edge of the sport. The Trustees have agreed with the Club to back the rebuilding project with the full resources of the fund. However the trustees do require that the fund be replenished through income from rentals upon completion. The Fund has an existing project, namely to support the establishment of the Frederico Fund. The net income of the Fund is provided to the Frederico Fund to assist in the establishment of its capital base.

The promised transfer of \$37,300 from the Endowment Fund to the Frederico Fund remains as a sundry creditor/debtor in the respective funds. The entire share portfolio has been sold realising a surplus on share sale of \$166,847.
